SUMMARY

This bill makes desecration of a cemetery a Class C crime and authorizes a court to require a person convicted of this crime to make restitution to the municipality or cemetery association whose cemetery was ransacked.

Committee Amendment "A" replaces the bill and makes it a Class E crime to enter or remain in a cemetery after dark unless the cemetery's open hours have been extended by the municipality or private organization that operates the cemetery. The amendment also changes the title and adds an emergency clause and preamble.

House Amendment "A" clarifies language added by Committee Amendment "A".

This resolve allows Philip Wolley to bring suit against the State. Mr. Wolley was accused of misappropriation of funds and discharged from his position with the State Lottery Commission. The charges against Mr. Wolley were dismissed due to insufficient evidence.

SUMMARY

This bill authorizes a court to impose a greater penalty, up to double the maximum penalty for OUI, on a person convicted of OUI if that person was operating the vehicle with a minor passenger.

Committee Amendment "A" replaces the bill. The amendment subjects a person convicted of OUI to mandatory minimum penalties of 2 days incarceration, \$300 fine and loss of license for 90 days if that person was operating a vehicle with a passenger under 16 years of age. The amendment also allows the Secretary of State to suspend the driver's license of a person convicted of OUI with a minor passenger for an additional 275 days.
