SUMMARY

The bill makes a violation of the Lead Poisoning Control Act a violation of the Maine Unfair Trade Practices Act.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-1066) - Majority Report: The amendment revises the bill to make a violation of the Lead Poisoning Control Act prima facie evidence that the Maine Unfair Trade Practices Act has been violated. Attorney's fees are awarded to a prevailing plaintiff in an unfair trade practices case.

Senate Amendment "A" to Committee Amendment "A" (S-646): The amendment limits lawsuits under the Unfair Trade Practices Act for Lead Poisoning Control Act violations to equitable relief. It does not change or affect current law as to a person's right to sue for damages.

SUMMARY

LD 2138

The bill updates and revises the language describing personal exemptions of the Maine Bankruptcy Code and attachment proceedings.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-605): The amendment revises the exemptions available to a debtor that apply to bankruptcy proceedings as well as all attachment and execution proceedings.

- 1. The amendment increases the current exemption for the debtor's aggregate interest in real or personal property used by the debtor as a residence from \$7,500 to \$12,500. If there are minor dependents whose principal residence is with the debtor, the debtor's aggregate interest up to \$25,000 is exempt. The amendment makes no change in the higher residence exemption for persons who are elderly or disabled.
- 2. The amendment retains the bill's increase of the exemption for a motor vehicle to \$2,500.
- 3. The amendment increases the exemption for jewelry from \$500 to \$750. The bill would have increased the exemption to \$1,000.
- 4. The amendment retains the bill's increase from \$1,000 to \$5,000 to exempt tools of the trade.
- 5. The amendment retains the personal injury award exemption increase from \$7,500 to \$12,500.
- 6. The amendment increases the amount of unused residence exemption that can be used to exempt additional interest in clothing, furniture, appliances, tools of the trade and personal injury awards.
