STATE PRISON.

The general management of the affairs of the prison during the past year has been very satisfactory. The convicts have been well fed, well clothed, and have enjoyed more of the comforts of life than is usual in penal institutions, resulting in a good condition of health, a more cheerful obedience of the rules of the prison, and a greater degree of interest in their work.

The financial affairs of the prison have been well managed, and present as satisfactory results as could be expected.

The manufacturing industries, on the whole, make a satisfactory showing. The sales of the manufactured products of the prison have been very good, but in some instances at reduced prices as the result of the prevailing business depression. The harness department did not meet our expectations and should receive the early attention and careful consideration of the Prison Committee, of the Executive Council, Inspectors and Warden. The harness industry is a beneficial one for the convicts and can, we think, be placed on a profitable basis. It will be well for us to consider the advisability of using machinery to some extent in this department.

The carriage department does not show as much gain as usual, while the broom department shows a greater gain than in former years.

During the past year, the steam heating plant has been extended, a new engine, and a steam laundry added. A house and lot adjacent to the prison grounds has been purchased, giving additional land and two good tenements for the use of officials.

In accordance with the law of the last legislature, the "New Wing" (so called) has been fitted up for the use of the insane convicts of the State, giving them very comfortable quarters.

STATE PRISON.

The prison and grounds are now lighted by electricity in a very satisfactory manner by the Knox Gas & Electric Company agreeable to a contract authorized by the last legislature. This not being a legislative year, we refrain from making any recommendations requiring legislative action.

We append hereto a summary of the stock account.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with the statutes, I have the honor of presenting, in the customary tabular form, the following exhibit of the financial operations and condition of the Maine State Prison, together with a statement of affairs relative to the prison population, including patients in the insane department, for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1893.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Inspectors of the Maine State Prison:

GENTLEMEN: It is my pleasure as well as duty to submit this report of my work in the year now closing. Of the men committed to the prison during the year ten had never enjoyed school privileges, but two of these had learned to read but not to write, the others could neither read nor write. Twenty-three of the others had been blessed with advantages of the public schools; five had attended the graded schools of the larger villages and cities, though but one had completed the high school course of study; three had been favored with academical and collegiate training; and two had been educated in the schools of France and Italy.

Fifty of the convicts have received instruction in reading, spelling, writing, book-keeping, arithmetic, geography, grammar, composition and other studies. This work has been performed amid great disadvantages, as you well know, yet it has not been in vain. Some who have gone out are continuing their studies and their letters show a steady advancement. When the time shall come that we shall have suitable facilities for systematic school work we may hope for more decided results.

LIBRARY.

The library has been increased by a few volumes purchased, and the donation of several volumes by the friends of reform. The Ladies' Library Association of Thomaston has given a valuable addition of second hand books which, however, are new to the prison library. Two copies of Harper's, The Century, The Cosmopolitan, and New England Magazines are taken for the benefit of the men. These are changed from cell to cell once a week.

MAIL.

Letters have been numerously sent the men by their family friends. The men have been encouraged to avail themselves of their privilege to write one letter per week to friends. Letters have been written for those who could not write and the sick. And others have been aided in their spelling and composition.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The regular Sabbath morning service has been held, and the work of personal conversation with the men upon religious truths and experience has been continued. Within the year some of the men have abandoned the use of tobacco, some have taken a pledge to wholly abstain from using intoxicating drinks, and some have adopted the custom of daily reading a portion of the Scriptures and offering prayer to God. A service of Scripture reading, prayer and religious conversation has been held in the hospital on the Sabbath. The Sabbath religious service with the female prisoners has been continued, led either by the members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, or by myself.

Though desiring that more might have been accomplished, I look back with a measure of satisfaction upon the results already gathered from the labor of the year.

With many thanks to you, gentlemen, and to the warden and other officers of the prison for favors received and assistance given this brief report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON JAILS.

It will be noticed by the summary attached to this report that the number of convicts in custody on November 30, 1893, is 172 larger than November 30, 1892. The total number of commitments for the year ending November 30, 1893, is much larger than usual, for some cause, and exceeds the number for the year ending November 30, 1892, by 1,264. The increase of commitments over last year are in part as follows:

The increase of commitments for other crimes than those mentioned above has been greater than usual, being 312 in excess of last year. It will be noticed that the largest increase of commitments have been of tramps, poor debtors, for non-payment of fines and for other crimes against property, which have, we believe, been the natural result of the prevailing "hard times."

We report the condition of the several jails of the State as follows:

First. The Androscoggin county jail at Auburn has been managed in a most excellent manner during the past year under the efficient management of Sheriff Hill. A steam heating plant has been added, and several other important improvements made.

Second. The Aroostook county jail at Houlton is in good condition, and has all modern conveniences for the care of convicts.

Third. The Cumberland county jail at Portland is kept in its usual first-class condition.

Fourth. The Franklin county jail at Farmington is kept in a neat and orderly condition and is well adapted to the needs of the county.

Fifth. The Hancock county jail at Ellsworth is in very good condition. An improvement has been made in the discipline during the year.

Sixth. The Kennebec county jail at Augusta is kept up to its usual high standard. It is one of the best managed jails in the State.

Seventh. The Knox county jail at Rockland presented a neat and orderly appearance at our last visit. The prisoners have been clothed in convict suits during the year. The county commissioners have recently erected and equipped stonesheds, where tramps are employed at breaking stone, in accordance with the provisions of the recent tramp law, and with satisfactory results. Some of the other counties of the State would do well to adopt a similar method of dealing with tramps.

Eighth. The Lincoln county jail at Wiscasset is in good enough condition for the small number of prisoners usually confined there, which consists quite largely of tramps.

Ninth. The Oxford county jail at Paris is in about the same condition as last year. Early in the year the county voted to build a new jail, but owing to some legal questions which have arisen the jail has not yet been built.

Tenth. The Penobscot county jail at Bangor is in its usual good condition. Electric lights have been added during the year.

Eleventh. Piscataquis county uses the jail at Bangor.

Twelfth. Sagadahoc county uses the jail at Auburn largely.

Thirteenth. Somerset county made an effort to obtain a new jail early in the year, but the people deemed the old one good enough for the present. The jail has not presented so neat and tidy an appearance for some time as it did at our last visit.

Fourteenth. Waldo county had, by the return of its sheriff, on December 1st, sixty-seven prisoners confined in eleven cells. This county needs a larger jail with better facilities for the management of convicts.

Fifteenth. The Washington county jail is kept in a neat and orderly manner.

Sixteenth. The Yor kcounty jail is in about the same condition as last year. It could be rendered much more convenient at a small expense.

We append hereto the reports of the sheriffs of the several counties in detail with tabulated statements.
