SUMMARY:

Since 1974 the Bureau of Rehabilitation has provided leadership in establishing necessary services for the deaf and hearing impaired other than those generally provided by the vocational rehabilitation program. The Bureau currently provides vocational rehabilitation services, interpreter services, telecommunications devices for the deaf, identification cards for individuals, hearing ear dogs, a registry of deaf persons, information and referral services, and advocacy on behalf of deaf persons.

This bill established a Division of Deafness within the Bureau as a focal point for those activities. It also codified the responsibilities of the newly created Division, including the registry for deaf persons.

The committee amendment (S-53) added language to ensure that the registry maintained by the department is a voluntary listing of individuals and that no one is required to be listed on the registry.
