financial assistance funds for students at risk of homelessness. It provided \$3 million to be used to provide direct assistance, up to \$750, to students at risk of homelessness.

### **LD 1719 An Act to Establish Substance Use Disorder Treatment Centers**

Although this bill was not enacted, funding to support a new substance use disorder treatment center, in either Washington or Kennebec County, was incorporated into Public Law 2023, chapter 412, the budget bill enacted in the First Special Session. \$400,000 for development costs was appropriated for fiscal year 2023-2024 and \$1,600,000 was appropriated for ongoing operations in both fiscal year 2023-2024 and fiscal year 2024-2025.

### **LD 1726 An Act to Build Maine's Economy by Supporting Child Care for Working Families**

Although this bill was not enacted, the Maine Child Care Affordability Program within the Department of Health and Human Services encompassing the former child care subsidy program and establishing new eligibility for child care providers was incorporated into Public Law 2023, chapter 412, the budget bill enacted in the First Special Session. That law also doubled the monthly wage supplement for child care workers and directed the department to amend its procedures regarding eligibility, promote the program, streamline and simplify the online invoicing and billing systems for child care providers and, by 2030, implement a program to achieve affordable child care. ### **LD 1773 An Act to Increase the State's Share of the Cost of Health Insurance for Retired Teachers**

Although this bill was carried over in committee, an almost identical bill, LD 112, was passed by the Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing. Subsequently, a majority of the substance of the bill was incorporated into Public Law 2023, chapter 412, the budget bill enacted in the First Special Session. ### **LD 1898 An Act to Ensure that a Teacher Who Participates in the Prevention of Dangerous Behavior is Protected Under a Collective Bargaining Agreement**

This bill was finally enacted in both the House and the Senate prior to the adjournment sine die of the First Special Session but was not signed by the Governor. Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, the final disposition of this bill will be determined during the next legislative session.
