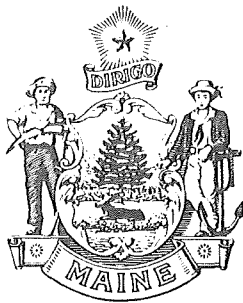

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## Background

In 1961 President Kennedy established the first President's Commission on the Status of Women. The Commission studied the issue of women in our society, and in 1963 President Kennedy recommended that each state form state commissions on the Status of Women. Maine was the first state in the Northeast to form such a commission. Governor John Reed in 1964 appointed the first Council on the Status of Women; and the Council has been active in the State of Maine since that time.

Every state and also Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands have created commissions on the Status of Women. There is an Interstate Association of Commissions on the Status of Women with offices in Washington D.C. The Commissions have affiliations with the United Nations and other groups working for the improvement in the Status of Women through the Interstate Association.

## Statutory Authority

The Council on the Status of Women has seventeen members all appointed by the Governor to serve a two-year term. The Governor also appoints the chairman and vice-chairman. *"Citizens who are currently providing leadership in status of women programs on the state and local level"* shall receive consideration for appointment, according to the statute. All members including the chairman and vice-chairman serve on a volunteer basis. They receive only travel expenses for meetings attended. The council has received about \$2,000 a year from the Legislature for its activities.

As each new council has been appointed, the Governor historically has given the council a charge. This charge has provided the basis upon which the two-year program of the council has been developed. In 1965 the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women published a report "Maine Women" which contained recommendations in the areas of Employment Policies in State Government and in the private sector, labor and social legislation, political and legal rights, education, home and community, including day care. In 1971 the Council published a report entitled "Maine Women" which focused on Families in Poverty. The report contains 37 recommendations.

## 1973-75 Council

In November, 1973, Governor Curtis appointed the present Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women. He appointed Shirley Elias Ezzy of Augusta, Chairman, and Nancy Clark of Freeport, Vice-Chairman. At the swearing in ceremonies, Governor Curtis gave the Council three charges:

1. work for passage of the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution by the State Legislature,
2. create a statewide Talent Bank of Maine women for appointment to State Boards and Commissions, and
3. prepare a legislative programs responsive to the needs of Maine women for the 107th Legislature. (Governor Curtis' address to the Council can be found in appendix.)

## Activities and Programs, November, 1973-January, 1975

The following is a brief description of the activities of the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women.

### The Equal Rights Amendment

During the Special Session of the 106th Legislature, Governor Curtis again asked the Maine Legislature to pass this Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The Council promoted the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment in a variety of ways including the following:

- a.) provided information about E.R.A. to the Legislators and others.
- b.) co-hosted a Blaine House breakfast for women legislators with Governor and Mrs. Curtis.
- c.) Held a coffee for legislators and women who worked at the State House.
- d.) hosted a breakfast for U.S. Congresswoman Martha Griffiths who sponsored the Equal Rights Amendment in Congress.

e.) testified in support of the Equal Rights Amendment at the public hearing held by the State Government Committee.

On January 18, 1974 the Maine Legislature passed the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Maine was the Thirty-first State to pass the E.R.A. Thirty-eight States must adopt the Amendment before it becomes part of the U.S. Constitution.

### The Statewide Talent Bank

The Talent Bank is a listing of women who have expressed interest in serving on State Boards and Commissions. The Talent Bank contains names, addresses, background information, and the areas of interest of each woman who participates.

The Council developed four criteria for its Talent Bank. The first was that the Talent Bank would be used as a resource to get more women appointed to State Boards and Commissions. These are policy-making and advisory groups with varying amounts of authority. Members are appointed by the Governor if the appointment is a "personal" one or by the Governor with the approval of the Executive Council if the appointment is a "miscellaneous" one. These appointments are not jobs although some Boards pay per diem to their members on the days in which they meet.

