Re: War Production Board General Limitation Order Number L29.

1. Metal signs which are fully completed are <u>not</u> covered by the Order.

2. Metal signs that are fully completed as far as work on the metal is concerned, even though they may not be painted, are not covered by the Order.

3. Metal signs that are not fully completed as far as the work on the metal is concerned <u>are included</u> in the Order and cannot be transferred in an unfinished state without the specific consent of the Director of Industry Operation.

4. No "raw" material or metal scrap can be transferred in an unfinished state without the specific consent of the Director of Industry Operations.

5. The total amount of metal that you can use in the manufacture of signs and/or accessories, whether said metal is in a "raw" state or whether it is partially processed, is 12 1/2 per cent of the total amount you used during the fiscal year 1940-41, and that use must be made during the period beginning April 1, 1942 and ending June 30, 1942.

6. You cannot use any metals for manufacture of metal signs and/or accessories after June 30, 1942.
