As there is to be no session of the legislature the present winter, we deem it unnecessary to make any extended report or to submit any recommendations to be laid before the legislature a year hence. There have been no special changes or improvements except those ordered and provided for by the During our official connection with the last legislature. prison the convicts have never been better clothed or provided with better food than at the present time. We have. at all times, afforded the convicts the greatest possible freedom in stating their grievances to us privately and for nearly two years there has not been a single complaint in relation to the food or clothing provided. The number of convicts in Prison is comparatively small, in fact, but one other state has a smaller percentage of its population in its prison than the State of Maine. The financial affairs of the Prison are in exceptionally good condition. At the close of business on November 30th, the total liabilities amounted to the sum of five dollars and eight cents (5.08) and the large amount of manufactured stock now on hand will provide ample funds for the ensuing year. A large number of well selected books have been added to the library, under the careful and painstaking supervision of the Chaplain, Rev. C. A. Plumer, who devotes his entire time to the welfare of the convicts. Some arrangement should be made to provide a suitable schoolroom.

The Chaplain labors under very unfavorable circumstances in being compelled to instruct his pupils individually and if a suitable school-room could be provided, many more convicts

would avail themselves of the advantages which would be afforded of obtaining the rudiments of an education.

On nearly all of our visits to the Prison during the year we have been accompanied by the visiting member of the executive council, Hon. O. B. Clason, to whom we express our thanks for valued suggestions and uniform courtesy.

We also take this occasion to express our appreciation of the courteous attention which has been accorded to us at all times by the Warden and subordinate officers and also of their earnest efforts for the welfare of the Prison which has made it a model of prison management.

The annual inventory of the property has been taken and a summary of the same is hereto appended.

WARDEN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN: Following the usual custom, I have the honor of herewith submitting, for your consideration, my report of the operations and condition of the Maine State Prison for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1895.

For information respecting the intellectual, moral and spiritual interests and needs, and the physical and mental condition and welfare of the convicts and insane patients, I would refer you to the subjoined reports of the Prison Chaplain, and the Prison Physician, respectively.

As the annual report for 1896 will be issued prior to the convening of the next legislature, it would seem to be inadvisable, at this time, to make recommendations, offer suggestions, or otherwise extend this report beyond what will appear in the following statements relative to the financial transactions, and present condition of the several departments of the institution, and statistics regarding the prison population and insane department, to which I would respectfully refer you.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN—Following a time honored custom I herewith submit my annual report of the work entrusted to me within the Maine State Prison :

The intellectual and moral status of the inmates of the prison has been but slightly changed by the commitments of the year as will be seen in the following facts: Ten per cent of the men committed during the year could neither read nor write when they came to the prison, twelve per cent could read but could not write, forty-six per cent of them had enjoyed and improved to a greater or less degree the advantages afforded in the public schools of our own land or their native countries, sixteen per cent had completed the grammar school course of study, ten per cent were graduates from high schools and of the remaining six per cent one had been educated in a select school in his native land, one had had the advantages of an academy of first grade and the other was a collegiate.

Eighty-eight per cent of these men were habitual users of tobacco in one or both forms of its ordinary use, the remaining twelve per cent had never made use of tobacco. By their own confession fifty per cent of these men had been accustomed to the use of intoxicating drinks, either occasionally in small quantities, or as great drinkers. The other fifty per cent were teetotalers.

INSTRUCTION.

The work of teaching those who are disposed to study, and those who can be persuaded to learn has been continued, with only brief intermission, during the year. The continued lack of a school room has confined us to personal work. This method of work may have some advantages for those of manhood's years, who have never attended school to be familiar with class work, but is an unsatisfactory method to the teacher who must go over the same lesson a half dozen or more times, with as many students in one evening. This method of teaching, also has the disadvantage of iron bars between the teacher and students and the lesson recited in a whisper, or low tone of voice. Those who are beginning with the primer, or first or second reader are called to the library in the day hours where these disadvantages are not Respecting the results gained I refer you to the visitmet. ing member of your body and the inspectors who are familiar with the work done.

LIBRARY.

One hundred and twenty-nine volumes have been added to the library within the year, by purchase and gift. An unusually large number of the men have made constant use of these books. A result perhaps from the additions made to the library last year. The usual number of magazines have been taken and weekly one has been furnished to each man.

MAIL.

Letters have been freely received by most of the men. With few exceptions, the men eagerly improve the privilege of writing one letter each week to their friends. Many of the men subscribe for one or more of the leading weekly papers of the State. I have, as heretofore, obtained by gift copies of many of the leading religious papers for weekly distribution among the men.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

Religious services have been held each Sabbath in the chapel. There has been apparent, no lessening of the interest in these services. Some who one year since were quite indifferent to these services are now among the most interested. Qftentimes the personal talks with the men afford much encouragement to sow the seed of truth. And many an interesting and helpful season of prayer has been enjoyed during the year, the Chaplain and one man meeting in the library for such service, sometimes at the suggestion of the Chaplain, at other times at the requst of the convict seeking Divine help to assist him in turning from the wrong to the right.

A season of Scripture reading and prayer has been regularly continued with the inmates of the hospital. A weekly service of Bible study and prayer is also held with the female prisoners. At times led by the Chaplain, at other times by the ladies of the different churches of the village, who are members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

With many thanks to you each and to all the officers and friends of the prisoners, who have assisted me in my work, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION RELATING TO INSANE CRIMINALS.

