This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

The committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act Concerning Suspension of Registrations under the Operating-under-the-influence Laws

SUMMARY

This bill permits a court to continue the registration of a vehicle otherwise subject to mandatory suspension of registration for the driver's violation of certain operating-under-the-influence laws in cases when a family member who regularly uses that vehicle can establish hardship from the suspension. Current law allowing the Secretary of State to transfer the registration to other family members is inadequate in certain cases, because insurance will not cover, for example, a child who registers that vehicle in the child's name if the child is not the owner of the vehicle.

This bill would have authorized a liquor license for an establishment that operates at least 6 months as a Class A restaurant and is open as a lounge during the remaining portion of the year.

An Act Regarding Visually Impaired Voters

SUMMARY

This bill amends the law to accommodate voters with visual impairments. Enlarged ballots are permitted, a voting booth for the visually impaired at each voting place is required and confidentiality of reading assistance offered upon request.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-139) allows clerks, with the permission of the Secretary of State, to make enlarged specimen ballots as well as enlarged ballots. The Secretary of State will not have to provide enlarged specimen ballots.

The amendment adds a reporting requirement. Clerks who make enlarged specimen ballots and enlarged ballots must record and report the number of ballots made to the Secretary of State.

The amendment strikes language allowing the reading of a ballot outside the hearing range of others to a voter needing assistance. This removes the opportunity for confusion, since all voters must cast their ballots behind the guardrail at a polling place, pursuant to federal law.

The amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.
