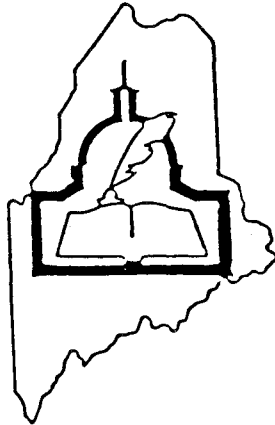

SUMMARY:

The bill would have imposed a maximum drag size on equipment used to harvest shellfish within an aquaculture lease. The bill would have further required that all harvested material for an aquaculture site be washed onsite. The majority of the committee felt that the bill would impose unreasonable restrictions on the aquaculture industry.

SUMMARY:

The bill removes a provision of the scallop license statute that allows crew members of boat to engage in hand harvesting of scallops under the authority of a single license. The effect of the change is to require all crew members directly engaged in harvesting (particularly divers) to hold a commercial hand fishing scallop license.

SUMMARY:

The original bill banned the use of "spurs" or other line cutting gear attached to boat propellers. The bill received a majority ought not to pass report. However, the House accepted the minority ought to pass report. The Senate accepted the majority report. A committee of conference recommended an amended version which allowed use of the cutting gear only if the gear was enclosed in a protective cage such has been traditionally used on lobster boats. The Governor vetoed the bill primarily on the grounds that it was unenforceable.

SUMMARY:

The bill proposed a ban on night scalloping within three miles of the coast during the month of November, the first month of the scallop season. The committee granted the sponsor leave to withdraw on the grounds that existing DMR regulatory efforts adequately addressed the gear conflict issues in question.
