Dear Mrs. Knapp:

Since talking with you relative to your candidacy for the House of Representatives I have gone over the whole situation with the Attorney General.

As has been pointed out previously, the Constitution of the State prohibits a person from bolding positions in two branches of State Government at the same time. This was the basis on which I advised you that, if elected to the House of Representatives you must resign your position before being seated in the House.

It is the opinion of this office that chapter 63, section 25 of the Revised Statutes further prohibits a person in the classified service from being a candidate for public office in a partisan election.

I have been asked to advise you of this opinion so that you may make a decision as to whether you wish to remain in your present position or be a candidate for the House.

I realize the latter part of this latter is contrary to my verbal statement to you last week. Since that time the matter has been thoroughly discussed with the Attorney General and I am conveying his opinion to you.

Dear Mrs. Knapp:

This letter is to confirm what I tried to explain to you by telephone this evening. If you choose to run for the Legislature you should resign from your position as a classified State employee at the Pineland Rospital and Training Conter effective the date you file your papers as a candidate.

If you file and shoose not be resign your position I will tell Dr.
Borman to advise you, as the proper Personnel form, of your dismissal as a
State employee. The reason for this action, if necessary, stone from my
belief that in running for the Legislature as a State employee you violate
the Personnel Law as interpreted by the Atterney Ceneral Ruling of January
23,1962. I emplose a copy of this ruling and also refer you to the
letter of March 6,1962 to you from Mr. George C. West, Deputy Atterney General
on the same subject.

You understand, of course, that this action, if necessary, in no way reflecte upon your ability as a highly skilled employee at Pineland. Your devotion to your work and your efforts to establish the Departmental Drug Counittee, of which you have been an active number, are well known and appreciated.
