FACTS:

A person is presently employed by the State. Previously this person has been a legislative committee clerk. A committee clerk is employed when the legislature is in session.

QUESTION:

Does this constitute continuity for the purpose of allowing longevity pay provisions under the statutes which provides longevity pay for State Employees?

ANSWER:

No.

OPINION:

P. & S. 1963, Chapter 202, provides longevity for State employees on or after January 1, 1964. Some of the language in that Chapter reads:

"... after completion of 8 years of service with the State, provided that the last 5 years of employment shall have been continuous."

Also the same language is again used with "15" substituted for "8" and "10" substituted for "5."

The language quoted is most clear. There must be a stated period of continuous employment as one condition of eligibility for longevity. A person who served as a committee clerk cannot have "employment (which) shall have been continuous."
