. . . You ask if, under the present law, it is permissible for a qualified Canadian dentist to practise in this State if he files an application for citizenship and thereafter takes the steps necessary to become a citizen. You further state that it is your understanding that such a grace period is permitted.

We regret very much having to answer your query in the negative. Under the provisions of Chapter 73 of the Revised Statutes of 1954, generally, before a person can practise dentistry in this State he must have a license by virtue of 1) having taken and successfully passed the examination (and he must be a citizen of the United States in order to take such examination), or 2) receiving such license under the reciprocity statute, having first practised in a State, territory or district of the United States.

We are acutely aware of the conditions in Eastport with respect to dentists and we regret that there is no provision in our law that would permit you to bring a Canadian dentist in.
