I acknowledge receipt of your question in an inter-departmental memorandum dated today as to the extent to which the office of Deputy Secretary of State is still affected by Chapter 421, section 1, of the Public Laws of 1965.

Unless at some future time both sections 1 and 2 of Chapter 421 above stated are declared unconstitutional, it is my opinion that except for tenure the Deputy Secretary of State is subject to the Personnel Law and specifically is subject to the classifications and salary ranges as presently established by the Personnel Department.
