This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature, covering the Second Regular Session of the 112th Legislature. The summaries are arranged by LD number under each committee.

All Amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor if it is a floor amendment or the designation "CA" if it is a committee amendment. If the amendment was adopted in the House, the letter H appears after the sponsor. If it was adopted in the Senate, the letter S appears. . . . .

Final action for each bill is listed to the right of the title. If final House action and Senate action differ, both are listed.

<u>SUMMARY:</u> L.D. 2033 corrects several ambiguities or errors that exist in present workers' compensation law. The bill set the salary range of Assistant Rehabilitation Administrators at salary range 81; corrected conflicted statutory language regarding major policy-influencing positions at the Workers' Compensation Commission; provided a definition of "sheltered workshop" which had been repealed in another section of the statutes; corrected a technical conflict involving the salary range of employee assistants; and provided for the appointment of Assistant Rehabilitation Administrators rather than having their employment fall under the state personnel system guidelines.

Committee Amendment A (H-560) deleted all references to Assistant Rehabilitation Administrators since the Personnel Department had already taken action regarding their status.

If an employee was not paid within one week of the informal conference, and he later recovered benefits, the employer would have to reimburse the employee for any housing or personal possessions repossessed or insurance coverage lost on account of the delay in receiving benefits. SUMMARY: L.D. 2017 extended the maximum length of time in which a person could draw unemployment benefits for up to 26 additional weeks as long as that person was in an approved training program; these benefits would not be paid if the person were eligible for similar federally-funded benefits.