A second criteria was that the Talent Bank would not be used to promote particular women for openings. Our goal was to increase the number of women serving on State Boards and Commissions rather than serve as an advocate for a specific female candidate. The names of all women who met minimum qualifications would be forwarded to the Governor for his consideration.

Maine statutes specify the background required for members of some boards and commissions. The *Administrative Directory* contains a listing of all state boards and commissions, their composition, and the qualifications, if any, required for each. The Directory was a valuable resource to the Council in determining minimum qualifications for vacancies. As women sent letters and resumes to the Talent Bank the Council screened the candidates to deter-

mine whether each possessed the minimum qualifications in her area of interest. Our third criteria then was that participants would be screened and only the names of women who met minimum qualifications would be forwarded to the Governor. Many boards and Commissions do not require a particular background for membership. In those cases, the names of all women who expressed interest would be forwarded to the Governor.

In January the Secretary of State's Office publishes a list of the vacancies which will occur on state boards and commissions requiring gubernatorial appointment for the coming year. The fourth criteria for the Talent Bank was that the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women would set priorities on the boards and commissions for which we would recruit candidates. We chose boards which had some particular significance to women and sought candidates for those vacancies.

Initially names were acquired for the Talent Bank by use of the media—radio, television, and newspapers. We announced vacancies on particular state boards and commissions and asked women to send us a resume or a letter if they were interested in serving. In addition, word-of-mouth, contact with other women's groups, and speaking engagements all helped to inform women about the Talent Bank and the current vacancies.

Our plans were to computerize the information in the Talent Bank file, to present the names of women candidates for every vacancy that occurred rather than the limited number originally chosen by the council, and to invite every woman in the State of Maine to participate in the Talent Bank. This expansion we referred to as Phase II of the Talent Bank Project. Several steps were taken to reach the goals of Phase II. They were as follows:

- a.) The council obtained an additional \$1,500 from the Special Session of the 106th Legislature.
- b.) A contract was negotiated with ARCO, Inc. to develop a statewide distribution system for the Talent Bank project.

c.) A contract was negotiated with Central Computer Service to provide the hardware and software for the Talent Bank project.

d.) and a standard Talent Bank Form was developed so that data would be collected in a uniform manner and be easily transferred to computer.

### The Legislative Program

For the first time in the history of the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women in Maine, the Council developed a legislative program for both the Special Session of the 106th Legislature and the regular session of the 107th Legislature. The Special Session Program consisted of:

- a.) supporting and testifying for passage of the Equal Rights Amendment,
- b.) a request for an additional sum of money to assist the Council in carrying out its 1973-75 program.
- c.) a bill to reconstitute the council and to provide it with full-time staff for the first time.

The major effort, however, was placed on the development of the legislative program for the 107th Legislature consistent with our charge from Governor Curtis to develop such a program responsive to the needs and concerns of Maine women. In the fall of 1974 three public hearings were held by the Council. The first was held in Augusta on September 25; the second in Presque Isle on October 16; and a third informal hearing was held at H.O.M.E., Inc. in Orland on November 7, 1974. A list of those people who testified at the Augusta, Presque Isle, and Orland hearings is enclosed. Many topics were raised at the public hearings (see attached list). After the hearings Council members were asked to rate the topics according to priority for our legislative program.

In addition to the hearings the council conducted research on some of the issues to prepare for the legislative program. Especially significant was the research done by Law Professor Judy Potter, a member of the council. She reviewed the Maine Statute to determine which laws are in violation of the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act. The results of this research is an Omnibus Bill which will bring Maine laws in line with these Federal laws. This research will be published by the council later this year.

The Women's Law Association of the University of Maine Law School offered their assistance to the council in the preparation of the legislative program. Several meetings were held with the law students and with the council members to finalize the program.

The council divided its legislative activities into three areas:

1. those bills which we drafted and found sponsors for,
2. those bills which we will assist in drafting with other groups,
3. and those bills which we will support or oppose which are of particular concern to women.

