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

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SUMMARY:

This law provides greater flexibility and additional authority to the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources in emergency situations involving the adulteration of or tampering with food products, including a different fine schedule when adulteration is found to be intentional. The department did not have adequate authority to protect the public from a potential health threat, especially the immediate removal from sale of adulterated or tampered
