Dear Gordons

Every department of State government operates with the idea in mind that 40,000 pounds is the maximum weight allowed for trucks. The maximum gross weight permitted to a truck having two axiss would be 27,000 pounds. The only way the maximum gross weight can be increased shows that figure is by the use of additional axiss, and the so-called ten-sheelers, or trucks with three axiss and eight rear wheels, can weigh 40,500 pounds under the provisions of shotion 56, plus some adjustments for overload as provided in section 110 of Chapter 29; so that, apparently, under the above provisions a truck might weigh more than 40,000 pounds. However, the limit for registration is, as you stated, set at 40,000 pounds, and this amount is considered the maximum.

Harald told me some days ago that he was coming in to talk about chaffermanicenses, and I should be very glad to get his ideas on that subject as there is considerable discussion about this matter.
