

Dear Senator Paradis and Representative Tardy:

Public Laws of 1993, chapter 413, section 5, called for six of the "commodity" agencies of State Government to "... conduct studies of their respective organizations that examine alternative models of organizing their functions in a way so as to maximize services to the populations each organization serves." That legislation went on to require each of the six agencies to report to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs "... no later than January 4, 1994, with their findings and recommendations, including any draft legislation." A copy of PL 1993, c. 413 is enclosed for your review.

On January 20, 1994, the Appropriations Committee met with the six commodity agencies to review their reports and discuss whatever legislation might be needed. At the conclusion of that meeting, a motion was made, and accepted, that the reports and any proposed legislation, be referred to your committee for its review and action. The Appropriations Committee members believe committee recommendations to the Second Regular Session of the 116th Legislature are more properly the responsibility of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture.

Enclosed for your review are the reports from the Maine Blueberry Commission, the Maine Potato Board, the Maine Dairy Promotion Board and the Maine Dairy and Nutrition Council. In the near future two bills will be printed that would implement the recommendations in those reports requesting legislative changes to their current enabling legislation. The first bill will involve minor changes requested by the Maine Potato Board. The second bill will involve the changes requested by both the Maine Dairy Promotion Board and the Maine Dairy and Nutrition Council. It is our understanding the Maine Blueberry Commission is not seeking legislative changes at this time.



Maine Blueberry Commission Report to the Joint Standing Committee On Appropriations and Financial Affairs January 4, 1994

The Maine Blueberry Commission, at the request of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, conducted a study of our organization. This study examined alternative models of organizing our functions to maximize services to the population our organization serves. We explored the feasibility of entirely separating from State Government and continuing in State Government as a quasi-independent agency such that all employees would leave state service and become employees of their respective organizations.

The conclusion of the Commission, by unanimous vote, is to maintain our current organizational structure until such time that clear improvement will be gained by change.

While the Commission acknowledges a less than perfect structure, it is not clear alternative structures will serve our industry or the public better. There is the distinct possibility that alternate structures could be less effective.

The Commission has operated in a productive partnership with the State since 1945. The relationship continues to be successful for the industry and has provided Maine with a strong economic and community base. The Maine blueberry industry has more than tripled its production and economic value in the last twelve years. A very important part of this success is the State/Commission partnership that provides funding for research, education, promotion, and other services to the industry.

The Commission thanks the Legislature for this opportunity to review our relationship with the State. We will continue to monitor this relationship and request change when and if it will clearly result in more effective delivery of services.

An Act to Maintain the Integrity of Commodity Tax Accounts

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, a commodity tax is levied and imposed on a specific industry to benefit that industry; and

Whereas, a commodity tax funds programs essential to maintaining the viability of the industry; and

Whereas, reduction in funding to these programs is detrimental to these industries and impacts the overall economic health of the State; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. PL 1991, c. 780, Pt. WW, §2 is amended to read:

Sec. WW-2. Calculation; transfer. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1585, the State Budget Officer shall calculate the amount in sections 4 to 9 of this Part that applies against each General Fund, Highway Fund, Federal Expenditure, Other Special Revenue, internal service fund and enterprise fund

account for all departments and agencies based on the total General Fund appropriations and various allocations to those accounts. The State Budget Officer shall cause the calculated amount to be transferred from each account, except that savings achieved in the Maine Blueberry Commission, the Maine Potato Board, the Maine Sardine Council, the Maine Dairy Promotion Board, the Maine Dairy and Nutrition Council and the Lobster Promotion Council as a result of the reduced weekly work schedule may not be transferred and must remain available for other purposes.
