SUMMARY

The transactions outlined in this resolve involve conveyances of three small parcels of public lands. Two of the agreements call for the sale of land with no special public use potential at fair market value. The other transaction allows for a public road relocation adjacent to an existing parcel of public land to correct a safety problem. All money received as the result of these transactions will be deposited in the Public Reserved Lands Acquisition Fund and used to acquire land of greater interest to the public.

A Senate amendment (S-207) adds a fiscal note to the bill.

SUMMARY

The transaction outlined in this resolve involves the conveyance of any interest the State of Maine may have acquired in land by escheat from the estate of Beryl Hooper in order to resolve a title defect in the property. The City of Biddeford had a tax lien on this property many years ago. When the owner died, the city thought it had acquired ownership. Unfortunately, the property had escheated to the State. The city was not aware of this fact and for many years had assumed they had clear title to the property. The parcel abuts or is part of the city's landfill.

A committee amendment (S-284) makes clear that the State is not to be held liable for any problems on the parcel that is being transferred. It also allows the State to collect \$45,500 for the parcel and requires the City of Biddeford to pay costs associated with the sale of the property. The amendment also adds a fiscal note.
