This bill would have provided funds for repairs at the Fort Knox facility by directing the Bureau of Parks and Recreation within the Department of Conservation to retain user fees and other park resources from Fort Knox State Park and to establish a dedicated fund to be used for improvements to Fort Knox State Park. This bill also would have restructured the existing section of law regarding fees for park services and accommodations.

SUMMARY

LD 794

This bill would have amended the present agricultural exemption under the natural resources protection laws to specify that drainage of freshwater wetlands is exempt only as it relates to prior converted cropland (drained and capped prior to December 23, 1985). This bill would have allowed a fallow period following more intensive agricultural activities without loss of exemption.

SUMMARY

This bill would have directed the State Planning Office to develop a strategic petroleum products reserve plan to mitigate the effects of a supply interruption and to help defray major oil price increases for low-income persons. The plan would have recommended mechanisms for accomplishing the reserve. Funding for the plan was to have come from fees on the transfer of petroleum products coming into the State.

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
