To Harold I. Gosse, Secretary of State. Re: Itinerant Photograplier 's Application and License
. . A study of section 99-B indicates that it. provides for the issuance of a license with statements thereon as to the name, place of residence, address, place of birth and nationality. The present section 99-C, which replaced the former section 99-C, provides that certain information shall be given upon the application: age, residence and address, name and address of principal place of business of employer; and, in cases of corporations, name and address of principal place of business and names of officers.

Thus, the license calls for the place of birth, nationality, and description of applicant, where such is not requested on the application. However, it would appear that the purpose of the application is to furnish information to be put on the license, and therefore any information to go on the license should be requested upon the application.

Relative to the license of corporations, section 99 B provides that the license may contain "any other additional information as the secretary of state may prescribe." In this connection, it would be impossible to comply with section $99-\mathrm{B}$ as far as birth, nationality and description are concerned, and it would appear, in the case of corporations; that such items would have to be omitted.
