JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

SUMMARY

This bill would have provided for the appointment of special absentee ballot clerks from each of the major political parties to deliver and return absentee ballots. Only these special clerks, municipal clerks, the postal service, spouses and biological relatives of an absentee voter would have been permitted to handle absentee ballots. Under current law, any 3rd person may deliver absentee ballots to voters and return them to the municipal clerk. See LD 1021 for changes to the delivery of absentee ballots by 3rd persons.

LD 1025 An Act Relating to Certain Types of Indemnity Provisions in LV/MD Construction Contracts

SUMMARY

This bill would have declared void and unenforceable so-called "broad form" hold-harmless clauses in construction contracts. These clauses require the contractor to indemnify the owner or other party to the construction contract for injury or damage caused by someone in the control of the owner or other party.

LD 1027 An Act to Inform the Public About Drug-free School Zones ONTP

SUMMARY

This bill would have required the Commissioner of Public Safety to post the areas around schools as drug-free school zones and would have caused public service announcements to be made to inform the public of the existence of drug-free school zones and the consequences of dealing drugs in such areas. Under Maine law, trafficking in drugs within 1,000 feet of the property of a school carries a greater penalty than trafficking elsewhere.
