SUMMARY: Revises the existing statutes dealing with the inspection, registration and abandonment of dams and the setting of water levels and to transfer the administration of these statutes from the Department of Agriculture Food & Rural Resources to the Department of Environmental Protection.

Enacted in New Draft as LD 1721 (PL 1983 c 458)

SUMMARY: In passing this bill, the Legislature decided that a policy concerning the future care and development of Maine's rivers and streams was necessary to strike a balance among the various, and sometimes conflicting, user of those waterways. In order to implement this policy the Legislature found it appropriate to:

prohibit the permitting or licensing of new dams on 1,051 miles
