**LD 983**      **An Act to Exempt Owners of Shooting Ranges from any Civil or Criminal Action Relating to Noise Pollution**

**AMENDMENTS ADOPTED**

**SUMMARY**

This bill was carried over from the 1st Regular Session by the Judiciary Committee. The bill was re-referred to the Fisheries and Wildlife Committee. A majority of the committee voted to re-refer the bill to the Energy and Natural Resources Committee. However, the House and Senate could not agree to the new referral and the bill died between the bodies.

The bill proposed to hold owners of shooting ranges immune from civil and criminal prosecution for matters relating to noise or noise pollution at the shooting range if the shooting range was operated in compliance with any noise control laws or ordinances in effect when the shooting range was constructed.

This bill was carried forward from the 1st Regular Session.

The bill proposed to elevate violation of the fish and wildlife laws by certain habitual violators to a Class C crime.

**LD 1382**      **An Act to Strengthen the Landowner Relations Program**

**SUMMARY**

This bill was carried forward from the 1st Regular Session.

The bill proposed to establish a funding mechanism for the Landowner Relations Program. It would have required hunters, anglers and trappers to purchase a landowner relations stamp. Proceeds from the sale of this stamp would have been earmarked for a Landowner Relations Fund. Use of the fund would have been limited for use in the Program. The Program would have included a mechanism to permit the use of matching grants from local sporting organizations. (See L.D. 1829, which includes a provision designed to encourage landowners to keep their land open to hunting, trapping, fishing and other outdoor activities.)
