PREFACE

This first edition of the Maine Handbook represents an effort to bring together for the first time in standardized form a statistical abstract encompassing as much available information as possible basic to the Maine economy. It is intended to serve as a ready reference for the use of students, writers, governmental personnel, business interests and others who may find it convenient to have a wide range of basic social and economic information assembled under one index. It is hoped that this first edition of the Statistical Abstract will be revised annually to offer up-to-date information on a continuing basis.

Three important considerations were taken into account in formulating the abstract. Firstly, it was felt that a modest beginning would more likely be successful than an overly ambitious one. In this way a firmer base would be established upon which successive editions could be improved. Secondly, in the beginning only information that was well-organized or had already been published would be utilized. Hence the burdensome task of organizing new data and series could be avoided. In this regard, care must be exercised in comparing data presented in different tables, for sometimes variances in definitions of terminology are used by various sources. In most cases these differences are noted at the end of the respective tables. Thirdly, since the economics of the six New England states are so closely entwined, it was felt that certain comparative data should be presented in each section for the New England region as a whole and for each constituent state.

The Maine Statistical Abstract was prepared under the general direction of William E. Matthews, Director, Planning, Research and Programs Assistance Division of the Department of Economic Development. B. William Dorsey, Research Associate, was responsible for its planning and content, and Linwood V. Partridge, Illustrator, was responsible for the cover design, maps and other visual materials.

Publication of this first edition would not have been possible without the generous cooperation of many federal, state and private agencies which provided valuable information and assistance. Grateful acknowledgement of this cooperation and assistance is credited in the source notes below each table. Appreciation is also extended to Herbert W. Moore, Research Associate during the initial stages of its preparation.













The average yield per acre in 1966 was 5.93 tons of beets per acre after all tare deductions and the sugar content of these beets averaged 17.8 percent. This means that Maine produced approximately 20 Cwt. of sugar per acre in 1966. It is expected that in 1967 yields in Maine will average over 12 tons per acre and will increase yearly as we gain experience. We have the capabilities in Maine of averaging between 15 and 20 tons of beets per acre and our sugar content is unusually high.



Although Nicatous Lake is reported to have supported a good salmon fishery in past years, survey data indicate that a gradual influx and increase of warm-water game species has seriously decreased the lake's ability to support, at present, anything but a small fraction of the reported past salmon population.

The general shallowness of the lake together with a consideration of its water quality suggests that it has always been "marginal" salmon and trout water, that is, capable of supporting populations of these species only in the absence of excessive competition by the warm-water game species now present.

Management therefore, should be primarily for warm-water game species. However, maintenance of a small salmon fishery without diversion from the over-all policy of warm-water game fish management could probably be assured by intensively managing West Lake Outlet, Duck Lake Brook, and Nicatous Stream as spawning tributaries.



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




Distribution of Selected Species of Bird Wildlife



4. State House - located in Augusta; Charles Bulfinch, architect
5. State floral emblem - white pine cone and tassel
6. Maine is the largest of the New England states - nearly as large as the other five states put together.
7. One County, Aroostook (the northernmost), contains 6,453 square miles. This is an area bigger than the two New England states of Connecticut and Rhode Island combined.
8. West Quoddy Head is the easternmost point of the United States.
9. Lubec is the farthest east town in the United States.
10. From the top of Maine's highest mountain, Mount Katahdin, one can see more land and water than from any other known point of land in America.
11. Cadillac Mountain, in Bar Harbor, represents the highest elevation on the Atlantic Coast.
12. Maine has 17,425,000 acres of timberland, the largest forest area in the East.
13. Many historians believe that the Vikings spent the winter of 999 - 1000 A.D. somewhere along the Maine coast.
14. Sebastian Cabot visited here in 1496.
15. The French settled at St. Croix Island in 1604, which became the scene of this country's first Christmas tree.
16. The Popham colonists settled on the Kennebec in 1607 - 13 years before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock.
17. The first vessel we definitely know to have been built on the American continent was named Virginia, and she was constructed on the same Kennebec River in 1607.
18. Among Maine's first permanent settlements were Monhegan Island and Saco, which were settled in 1622 and 1623 respectively.
19. York, Maine, chartered in 1642, was the first chartered city in America.
20. The final papers making Maine a state were signed on March 15, 1820, at Jameson Tavern in Freeport.
21. The oldest public building in New England is the York goal, which is observing its 315th birthday in 1968.
22. York was also the location of the first pile bridge constructed in America. Built in 1761, that bridge is still standing.
23. America's first Liberty Pole was erected in Machias in 1775.
24. Benedict Arnold undertook his expedition to Quebec via the Kennebec River in 1775.
25. Maine has had one vice-president, Hannibal Hamlin, who served with Abraham Lincoln, 1861 - 1865.
26. James G. Blaine was Secretary of State in 1881, a candidate for president in 1884, and again Secretary of State from 1889 to 1892.
27. The former home of James G. Blaine is now the Executive Mansion, having been presented to the State in 1919 by Mrs. Harriet Blaine Beale as a memorial to her son, Walker Blaine Beale.
28. General Henry Knox, a Maine resident, was the first Secretary of War.
29. The first National Soldiers' Home was established at Togus in 1866.
30. The clipper ship Red Jacket, built at Rockland in 1854, made the fastest journey from New York to England of any clipper ship.
31. The first Federal Fish Hatchery, for propagating Atlantic Salmon, was established at Bucksport in 1872.
32. Melville Weston Fuller of Augusta was Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court from 1888 to 1910.
33. General Joshua L. Chamberlain of Brewer received the surrender of the Confederate Armies.

