Dear Senator Cummings:

Your letter of February 15, 1977, addressed to Attorney General Joseph E. Brennan, was referred to my attention. You inquired as to "whether once a pupil is legally admitted to the public school the local system has the right to assign this pupil to any grade level which it considers appropriate."

It is my opinion that the local administrative unit has the right to assign a pupil to the grade level which it considers appropriate. I base this opinion on 20 MRSA, section 473, subsection 8, which states that the "school committees and school directors shall . . . determine what description of scholars shall attend each school, classify them and transfer them from school to school where more than one school is kept at the same time."

If, however, the pupil being assigned is a special education child, then the special education laws would be in effect (20 MRSA, chapter 404). The parents or guardian of such a child have the right to be heard on the placement of their child pursuant to the guidelines and regulations established by the Commissioner of the Department of Educational and Cultural Services.
