SUMMARY: Current law allows a candidate to attend voting places and orally communicate with voters as long as the candidate does not attempt to influence votes. This bill would prohibit the candidate from appearing at the polls except to vote. When the candidate is there to vote, he or she would not be permitted to wear any campaign pin or button, distribute literature, speak or otherwise communicate with voters.

LD 771 AN ACT RELATING TO THE DISTANCE REQUIREMENTS TO OPERATE AN AGENCY STORE UNDER THE LIQUOR LAWS

Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: Current law prohibits the location of a state liquor store within 300 feet of a church or school. State Liquor Commission rules extend the prohibition to agency liquor stores as well. In addition, the law prohibits the location of an on-premise licensee within 300 feet of a church or school unless the State Liquor Commission unanimously agrees.

The purpose of this bill was to delete the prohibition on agency stores. The bill would actually remove the requirement for on-premise establishments. (This issue was addressed in LD 1842.)

LD AN ACT TO REQUIRE EMPLOYERS TO GIVE EMPLOYEES
777 4 HOURS LEAVE ON ELECTION DAY FOR THE PURPOSE
OF VOTING

Sponsor: BAKER, Handy Committee Report: ONTP

SUMMARY: This bill, requiring employers to give employees 4 consecutive hours to vote in any statewide election, was modeled on federal Canadian law. Under this bill, time to vote is to be allowed at the convenience of the employer and the employee may not be penalized or lose pay as a result of his or her absence from work during any part or all of the 4 consecutive hours allowed. An employer who interferes with the granting of the hours to vote would be subject to a forfeiture of up to \$100.
