SUMMARY

The original bill sought to prohibit the Public Utilities Commission from issuing any rule or order that would interfere with collective bargaining rights established under the federal Labor Management Relations Act. As amended (H-57) the bill prohibits the commission from requiring a local exchange carrier (LEC) to consider competitive bids on the construction of interexchange facilities. The bill, as amended, is specifically aimed at commission rule 280, section 6(C) which required an LEC to put out to bid construction projects for interexchange facilities costing more than \$250,000. The language of the amended bill was arrived at by negotiation between union representatives and representatives of the commission and the Office of the Public Advocate.

SUMMARY

The original bill sought to prohibit the installation of any electric space heating systems after January 1, 1992. The bill also sought to hold harmless any recipient of a low-income fuel assistance payment for heating costs in excess of those covered by the fuel assistance payment if the recipient were a tenant living in an electrically heated dwelling. The bill, as amended (H-249), requires landlords to provide to prospective tenants of primary residence rental units that are individually metered and that are heated by a primary electric space heating system information on electricity costs and kilowatt-hour consumption for the unit for the prior calendar year. Landlords are required to provide the information to prospective tenants before entering into a lease or rental agreement. Electric utilities are required to provide the information to landlords on request on forms prescribed by the Public Utilities Commission.
