### LD 2287 An Act to Amend the Law Regulating Architects

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill does the following.

- 1. It removes the term aesthetic design from those practices that require a licensed architect.
- 2. It changes the word "preliminary" to the word "final" in describing the various documents defined as technical submissions. Preparation of technical submissions is one of many activities that comprise the practice of architecture as defined in Maine law.
- 3. Current laws require a license to practice architecture for the designing of all initial construction except for the technical submissions related to initial construction of single or 2-family dwellings and farm buildings. This bill removes all licensing requirements for the practice of architecture on those buildings and includes alterations as well as initial construction in the exemption.
- 4. It adds public buildings of under 4,000 square feet that are not constructed of reinforced concrete or structural steel to the list of buildings exempted from architectural licensing requirements.
- 5. Current law exempts from architectural licensing requirements alterations that do not affect the structure of the building and do not require a building permit. This bill eliminates that exemption and exempts, instead, public buildings whose alteration cost does not exceed \$50,000.

#### **SUMMARY**

In order to allow certain health care institutions to obtain blood samples and conduct laboratory tests, the original bill made specific exemptions to the need to be licensed in order to practice respiratory care.

Committee Amendment "A" eliminates the provision in the original bill and exempts persons who hold a nationally recognized credential in a medical profession and have received formal training. It allows current practitioners 2 years to attain the required credentials and training.
