This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature, covering the Second Regular Session of the 112th Legislature. The summaries are arranged by LD number under each committee.

All Amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor if it is a floor amendment or the designation "CA" if it is a committee amendment. If the amendment was adopted in the House, the letter H appears after the sponsor. If it was adopted in the Senate, the letter S appears.

Final action for each bill is listed to the right of the title. If final House action and Senate action differ, both are listed.

<u>SUMMARY:</u> The Committee reported out a new draft (LD 1615) during the First Regular Session which was enacted by the Legislature but held by the Governor. The new draft was recommitted to Committee in January, and another new draft (LD 2281) was reported out.

<u>SUMMARY:</u> This bill was submitted in response to the Supreme Judicial Court of Maine decision in <u>State v.</u>
<u>Freeman</u> which struck down the civil operating under the influence provisions as unconstitutional. This proposal reinstates a civil OUI offense by requiring the police officer to determine whether or not arresting the driver at the scene is appropriate. The bill was carried-over from the First Regular Session for redrafting.

The new draft reinstates a civil OUI offense, allowing the first offender to choose, in certain situations, to have a criminal trial on the criminal OUI offense, or a civil trial on a lesser civil offense.

The Committee chose to not amend the OUI laws again, believing that the current system is working well enough that no changes are absolutely necessary.

<u>SUMMARY:</u> This resolve authorizes Colwell Construction Company, Inc., to sue the State to solve a dispute over payment for work done for the State.

The Committee Amendment (Majority report) authorizes Colwell to enter into binding arbitration with the State to resolve the dispute.

The resolve was finally passed as amended during the First Regular Session, but the Governor held the resolve. The Legislature called back the resolve and indefinitely postponed it after the dispute was settled.

<u>SUMMARY:</u> Current law requires municipal officers to license catering services on a case-by-case basis. This bill allows the municipal officers to designate another person to approve these licenses.
