LD AN ACT TO AMEND THE TEACHER CERTIFICATION LAW. ND LD 1839

SUMMARY: The bill dealt with the method of calculating quality incentive adjustments under the School Finance Act. The proposal was to use the pupil count in the base year rather than the calendar year in computing the grant. Using the calendar year is a disadvantage to school units with increasing populations. The problem was referred to the Governor's task force on school funding.

LD AN ACT TO ALLOW ON-SITE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS LVWD 646 AT PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS.

Sponsor: KIMBALL, Rolde, Gill, Pray Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: The bill would have provided for reimbursement by the local school unit to private schools providing educational programs to hospitalized students who are unable to attend school in the unit, if there is a contract approved by the commissioner for these services. The department opposed the bill as unnecessary and lacking safeguards for the local school unit to have a say in the development of the child's educational program. After a series of meetings by the interested parties, it appeared that a reasonable administrative approach was being worked out. The committee by letter directed the parties to continue negotiations and to keep the committee informed.
