As required by section seventy of chapter two of the Revised Statutes of 1883, I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report of the condition of the State treasury for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1892, the different tabulations being arranged in the following order:

TEMPORARY LOAN AND TAXATION.

A temporary loan of \$300,000 00 is now outstanding, of which amount \$200,000.00 becomes due on the first day of April next and if the tax rate of two and three quarter mills on the dollar be maintained during the next two years and no heavy special appropriations are made by the present Legislature, the treasury will be in a condition to meet this obligation at maturity. In connection with this subject, I would call your attention to Table No. 10 of this report, where is shown for the purpose of easy reference, the annual receipts and expenditures during the past twelve years.

BONDED DEBT.

The total bonded indebtedness of the State on January 1, 1893, is \$2,506,300.00 being composed entirely (with the exception of \$4,000 00) of registered bonds issued in 1889.

As very nearly all the old bonds issued by the State have now been redeemed, it may be well to incorporate in this Report a complete history of the issuance and redemption of the two large blocks of bonds which have constituted the greater part of the indebtedness of the State.

LOAN OF JUNE 1, 1864.

A bonded debt to the extent of \$3,000,000.00, or so much thereof as might be needed and payable June 1, 1889, was authorized by an Act of the Legislature, approved March 19, 1864. This loan was found necessary to meet the payment of bounties to volunteers for the suppression of the War of the Rebellion, the sum of \$2,987,168.16 having been paid for this purpose during the year 1864.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act above referred to, the State Treasurer issued during the year 1864, coupon bonds to the amount of \$2,765,000 00
and in 1865, bonds to the amount of 67,500 00
making a total of \$2,832,500 00
which was the total amount issued under this Act, and was known as the loan of June 1, 1864.

These bonds have all been redeemed, with the exception of coupon bond No. 1307 for \$500.00, which is still outstanding, and are accounted for as follows :

By an Act approved February 24, 1875, the sinking fund created in 1865 was abolished, and all State of Maine bonds in said fund were cancelled and destroyed in January 1876, by the committee on financial affairs, under an order of the Legislature dated January 21, 1876.

The bonds so destroyed belonging to this debt, amounted to the sum of \$502,500 00

By an Act approved February 26, 1887, the sinking fund of 1868 was abolished and all State of Maine bonds in said fund were cancelled and destroyed, the amount belonging in this loan being 551,000 00

LOAN OF OCTOBER 1, 1869.

The Legislature of 1868, by an Act approved March 7, 1868, authorized a bonded debt of \$3,500,000 00, or so much thereof as might be needed, for the equalization of municipal war debts, and the amount due to the several cities, towns and plantations in the State, as ascertained by the Commissioners appointed for that purpose, aggregated. \$3,105,183 33 and payment of same was provided for as follows:

These bonds being all dated October 1, 1869, and ready for delivery, were treated by the State Treasurer in his Report under date of January 1, 1870, as an indebtedness outstanding of \$3,084,400.00 but the amounts were actually paid to the several towns as follows:

Relative to the sums apportioned to these towns that have never received the amounts, I would say that Long Island and Sandy River are unorganized plantations. Haynesville and Mayfield did not furnish proper certified copy of vote on the question of acceptance, as required by law.

Trescott voted not to accept the amount and I can find no reason why the town of Weston was not paid the amount apportioned to it.

This unsettled account should be closed up and the present legislature should order these bonds canceled and destroyed, except perhaps in the case of Weston which appears, without further investigation, to have been legally entitled to the sum apportioned to it.

SCHOOL FUND AND MILL TAX.

I wish in this report to call the attention of the legislature to the rapid growth of the school fund and mill tax and to the manner of its apportionment.

This fund which is set apart for the benefit of common schools, is made up as follows :

One-half of the Savings Bank Tax.

Six per cent interest on the Permanent School Fund.

One mill on each dollar of valuation.

The yearly aggregate of these amounts for the last dozen years, together with the total number of children reported for each year, is shown below :

This table shows an increase in the amount of the fund of \$181,374.44, while the number of children shows a decrease of 4961.

