SUMMARY: This bill establishes a requirement for an archery hunter training program to cover skills, safety, laws, rights and wildlife management. The Commissioner shall develop the program and may charge up to \$10 per person to defray program costs. This program will be modeled after those in place for hunting and trapping. The committee amendment inserted a \$2000 allocation section into the bill and House Amendment (H-170) corrected an allocation provision.

LD AN ACT CONCERNING THE HUNTING OF ANTLERLESS 1304 DEER BY CERTAIN PROPERTY OWNERS.

LVWD

Sponsor: MATTHEWS Z, Erwin E, Weymouth, Duffy Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: This bill would have allowed a landowner with more than 25 contiguous acres to take an antlerless deer on that property. The bill was introduced as an incentive to keep more land from being posted to prohibit hunting. The opponents to the bill noted difficulties in enforcement, management and the definition of landowner. Again, the Department recognizes that there are increasing conflicts between landowners and hunters but does not feel that a preference system is the way to ameliorate them.

LD 1322

AN ACT TO ENABLE HUNTING FOR THE DISABLED.

Sponsor: MELENDY, Kilkelly, Smith, Erwin P Committee Report: ONTP

SUMMARY: The intent of LD 1322 was to give the commissioner the authority to permit disabled residents of the State to hunt from the roadside. Estimates are that this would apply to about 3000 people. Opponents to the bill sited that the definition of disabled was too broad, that hunting from paved public ways created safety hazards, and that handicapped residents already are allowed to hunt from parked vehicles on unpaved roads.
