Representative Election.

The election of a Representative to Congress, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of the Hon. John Holmes, in this district took place on Monday last—Also the election of a Representative to the 17th Congress, and Electors of President and Vice President of the United States. The votes in this town for a Representative or Electors were as follows:—

The votes given in this town for Mr. Hill were not given with an expectation of preventing the choice of Gen. Wingate as an elector, but as an expression of disapprobation of the conduct of Gen. Wingate, and some of his friends, for writing to, and advising Mr. Hill to vote for the compromise of the Missouri Question, and then urging his vote given according to that advice to prevent his re-election. This kind of electioneering does not exactly accord with our ideas "of the fair principles of trade;" and we further understand that votes were given for Mr. Hill in several other towns in this county with the same views and feelings without distinction of party.

The following is a list of votes for a Representative to the 17th Congress; those to fill the vacancy in the 16th, are not materially different. It will be seen that Mr. Dane is elected.

The scattering votes were principally for Gen. Cooper, and John Wilkins, Esq.

We notice with some pleasing revolutionary recollections, the choice of the venerable JON ADAMS, of Massachusetts, and that of COMMODE SAUNDERS, of this State, as Electors of President. About 43 years ago Commodore SAUNDERS commanded the national vessel the *Conqueror*, and conveyed Mr. ADAMS to Holland, as our Foreign Minister. We cannot deny ourselves the hope that Maj. FUSCOTT is also chosen for that high office from this District—who served in the revolutionary war with President MONROE, and who must have much gratified for his old companion in arms.