To His Excellency, the Governor, and the Executive Council of the State of Maine:

It is incumbent upon the Commission, whose duty is defined by statutory enactment, that it should visit the insane department of the State Prison at least once a month to advise as to the proper care, treatment and disposition of the insane convicts located therein. In presenting to your honorable body the Commission's second annual report regarding the insane department of the prison, we are able to state that the requirements relating to its duties have been fulfilled. Aside from the constant inspection of the warden and prison physician, the non-resident member of the Board has made stated monthly visits, on which occasion the entire Commission has examined the department and the patients as a body. It is gratifying to report that no accidents or casualties have occurred during the year. When it is taken into consideration that a large number of the inmates are possessed with homicidal tendencies, it plainly indicates that especial care and watchfulness has been maintained, particularly in its immediate supervision, and as a committee we congratulate, not only the management of the prison, but the relatives of the patients as well, that their care is under the immediate supervision of a discreet and well disciplined attendant.

We have frequently inspected the food, and, while it is simple and plain, yet it has been sufficient in quantity, well cooked, and of good quality. When it has been necessary in consequence of sickness, special diet has been afforded the CRIMINAL INSANE.

patient. The occupants of this department have been taken out in the open air regularly for exercise whenever the weather has been suitable, and, as they are protected by the walls of the prison from inclement winds, open air recreation can be continued a much longer period during the year than otherwise. The comparatively robust physical condition which is observed is largely due no doubt to the invigorating and health-giving influences of exposure to so much sunlight and open air.

While we can assure the citizens of the State and the relatives of the inmates as well that the insane in this department are humanely cared for, yet we are of the opinion that this class should be provided for in connection with the management of one of the State hospitals for the insane. As it is necessary that they should be debarred from mingling with the other inmates, a distinct building of easy access could be erected for their occupancy, as well as for that of cases which are frequently being sent to these institutions by the courts for observation in order to determine the mental condition. While there is not a sufficient number of criminal insane in Maine to warrant the erection of a distinct institution, such as exists in some of the larger states, yet such an arrangement as the above could be economically introduced in connection with the present hospital for the insane, or, better still perhaps, in connection with that which is in process of erection at Bangor. At the commencement of the fiscal year there were resident in the insane department nineteen patients. Three have been admitted since from the prison proper, who were adjudged insane by a commission of physicians and were transferred to this department. Three have died since. so that the number remains the same at this date as at the commencement of the year. The whole number under treatment has been twenty-two. We append a tabulated statement of the numerical condition of this department:

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REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE.

In accordance with the custom of my predecessor, I present the following report of my labors as the Visiting Committee of the Council to the State Prison :

I have arranged to make my visits in company with the Prison Inspectors, and am under great obligations to them for the many courtesies which they have extended to me. The duties of the inspectors have been faithfully performed and the interests of the State carefully looked after.

The sanitary condition of the prison is excellent, and the health of the inmates has not suffered from any defects in that direction. The kitchen department is always neat, and food wholesome and well cooked.

The profits of the prison have been fairly well disposed of, and the result is a smaller deficiency than usual, which would have been wholly dissipated, if the twenty per cent law in regard to the employment of convicts had not been passed. It is not my intention to discuss this law, but merely to allude to it in justice to those having charge of the prison and who are also responsible for its results.

Electric lights are now used in all departments of the prison proper, an appropriation having been made by the last legislature ample to meet all demands in this direction. Any recommendations in regard to appropriations I will delay making until my next annual report just before the meeting of the legislature.

The warden and all the subordinate officials of the prison have performed their duties in a very satisfactory manner.

REPORT ON JAILS.

We have made the required inspection of the jails in the several counties and report their condition as follows :

1. The Androscoggin county jail, at Auburn, has always been found in most excellent condition. Many improvements in discipline and general management have been made reflecting much credit upon Sheriff Hill.

2. The Aroostook county jail, at Houlton, is in very good condition. A stone yard has been provided, for the employment of tramps, with good results. Not quite as much attention is given to cleanliness as is desirable.

3. The Cumberland county jail, at Portland, is one of the best managed jails in the State. It is always neat, clean and well disciplined. This is the only jail in the State where the female prisoners are under the immediate supervision and control of a matron.

4. The Franklin county jail, at Farmington, never contains many prisoners and is always in very good condition.

5. The Hancock county jail, at Ellsworth, is in excellent condition.

6. The Kennebec county jail, at Augusta, is one of the model jails. The prisoners are kept closely confined in their cells and are clothed in convict suits. The jail is also well arranged for the proper classification of prisoners.

7. The Knox county jail, at Rockland, is a comparatively new one, yet there have been several escapes during the past year which cannot be attributed to any defect in its construction. The jail has not at all times presented quite as cleanly an appearance as is desirable, yet with the past experience of the jailer, we trust that we shall have no occasion for criticism in the future.

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8. The Lincoln county jail, at Wiscasset, is but little used except for tramps and has been under the control of the present jailer for many years. It has always been kept in very good condition.

9. Oxford county has erected a new jail at South Paris, which will soon be ready for occupancy and will be ample for the needs of the county.

10. The Penobscot county jail, at Bangor, has been recently improved and thoroughly renovated. New clothing has been provided; a room fitted up for a hospital also one for a work room for female convicts. At our last visit the jail presented a very fine appearance.

11. Piscataquis county uses the jail at Bangor.

12. Sagadahoc county uses the jail at Auburn largely.

13. Somerset county has erected a new jail at Skowhegan the past summer, ample and convenient for its needs.

14. The Waldo county.jail, at Belfast, has been managed in a manner exceedingly creditable to Sheriff Norton. It has been kept neat and clean, and is no longer filled with tramps. The vigorous methods adopted by the county commissioners and sheriff have been most satisfactory in results.

15. The Washington county jail, at Machias, is one of the best managed in the State.

16. The York county jail, at Alfred, is in very good condition. At a small expense it could be rendered much more convenient.
