An Act to Provide a 15-day Waiting Period on the Sale of Handguns

SUMMARY

This bill would have established a 15-day waiting period on the sale of handguns in the State. Before selling a handgun, a seller would have been required to submit an application completed by a prospective purchaser to the local police department or the sheriff's office for review. The sale would be permitted if records show no convictions or outstanding indictments against the applicant for assault, terrorizing with a firearm, carrying a concealed weapon without a permit, a felony or a Class A, B or C crime, and no convictions for sale, use or possession of drugs, no adjudication of mental illness or voluntary commitment to a mental institution.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-276), part of the minority committee report, added a fiscal note to the bill.
