Dear Chiefs

Attached hereto is a letter written to you by Officer libert Bartlett of Presque Isle, in which he reises some question concerning the runishment of a truckman whose loaded truck is operated across a bridge which has been posted with a werning sign limiting the weight to 5 tons.

This matter is covered by Section 28 of Charter 29, Revised Statutes, and in my opinion if the warning sign was posted by the local officials charged with the repair and maintenance of the bridge, or by the State Highway Commission any person responsible for operating a truck across the bridge in excess of the posted limits is liable to sumishment under this section, remalties for which are fixed by Section 84 of the same chapter.

It would seem to me, however, that if it is desired to arrest any person for violation of this section he should be charged specifically with the offense outlined in the section rather than generally for driving an overloaded truck along the highway. The complaint should allege the operation of a motor vehicle across a certain bridge - naming it - with a head in excess of the limits fixed by the local officers charged with the repair and maintenance of said bridge which limits were conspicuously posted at each end of said bridge; and the complaint should give the weight of the local. can see no reason why, if this type of a complaint is made and embodied in the warrant, there should be any trouble with securing conviction for such an offense.
