Under the "Ribicoff option," some children may be eligible for Medicaid services when they are living away from home, such as at a residential treatment center. The State's Medicaid program recently exercised the Ribicoff option. This bill directs the Department of Human Services to work with the Department of Education to identify and implement expanded Ribicoff applications.

SUMMARY

The federal Veterans Health Care Act of 1992 qualifies rural health centers to receive discounts from manufacturers on pharmaceuticals purchased for their patients. This bill waives the Maine Pharmacy Act to ensure that its provisions do not prohibit or impede the State's rural health centers from taking full advantage of the federally authorized discounts.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT A (H-986) is the majority report of the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources. It does three things, as follows.

Rather than a complete waiver, the amendment makes specific amendments to the Maine Pharmacy Act to clarify that rural health centers may receive the discounts authorized under the federal Veterans Health Care Act of 1992.

The amendment also prohibits a drug manufacturer from engaging in price discrimination based on the class of trade of the purchaser. Manufacturers are required to offer their so-called "best price" to all classes. However, in determining which price is the "best price," prices authorized by federal law and prices offered to State agencies, non-profit agencies, and hospitals are exempt.

The amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.