There is at present deducted from this fund, the amount appropriated for normal schools, teacher's meetings, training school and Lee Normal Academy, making a total of \$26,500.00 and I would

suggest that in addition to the above deductions, the amounts appropriated for free high schools and the various academies, be also included.

BASIS OF APPORTIONMENT.

This fund is at present distributed among the several towns, according to the number of *children* therein, between four and twenty-one years of age.

The last Report of the State Superintendent of Common Schools, shows that the average attendance at the schools is 53 per cent of the total number of children and this percentage of attendance varies in the different towns from 25 per cent to 90 per cent, so that under the present basis of distribution, a town that educates only 25 per cent of say 100 children, receives exactly the same amount as a town of 100 children that educates 90 per cent. I would therefore recommend that this fund be distributed among the several towns according to the average number of *scholars* attending school therein.

It seems to me that such a division would not only be much more just, but would also serve as an incentive for the town authorities to compel as large an attendance at the public schools as possible.

STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND THE MECHANIC
ARTS.

By an act of Congress approved August 30, 1890, there was appropriated to each State and Territory for the more complete endowment and maintenance of colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts, the sum of fifteen thousand dollars for the year ending June 30, 1890, and an annual increase of the amount of such appropriation thereafter for ten years by an additional sum of one thousand dollars over the preceding year, and the annual amount to be paid thereafter to each State and Territory, shall be twenty-five thousand dollars.

It was under the above act that the \$18,000.00, as shown in Table No. 2, was received from the United States Treasurer, and same was paid to the Treasurer of the Maine State College, Sept. 2, 1892, as shown in Table No. 3, this being the sum due for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1893, the amounts due for the previous years having been paid by the United States to the college direct.

UNPAID TAXES.

Table No. 19 shows in detail the taxes that have been assessed against railroad companies and are still unsettled.

The suit against the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada, has been decided by the United States Supreme Court in favor of the State of Maine, but the question of interest is now in dispute.

The collection of the amount due from the Bangor Street Railway is in the hands of the attorney general.

The State tax assessed against "cities, towns and plantations" for the year 1891, has been paid in full, with the exception of the sum of \$172.72 assessed against Lexington Plantation, said plantation declining to pay tax on the ground that it should be taxed as wild land, and the present Legislature will be asked to take action on the subject.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

The undersigned, committee appointed under authority of section 71, chapter 2, Revised Statutes, to examine the accounts of the State Treasurer, ask leave to report that they have made a careful examination of the Treasurer's account of the receipts for the year 1892, and find said account to correspond with the amount as stated in his report; and they also found on file and examined vouchers fully covering the amount of each disbursement made during the year. All books, records and accounts of the department have been accurately kept and the work neatly executed.

The amount of cash on hand at the close of the fiscal year, was found to be \$304,569.68, consisting of cash in office and on deposit in several national banks in this State and Suffolk National Bank of Boston. On deposits there was received from the Suffolk National Bank interest to the amount of \$1,301.28.

The total bonded indebtedness of the State as appeared by the Treasurer's report was \$2,506,300, showing a reduction of \$52,200 of the State debt for the year 1892. In addition to this amount a temporary loan of \$300,000 is still outstanding as was the case a year ago.

The committee, as required by the statute, destroyed by burning in the presence of the State Treasurer, a note and bonds of the State paid during the year amounting to the

sum of \$152,200.00. Of this amount \$52,200.00 was in bonds; the balance was the note of \$100,000.00 of the temporary loan of August 9th, 1890. The committee also destroyed, in like manner, coupons to the amount of \$60.00 paid during the year as charged upon the Treasurer's books exclusive of interest paid on registered bonds amounting to \$91,940.00, making a total interest payment of \$92,000.00 for the year. They also destroyed at the same time, in the same manner, registered bonds to the amount of \$1,008,000.00 for which new bonds of similar character and denomination had been exchanged during the year. A complete record of the foregoing note, bonds and coupons, showing the number and amount of each was found on file in the office of the Treasurer.

The trust funds deposited in the State treasury by certain insurance companies doing business in the State, as required by law, for the protection of their policy and certificate holders, were examined and counted and found to agree in character and amount with the statement of the same, set forth in the Treasurer's report. The following are the amounts of securities deposited by said insurance companies :
