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

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature, covering the First Regular Session of the 112th Legislature. The summaries are arranged by LD number and indexed separately by committee.

- 4. That the person holding containers purchased out-of-state affix to the container the sticker provided by the board;

Section 2 fulfills the requirement of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 1471-Q, subsection 3, that the Legislature adopt rules of the board establishing fees for container deposits.

SUMMARY:

This law amends the statute pertaining to minimum standards for planting seed potatoes in the State by requiring that all seed planted must have been certified in accordance with the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. It gives the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources the power to issue subpoenas to potato growers to compel them to deliver reports and records to confirm the kind of seed planted and it authorizes the department to formulate rules designed to increase enforcement capability. Finally, it also changes the penalty for violation of the law from \$20 and a maximum of \$100 an acre.

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SUMMARY:

This law confirms and amplifies upon the authority of the Maine State Harness Racing Commission to award racing dates to qualified applicants under existing law. The original bill listed the criteria by which racing dates are to be assigned and specifically included among them guidelines for

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the scheduling of overlapping race meets at the State's major tracks.

Concurrent racing at Scarboro and Lewiston Raceways was a major source of contention and the issue was resolved in committee amendment "A", the majority report (H-162), by restricting new concurrent racing to a trial (8 Day) period following an evaluation of its impact on the economic health of the industry.

SUMMARY:

This law establishes a process whereby the agricultural development programs of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources will be redirected to better address the differing agricultural needs and opportunities in various regions of the State and thereby to assist the agricultural community in responding appropriately to changing opportunities. It recognizes that agriculture is an important component of the State's rural economy and that the production and marketing opportunities for agriculture vary by region in accordance with differences in climate, soil, availability and cost of productive land and other production inputs, access to service, supply and marketing infrastructures and proximity to markets.

It provides for the redirection of state agricultural programs to reflect regional differences in agricultural needs and opportunities, guided by input from the local communities to be affected by the redirection. It provides for the identification of local lead agencies, giving preference to the 16 Soil and Water Conservation Districts, to collect local data, hold hearings and conduct meetings to
