After the well was "spiked" he tested the water in the distribution system for the presence of chlorine to assure that the whole system was exposed. ROWE ANNOUNCES SETTLEMENT OVER OXYCONTIN ADVERTISING PRACTICES

26 States and D.C. Address Concerns with Purdue Pharma's Pain Drug - OxyContin

Attorney General Steve Rowe announced today that Maine and 25 other states, as well as the District of Columbia, have reached a settlement with Purdue Pharma regarding the narcotic pain medication OxyContin. The settlement resolves concerns that Purdue had engaged in extensive off-label marketing of OxyContin, a time-released, Schedule II opioid used for pain management of moderate to severe pain over an extended period of time, and that Purdue failed to adequately disclose abuse and diversion risks associated with the drug in violation of the states' respective consumer protection statutes.

Rowe said, "OxyContin abuse has ravaged the lives of thousands of Mainers, including entire families and communities. It has also contributed to increased crime rates and emergency medical treatment."

"Had Purdue Pharma limited its marketing to the drug's approved uses and disclosed the drug's abuse and diversion risks up front, it is likely that much of the devastation could have been prevented. This is a clear example of a pharmaceutical company putting corporate profits above the health and welfare of people."

The settlement, in the form of a Consent Judgment, has been filed in Kennebec County Superior Court. The settlement requires Purdue to market and promote OxyContin only in line with FDA-approved uses, prohibiting Purdue from making any false, misleading or deceptive claim regarding OxyContin. It also requires the company to continue its "OxyContin Abuse and Diversion Detection Program," established internally to detect problem prescribing, and requires all field personnel to undergo training on the program before being allowed to promote OxyContin.

Among the particular restrictions and requirements contained in the settlements, are provisions that Purdue must:

- market and promote OxyContin in a manner consistent with its package insert and not in a manner that minimizes the approved uses for the drug;

- not market or promote OxyContin for off-label purposes – those beyond the approved indications and uses of the drug;
- have any recipient of funds or other remuneration for grants publicly disclose the existence of that remuneration;
- not sponsor or fund any educational events where Purdue has knowledge that a speaker will recommend the off-label use of OxyContin;
- not base Purdue sales representatives' bonuses solely on the volume of OxyContin prescribed; and
- take into account in performance evaluations sales representatives' educating prescribers about OxyContin and its potential for abuse and diversion.

Finally, the settlement provides for a monetary payment by Purdue to the states in the amount of \$19,500,000. Maine's share of the settlement is \$719,500.

Taking part in the investigation of Purdue's business practices, as well as in today's settlement, are the following states : Arizona, Arkansas, California, Connecticut, Idaho, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin and the District of Columbia.

This initiative requests the funding of 1 full-time Field Investigator position to oversee all death investigations and coordinate the follow-up needed in these cases. Specifically the position will take death calls, answer questions, call physicians, hospitals, and police officers and gather the investigative information which the pathologists require to determine jurisdiction and complete the cause and manner of death. As a result of the insufficient staffing, other critical work of the Chief Medical Examiner has been preempted by the need to gather investigative information. As a result, the volume of work being completed and reports being sent out to police, insurance companies and families has increased to a 5-6 month timeframe. With the addition of one trained death investigator we should be able to move the cases along and be more responsive to the needs of the clients we interact with, and the families that need the information to settle insurance claims and estate issues.

The State and Local Government Committee completed its deliberations on the 2008-2009 biennial budget bill, LD 499, on February 28, 2007. The Committee was unanimous of those who voted in its recommendation to accept the budget requests. Voting to accept the budget requests: Senators Schneider and Benoit, and Representatives Barstow, Beaudette, Schatz, Boland, Hayes, Sirois, Joy, Curtis, Cotta and Weaver. However, the Committee does have a number of comments that it would like to make.

First, we would like to emphasize the importance of preserving the Fund for the Efficient Delivery of Local and Regional Services in its current state. The Fund has already had a positive effect in Maine communities, yet has not achieved full success because it has not been fully funded. As you know, in 2005, the funding was swept and used for other budget shortfalls, with partial funding replaced in 2006. We believe that fully funding this program at the level presented in the Governor's budget will ultimately lead to much greater savings, more fiscally responsible government practices, and therefore be a worthwhile investment.

Second, there is clearly a great deal of need in the Bureau of General Services with respect to the Capital Construction and Improvements Reserve Fund and the backlog of

capital repairs. The Committee understands that the critical needs total \$42 million. We also understand that one source of funding for BGS is 10% of the "cascade" from the year end surplus up to a maximum of \$5 million. Less than \$6 million is included in the biennial budget for this purpose (this includes \$5 million from the projected excess General Fund revenues). We would like the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs to increase the percentage of the cascade that is used for this purpose and remove the \$5 million maximum, given the dire and growing need for renovations and maintenance in state buildings.

Third, the Committee would like to commend the Department of Administrative and Financial Services for its continuous and vigilant attempts to reduce costs within State Government, including its reduction of 30 positions in the current budget proposal. However, we would also like to encourage all Departments in State Government, including the Governor's Office, to continue in this commitment to efficiency and staff reductions. Any cuts in State Government costs can be passed on to people in need in the community.

Fourth, there has been ongoing concern on the State and Local Government Committee about the situation and underfunding of Archives within the Secretary of State's Office. We would like the State Archivist and the Secretary of State to develop a plan with improved cooperation and resources to assist archives recording and storage in municipalities and counties. We believe that this is a logical regional endeavor. We are concerned with the lack of adequate storage at the local and county level.

Finally, the State and Local Government Committee is responsible for the Office of Information Technology. Given the report from the Office of Program Evaluation and Government Accountability, it is clear that computer systems within the state need to be integrated. We have a responsibility to become more efficient and this will require upfront funding, and a request in the future to achieve this.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on portions of the budget within our jurisdiction.
