## JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

### AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

#### An Act to Adopt the English Rule, With Exceptions, for LD 1503 Attorney's Fees in Litigation

### **SUMMARY**

The bill would have made the "English rule," that is, that the losing party in civil litigation should pay the attorney's fees of the winning party, applicable to many forms of civil litigation in Maine. The bill included specific exemptions from the English rule in certain cases. The bill would have instructed the court to award attorney's fees only to the extent that such fees are reasonable. The bill would have allowed the court to allocate the attorney's fees based on the extent to which specific parties prevailed on different issues. The bill would have preserved and strengthened the offer of judgment procedure in the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 68, by providing that a party who declines an offer of judgment that is equal to or more favorable than the relief actually obtained has to pay the opposing party's attorney's fees from the date of the offer.

### **SUMMARY**

The bill clarifies that when the defendant appeals from a judgment of conviction, the State may challenge any pretrial court determination that constitutes harmful error without having to cross-appeal and any error harmful to it committed during the trial itself.
