Dear Ken:

In response to your inquiry of November 1, 1973, it is my opinion that Dave Aldrich is entitled to the \$1,000.00 payment on January 2, 1974.

3 M.R.S.A. § 2 makes it clear that the salary of a legislator is for the regular session and not for the 2-year term for which he was elected, even though payment of his salary is payable in two separate payments, i.e., \$2,500 in the first year and \$1,000 in the second year. Dave Aldrich served and was in full attendance during the regular session; hence, he is entitled to the balance of his salary for the regular session (\$1,000.00) which this Legislature has determined to be payable on January 2, 1974.

While it is true that neither the statute (3 M.R.S.A. § 2) nor the joint order (S.P. 697) anticipates vacancies in a legislative office, the statute (3 M.R.S.A. § 2) provides for additional salary on a per diem basis for an extra session. Had Dave Aldrich remained a legislator, he would be entitled to such additional salary. Having vacated his legislative office at the end of the regular session, he is entitled to regular session salary only (\$3,500) and his successor will be entitled only to such extra session per diem salary as is required under the statute determined by length of the session and daily attendance.
