## HARRIET P. HENRY CENTER FOR THE BOOK

The Maine Humanities Council is home to the Harriet P. Henry Center for the Book, Maine's affiliate for the Center for the Book in the Library of Congress. The Library of Congress Center for the Book was established in 1977 to promote books, reading, libraries, and literacy. In 1997 the Maine Humanities Council established the Maine Center for the Book as a state affiliate of that program. It was renamed the Harriet P. Henry Center for the Book in 2003, in honor of Maine's first female judge, a former Board chair of MHC and a longtime supporter of the humanities.

In 2024, Maine Humanities focused on expansion and relationship-building, and we basked in the byproduct of this focus: connection and stories. Our staff stretched out across the state, connecting with new contacts and familiar partners. In the summer, a group of us spent a week in the St. John Valley, where we met long-time supporters and cultural workers. We visited cultural institutions across Northern Aroostook County, including historical societies, adult education centers, and libraries. We also spent time with staff at both the Mi'kmaq and Maliseet Nations, and visited the new Mi'kmaq community space that opened this year just in time for their Mawiomi. We enjoyed spending time in Fort Kent, Saint Agatha, New Sweden, Frenchville, and the other towns we visited. We connected through shared storytelling, learning about the Acadian history in the region and about how cross-border relationships have drastically shifted in recent times.

Our staff also made good connections in Bar Harbor, Chebeague Island, Scarborough, Bath, Trescott, Bangor, Presque Isle, and several towns in Lincoln County. On these visits, we were also graced with stories. We heard stories about how people made their way into humanities work; stories about the emergence of their organizations and how significant their organization has been to the community it serves; stories about the deep community connections in those areas and how people thrive together. With every visit we made, we were reminded about the powerful connective work of the humanities and the pressing need for that work right now and into the unknown future.

In 2025, we'll continue to expand; we'll continue to reach out and draw you all nearer to us. We'll continue to create and deliver accessible programming that shares Maine stories. We'll continue to support Maine's cultural work and economy through our grants programs, and we'll keep working to make useful and meaningful connections with organizations we fund.





## OVER 6,500 BOOKS READ

Texts of all kinds — stories long and short, poems, essays, illustrated books, and more — are essential for Maine Humanities participants to develop a sense of connection, agency, and engagement in our programs.

2024 included more than 90 facilitated Discussion Projects, over 60 participating Read ME libraries, Readers Retreat, representing Maine at the Library of Congress National Book Festival, and many more examples of a fundamental component of our work: people gathering to discuss a book they have all read.

## 19 TOWNS, 19 STORIES

### *Beyond Addiction in Lincoln County*

#### MAJOR GRANT - \$7,500

A project of Studio B, “19 Towns, 19 Stories” provided a platform for Lincoln County residents grappling with the impact of addiction, overdose, and death to share their untold stories. Using a community-led process, Studio B identified storytellers and worked with local organizations to host programs in every town in Lincoln County. These 19 events allowed members of every town to share personal stories and discuss the effects of Substance Use Disorder on individuals, families, and communities. The narratives and photographs of each person sharing their story will be included in an upcoming book and traveling and on-line exhibitions.

## Constance H. Carlson PUBLIC HUMANITIES PRIZE

**MYRON M. BEASLEY, PhD.

Last year Maine Humanities awarded the 10th Constance H. Carlson Public Humanities Prize to Maya Williams and Myron M. Beasley, PhD. Maya Williams, Portland's seventh Poet Laureate, was awarded the prize for their creation of safe spaces for discussion and art, ensuring that people engage with empathy, community, and understanding. Myron M. Beasley, PhD., Associate Professor of American Studies and Gender and Sexuality Studies at Bates College, was awarded the prize for his innovative leadership in conversations around art, his care in connecting audiences, and the breadth and depth he brings to his creative projects.

Named for the first female president of a public university in Maine, the Constance H. Carlson Public Humanities Prize was first awarded in 1998. Prize recipients are chosen in alignment with the Maine Humanities Council's Prize Criteria, Equity Statement, and Strategic Plan. 2024's prizes were awarded during a ceremony on Wednesday, May 8 at the Equality Community Center in Portland.
