5 M.R.S.A. §§ 4593.1(c) and 4593.2 - Right of Water Closets in Places of Public Accommodation.

This replies to your memo of January 30, 1975, concerning this subject.

I understand your question to be whether in the absence of a standard manufactured water closet with a seat 20" high, a person constructing or altering a place of public accommodation or a place of employment would be in valuation of 5 M.R.S.A. § 4593.1(c) or 5 M.R.S.A. § 4593.2 by installing the highest available water closet of standard manufacture having a seat height of 19%?

The last sentence of the first paragraph of 5 M.R.S.A. S 4593.1 provides that "[f] or any building or facility constructed specifically as a place of public accommodation on or after September 1, 1974 there shall be:

C. Rest room facilities should have at least one stall that is not less than 3 feet wide, 5 feet in depth, a 32 inchewide door that swings out, hand rails on each side mounted 33 inches from the floor, and a water closet with a seat 20 inches high.

Subsection 2 of section 4593 extends the above restroom specification requirements to "buildings or facilities constructed specifically as a place of employment on or after September 1, 1974, or when the estimated total costs for remodeling or enlarging an existing building exceeds \$100,000."

There is no indication from the language of Section 4593 or the record of the deliberation of the Legislature in its enactment that the specifications are to serve as guidelines or are to be taken as approximations. The specifications enacted by the Legislature in section 4593.1(c) are specific. They are the minimum specifications permissible. The minimum acceptable height for a section 4593.1(c) water closet with seat is 20 inches.

Any person constructing or altering a place of public accommodation or employment will violate 5 M.R.S.A. § 4593.1(c) or section 4593(2) by failing to install a water closet which has a seat height of 20 inches.
