It is with respect and affection that the Maine Prescription Drug Advisory Commission dedicates its second annual report to John Marvin. John was a member of the Commission and its chair during the time in which the initial efforts were waged in the legislature around the Maine Rx Program and the Healthy Maine Prescriptions Program to bring health care to Maine people. His efforts to bring health care beyond his role as chairperson of the Commission are notable in that he was a pathfinder and explored dimensions of the provision of health care beyond what most of us ever dreamed. His leadership in creating the idea of the Maine Rx program, helping to draft the legislation, arguing for its passage and finally seeing the legislation passed with overwhelming support in both the Maine House and Senate was historic. This single effort has caused many other States to see that it was possible to overcome the objections of the prescription drug manufacturers and in a very real way has loosened the grip the drug manufacturers had on the pricing of drugs in Maine and the rest of the country. This is but one of the examples of the dimensions of John's dreaming.

John's contributions to Maine's senior citizens extend to general health care and working to reduce the high cost of health insurance, long-term care and home care for seniors. He successfully organized demonstrations to bring to the attention of the general public, legislators and our congressional delegation the serious plight of senior citizens. He was always mindful that many of our seniors are forced to choose between the high cost of life saving prescription drugs, food, heating oil and the other basics of life. It was his sense that this was a Hobson's Choice, i.e., no choice.

John Marvin, in no small way, put Maine's seniors on the map as considerations and determinations were made about allocations within the state budget. Seniors have gotten a larger share of the budget due to his tireless efforts on their behalf. More senior citizens are mindful of the debt owed John and will forever be grateful for what he has given to them.

John Marvin was a giant in his untiring efforts on behalf of Maine senior citizens and will be long remembered by his friends, Maine senior citizens and Prescription Drug Commission members.

John Marvin lived the words of Robert F. Kennedy, "Some men see things as they are and say why, I dream things that never were and say why not."

Prescription Drug Advisory Commission

The Drug Commission was established during the summer of 2000 to review access to and the pricing of prescription drugs for residents of the State. The Commission members met five times during 2001 on the following dates:

The Commissioner, or a member of his staff, provided updated information at each meeting on the implementation of various pharmacy benefits. There were also updates provided regarding the ongoing court cases involving the State of Maine, the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services and the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America. John Brautigam, Assistant Attorney General from the Attorney General's office provided an overview on the First Circuit Court of Appeals Hearing on the Maine Rx Program at the meeting held on March 15, 2001.

Discussions were held regarding the differences in prescription drug prices between Maine and Canada. Ann Head from Affiliated Health Care Services met with Commission members to provide information on the process used by that organization to assist citizens with procurement of prescription drugs through Canada. There are approximately 100 physicians in the State of Maine who are "cross" border licensed who write new prescriptions or prescribe maintenance medications for patients living in Maine for purchase in Canada.

Maine Rx Program

Background

Maine legislators introduced a bill, with 79 co-sponsors, to require that drug manufacturers lower prices for Maine residents to match those prevailing in Canada. Failure to do so would violate the state's Unfair Trade Practices Act. The original bill seemed to violate the U.S. Commerce Clause and with legal expertise was rewritten and a new draft was presented to the legislature. On May 11, 2000 the bill was signed into law. Public Law 1999, Chapter 786, An Act to Establish Fairer Pricing for Prescriptions Drugs established the Maine Rx Program and delegated the responsibility for administration of the program to the Department of Human Services.

The goal of the program is to provide immediate relief from the high cost of prescription drugs and to establish a formal process to negotiate the high cost of prescription drugs down to an affordable and accessible level. The

plan is to negotiate rebate agreements with drug manufacturers and to utilize these rebates to reduce prescription drug prices. If a drug company refuses to participate in this voluntary rebate program then the Commissioner may sanction the company in two ways:

1. By publicizing the company's refusal
2. By subjecting that company's products to the "prior authorization" requirements of the state's Medicaid Program.

Litigation

On August 10, 2000, the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America (PhRMA) filed a motion for preliminary injunction enjoining the operation of provision of this new Maine statute. PhRMA succeeded in obtaining an injunction from the local Federal District Court on October 26, 2000 forbidding the state from implementing the law. The Department of Human Services filed an appeal with the court regarding the ruling enjoining the Department from proceeding with enactment of the law. A hearing was held on March 5, 2001 in the First Circuit Court of Appeals regarding this injunction. On May 16, 2001, a three-member panel of the First Circuit Court of Appeals reversed the District Court, validated the law in most respects, but failed to lift the injunction pending further appeal. PhRMA then petitioned for Certiorari (a discretionary appeal) to the U.S. Supreme Court. On October 9, 2001, the Supreme Court issued a response inviting the U.S. Solicitor General to comment on whether the Court should hear the appeal.

After the Solicitor General files a brief, the Court will decide whether to hear the appeal. If PhRMA's request for appeal is denied, the law will stand and the Department of Human Services will proceed with implementation.