The bills which the council finally submitted as its legislative package were:

1. The Ominbus Bill described above.
2. a bill requiring affirmative action in state government,
3. a bill requiring that federal and state monies going to local school systems be spent in an equitable and non-discriminatory way. This is an amendment to L.D. 1994.
4. a bill creating a citizens day care advisory committee with authority to establish guidelines and licensing criteria for day care, and
5. a bill to reconstitute the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women.

#### **Other Activities**

The council participated in a number of additional activities which related to their overall goals. They included the following:

#### **a.) Bi-Partisan Workshop for Women Candidates**

The Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women organized the first bi-partisan candidates workshop for women who were running in the primaries for the State Legislature and the U.S. Congress in the State of Maine. Fifty-five women were running for major political office in the State: One candidate for Congress, seven candidates for the Maine Senate, and forty-seven candidates for the Maine House. A copy of the workshop program is attached as well as a list of the biographies of the women candidates who participated.

#### **b.) Federal Grant for Full-time Staff**

Another important first for the council was the acquisition of a federal grant which would provide funds to hire the first full-time staff for the council. In the fall of 1974, the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women applied for a grant under the Concentrated Employment and Training Act program. The council was awarded approximately \$17,000 to hire an executive director and a secretary. Following equal employment opportunity guidelines, the council advertised throughout the state and set up a committee to interview candidates for the position of executive director. Staff were hired in December and the first office for the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women was set up at the State House.

#### **c.) Training Proposal**

The Council also submitted a second proposal to CETA to recruit women for training programs in non-traditional occupations. This proposal is still under consideration by the State CETA Advisory Board.

#### **d.) Speaking Engagements**

The Chairman of the Council and council members spoke to a number of groups around the State about the goals of our

## APPENDIX B

### REMARKS BY GOVERNOR KENNETH M. CURTIS TO THE GOVERNOR'S ADVISORY COUNCIL ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN NOVEMBER 5, 1973 AUGUSTA, MAINE

It is a real pleasure for me to be here with you today.

I wish to thank each of you for your willingness to accept membership on this council ... the Advisory Council.

The performance of this Advisory Council on the Status of Women will be watched more closely than any previous committee concerning the interests of women.

Since my inauguration as Governor in January, 1967, there have been tremendous changes in the status of women in our society.

We now have significant new federal and State legislation such as the Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972 and my Executive Order 11, Code of Fair Practices, and others which make it illegal to discriminate against women in the area of employment and education.

A significant number of national, State and local women's rights organizations have been started and many of these are substantially impacting the social, political and economic thought and action in our society today.

Several national and regional periodicals devoted exclusively to women's rights and the changing role of women are on our newsstands and in our homes.

And yet, in spite of this "peaceful revolution" we find that we still have a long way to go to assure women have full citizenship and equal status in our society.

Throughout the nation, States have been deliberating over the adoption of an amendment to the U.S. Constitution which would guarantee that

*"Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."*

The debate in Maine has been long and spirited, and the issue will once again come before the Maine Legislature in January 1974.

As a first charge to the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women, I urge you to work for passage of the Equal Rights Amendment in Maine.

The special needs and concerns of women in our State should be given higher priority by our State and local governments and our educational institutions.

To this end, I am asking you to determine the special needs of women in relation to our laws in the State of Maine and then to prepare a legislative program directed toward meeting those needs for the next regular session of legislature.

Women are still under-represented among political officeholders on many councils and commissions, and in many job areas at the national, State and local government levels.

To remedy this lack of representation among women, I urge the Governor's Advisory Council on the Status of Women to encourage women to run for public office, to participate on our councils and boards and to seek employment in the public interest.

One of the ways this can be done is through the development of a Talent Bank.

The Council should also seek out grant money to fund projects which are of particular interest to

women in Maine.

Each of you has a contribution to make.

During the next two years, I feel confident that we will see substantial progress toward improving the status of women.

I look forward to working with you in your endeavors.
