Dear Speaker Martin:

You have asked whether the Legislature can mandate that the Governor convene a special session. It is our opinion that the Legislature does not have this power.

The authority of the Governor to call a special session is set out in Article V, part 1, section 13 of the Maine Constitution. In essence, that section provides that the Governor "may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the Legislature." In Opinion of the Justices, 136 Me. 531 (1940), the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court interpreted section 13 to mean that the "Governor alone is the judge of the necessity for such action, which is not subject to review." 136 Me. at 534. Given that opinion, it seems clear that the Governor may not be required to exercise this power by an act of the Legislature.