Implementation

The Department of Human Services has been unable to proceed with implementation of the Maine Rx Program pending resolution of the current litigation. An injunction is in effect until a ruling is issued in this case. If PhRMA's request for appeal is denied, the Department will move forward

with negotiating rebate agreements with drug manufacturers. Upon completion of these negotiations the Department will begin the process of providing educational outreach materials informing Maine's citizens of this new prescription drug discount benefit. Eligible members will be enrolled and will receive a prescription drug card allowing them to receive discount benefits at participating pharmacies. In order to be eligible to participate in the Maine Rx Program, the member must be a resident of the State of Maine. There are approximately 100,000 citizens who reside in the State of Maine, who do not qualify for other prescription drug discount benefits, who would be eligible for the Maine Rx Program.

Maine Prescription Drug Discount Program

Background

In January of 2001, the State of Maine obtained federal approval for the Maine Prescription Drug Discount Program, currently know as Healthy Maine Prescriptions. This waiver permits Maine to extend access to discount prescription drug prices to qualifying individuals with income at or below 300% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). With implementation of this benefit, the State of Maine is able to offer a 25% discount on prescription drug prices to approximately 225,000 Maine citizens who previously had no prescription drug benefits.

Income levels at or below 300% of the Federal Poverty Level are as follows:

\$755 would be added for each additional member.

As part of this approval, the Department transitioned the Maine Low Cost Drugs for the Elderly and Disabled Program as a covered benefit under this Waiver. This allows members with income at or below 185% FPL, age 62 or older, or age 19 or older and disabled a better benefit than previously received. These members previously were eligible for the state funded benefit which provides 80% coverage for prescription drugs for the following specific chronic medical conditions:

- Diabetes
- Heart Disease
- High Blood Pressure
- Chronic Lung Disease (also Emphysema and Asthma)
- Arthritis
- Anticoagulation
- Hyperlipidemia (High Cholesterol)
- Incontinence
- Thyroid Disease
- Osteoporosis (Bone Density Loss)
- Parkinson's Disease
- Glaucoma
- Multiple Sclerosis
- ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease)

The prescription drugs covered under this benefit were those provided by manufacturers with special agreements with Maine, all generic drugs, and drug expenditures over a \$1000 yearly catastrophic cap. With the integration of the low cost drugs, members with one of the covered chronic conditions have access to drugs of all manufacturers who have signed agreements with the federal government. These members also qualify for the 25% discount for prescription drugs not covered under the low cost drug benefit.

Litigation

In the fall of 2000, the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services granted a similar waiver to Vermont. PhRMA sued the Secretary of Health and

Human Services in Washington D.C. complaining that the Vermont waiver was beyond the authority of federal law. On January 17, 2001, the District Court upheld the Vermont waiver and denied PhRMA's request to enjoin the program; but PhRMA appealed to the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals.

On June 8, 2001, the D.C. Circuit Court overturned the lower court and ruled the Secretary had exceeded her statutory authority. Because Maine was not a party to this lawsuit, its program was not specifically enjoined; but PhRMA has filed a parallel legal proceeding that is still pending.

Implementation

During the start-up phase of this Waiver project, the Bureau of Medical Services contracted with an advertising agency to develop a logo and campaign. The name developed for this benefit was Healthy Maine Prescriptions (HMP). The following provides information on the outreach process used by the Bureau of Medical Services for this campaign.

- Enrollment brochures/applications were developed and distributed to all DHS offices, area agencies on aging, prime care provider offices, pharmacies, and hospitals in the State of Maine. Enrollment brochures are also available through the DHS web page.
- Posters and static clings were developed to provide information on HMP and give a toll-free number to call for additional information. These posters were made available to pharmacies, DHS offices and area agencies on aging.
- Television commercials were developed and ran during the months of May, June and July. These commercials ran on ten stations based out of Bangor, Portland and Presque Isle, Maine.
- Radio advertisements were developed and were aired during the months of May, June and July. These ads ran on eleven stations in three areas of the State – Augusta, Bangor and Portland.
- Newspaper advertisements were placed in six Maine newspapers during the same time period as the other advertisements.

- Informational brochures were developed and are mailed with HMP cards explaining benefits available through HMP.
- Staff from the Bureau of Medical Services provided informational training sessions for area agencies on aging, Department staff, pharmacies and hospitals. Informational sessions were held at elderly housing units in Auburn, Topsham, Richmond, Lisbon and Waldoboro in July and August. A training session was held at another contracted agency, Public Consulting Group, Inc., who has responsibility for providing information to consumers calling for information on multiple Medicaid covered services.
- The following are some of the organizations that have been very helpful in educating members with information on covered benefits, eligibility guidelines and have assisted with completion of applications.

Maine Council of Senior Citizens
Maine Equal Justice Project
Area Agencies on Aging

- The Bureau of Medical Services is in the process of hiring an additional staff person who will be able to provide outreach services throughout the State. This person will be able to meet with groups around the State to provide information and answer questions regarding pharmacy benefits and assist with problem resolution.

