## JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

#### AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

## LD 1856 An Act Regarding the Parents as Teachers Program

#### SUMMARY

The purpose of this bill was to encourage school administrative units to establish Parents as Teachers Programs, a broad-based partnership between schools and families encouraging an even start for children at an early age. Such programs would have provided parent education services to parents of children from birth to 4 years of age, including home visits to guide children's development, parent group meetings and periodic screening of children in conjunction with other existing services.

This bill would have provided for seed money to set up the program in FY 91-92 and 2 departmental positions and funding to implement the program in FY 92-93. Parent educators were to be trained through the National Center for Parents as Teachers in Missouri during 1992 and a minimum of 15 local program grants available in fiscal year 1992-93.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill guaranteed that each school administrative unit in the State will receive compensation for its current year special education costs on a monthly basis. Compensation for special education costs would equal the unit's most recent monthly special education expenditure, multiplied by the average statewide state share percentage of program costs in the current year.

It also increased the State's share of special education costs to 100% effective July 1, 2000 and added a provision for paying 1991-92 school year special education costs to school units over a 5-year period, beginning in July 1994. This bill was carried over to the Second Regular Session of the 115th Legislature.