34. The "William P. Frye" built in Maine, was the first American ship sunk by the Germans during World War I.
35. The destroyer Lamson, also built in Maine, was the fastest ship of its type in the U. S. Navy in 1936.
36. During World War II the Bath Iron Works delivered 86 destroyers and the South Portland yards delivered 274 1000-ton cargo ships to the government.
37. The 74 gun ship-of-the-line Washington was launched in July 1815 at Kittery.
38. During the Civil War the Kittery yard built 26 vessels including 2 iron-clads and 18 steam sloops, one of which, the "Kearsarge", defeated the Confederate raider "Alabama".
39. The Treaty of Portsmouth, which ended the war between Russia and Japan in 1905, was signed in the present Kittery Shipyard Administration Building.
40. The first Navy-constructed submarine was launched at Kittery in 1917.
41. Approximately one-half of the submarine fleet that took part in World War II were designed at Kittery.
42. Kittery was also the first Naval Shipyard to build an atomic submarine, the U.S.S. Swordfish.
43. The replica of the famous yacht America was built at Boothbay in 1967.
44. The first ship to fly the Stars and Stripes, the Ranger, was built at Kittery in 1777.
45. Portland Head Light (1790) was the first on the Atlantic Coast.
46. Bowdoin College, a leading men's liberal arts college, was founded in 1794.
47. Robert P. T. Coffin (1892-1955) of Brunswick, a poet, was a Pulitzer Prize winner.
48. Walter Damrosch (1862-1950), noted Composer and Conductor, lived at Bar Harbor.
49. William Pitt Fessenden (1806-1869) of Portland was Secretary of the Treasury.
50. William P. Frye (1831-1911) of Lewiston was President Pro-Tem of the U. S. Senate in 1896.
51. Melville W. Fuller (1833-1910) of Augusta was Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court. - See 32.
52. Rockwell Kent, American artist, summered at Monhegan Island.
53. John D. Long (1838-1915) of Buckfield was Governor of Massachusetts and Secretary of the Navy.
54. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow (1807-1882), poet, lived in Portland.
55. Hugh MacCulloch (1808-1895) of Kennebunk was U. S. Secretary of the Treasury.
56. Rear Admiral Donald B. MacMillan, explorer, left from Boothbay Harbor.
57. Sir Hiram S. Maxim of Sangerville was the inventor of the machine gun.
58. Hudson Maxim, also of Sangerville, invented smokeless powder.
59. Edna St. Vincent Millay (1892-1950) of Rockland, poet, was a Pulitzer Prize winner.

64. Edward A. Robinson (1869-1935), of Head Tide, as a poet won the Pulitzer Prize three times.

74. During 1842 more lumber was shipped from Bangor than from any other city in the world.
75. The wood turning industry started in Maine in 1848 when R. D. Bartlett of Harmony patented a lathe for turning handles.
76. In 1865 a thread-spool plant was established at Lockes Mills.
77. The first use of wood for paper-making in Maine took place in 1868 in the basement of a sawmill at Topsham.
78. The first chemical pulp mill in Maine was built in 1872 at Yarmouth.
79. The Denison Manufacturing Company produced the first paper made entirely from wood in Canton in 1880.
80. The Eastern Manufacturing Company built the state's first sulfite mill at South Brewer in 1889.