Enrollment for this new Waiver benefit is accomplished through several avenues.

- People interested in receiving this new discount benefit may mail an application to the Department of Human Services (DHS) office in Machias, Maine.
- Anyone known to the current DHS system, who is not eligible for full Medicaid coverage, are reviewed by DHS staff for eligibility of the HMP discount benefit.

- Applicants who are determined to be not eligible for full Medicaid benefits because of financial income are also being reviewed for eligibility for HMP. If financially eligible for HMP, the applicant receives a letter denying full Medicaid benefits but informing applicant of eligibility for HMP. A card and informational brochure are mailed to these members.
- Maine Revenue Services continues to process applications for the Low Cost Drug benefit. Information on eligible members is sent on a weekly basis to the Department of Human Services. This information is run through the current WELFRE system and cards with informational brochures are mailed out.
- Maine Revenue Services sends letters to applicants who do not qualify for the Low Cost Drug benefit. This letter denies coverage for the Low Cost Drug benefit and informs the applicant that their application information is being forwarded to DHS for review for eligibility of the HMP benefit. Information on these applicants is forwarded to DHS. If found eligible for HMP, the applicant is notified by letter of approval for the HMP benefit and a card with informational brochure is mailed out.
- Maine Revenue Services also provides financial information to the Department of Human Services on people applying for other State benefits such as tax and rent rebate. These applicants may also qualify for the HMP benefit. Once we receive this information, DHS reviews for financial eligibility for HMP benefits and if eligible sends letters informing people that, while they did not apply for this specific benefit, they are eligible and will be sent a card and informational brochure.

At the end of calendar year 2001, Maine has enrolled 108,559 members to receive the Healthy Maine Prescriptions (HMP) drug discount benefit. There are 36,938 of these members who are at or below 185% of the Federal Poverty Level, making them also eligible for the additional State-funded Low Cost Drug benefit.

The Department also has a toll free telephone line members may call to receive assistance. During this time, the Bureau of Medical Services received 9,124 telephone calls on the toll-free line for pharmacy services. Callers requested information on both the HMP and Low Cost Drug benefits. Callers were given information on the eligibility requirements for the low cost drug benefit. If they met the criteria for the low cost drug benefit, they were mailed applications for that benefit. Staff at the Bureau of Medical Services mailed out 758 Low Cost Drug applications. HMP applications were mailed to callers who were over the financial guidelines for low cost drugs but below the 300% FPL income guidelines for HMP. Staff mailed 4,427 HMP applications to people who were potentially eligible for the HMP discount benefit.

The Department's goal is to promote healthy communities and help protect the public's health and welfare in the State of Maine. With this in mind, the Bureau of Medical Services is mailing surveys to 50,000 members regarding their current health status. The Bureau of Medical Services has contracted with the Muskie Institute to provide an analysis of the survey results. The same members will be resurveyed in one year regarding any changes in health status due to the ability to purchase necessary prescription drugs. It is hoped that over time Maine will see a healthier population.

Pharmacy Benefit Management Services – Tri-State Coalition

The Governors of three New England states – Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont – met in early 2000 to share and discuss common concerns about rising prescription prices. A number of options to help their citizens save money on prescription costs were considered. A working group was appointed and after intensive study, the working group reported back that aggregate purchasing by the states could be beneficial. The working group recommended the recruitment of a pharmacy benefit manager (PBM). As a result, the Governors authorized the October 23, 2000 issuance of a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a PBM. First Health was selected as the vendor.

Though the RFP was sent to multiple agencies, there were no responders who were able to purchase medications at the price we currently pay through the Medicaid Program. None of the responders were able to offer a better deal than the State of Maine currently has for processing claims. The one area where there was a mutual benefit to all three States was Disease Management. The State of Maine is currently negotiating a contract with First Health to provide disease management services.

Summary

The Drug Advisory Commission and the Department of Human Services remain committed to assuring access to affordable prescription drugs for all Maine citizens. The Department proved this commitment by very aggressively pursuing implementation of Healthy Maine Prescriptions. Through this effort the State has been able to provide access to discounted prescription prices to over 100,000 citizens in a remarkably short period of time. Staff are committed to being very aggressive in the implementation of the Maine Rx if the court rules in the State's favor and lifts the injunction currently in place.

Recommendations

The Commission recommends the following:

- The Department of Human Services should continue to pursue implementation of the Maine Rx Program.
- The Legislature should continue to fund the Low Cost Drugs for the Elderly and Disabled Program.
- The Legislature should approve and fund the addition of cancer drugs to the list of covered prescription drugs under the Low Cost Drugs for the Elderly and Disabled Program.

One answer for our citizens is action by Medicare to provide savings. There should be Federal actions taken to assist in this area. The Legislature is urged to pass legislative resolution expressing sentiment urging Maine's Congressional Delegation to add prescription drug benefits under Medicare to Federal laws.

The Legislature should consider a bill proposing the requirement that pharmaceutical representatives disclose marketing cost for all prescription drugs.
