IMPORTANT

Your special attention is called to the fact that a change in the law in 1959 provides that Primary Nomination papers must be filed by the first Monday in April or **APRIL 4, 1960.** HILE the Secretary of State is at all times very glad to furnish all possible information, candidates and others interested in the June primaries will save themselves much unnecessary inconvenience and will avoid needless delay if they will familiarize themselves with the following facts:

(No papers will be received in the Secretary of State's office after 5:00 P.M. but envelopes bearing a postmark as having been received in Augusta not later than midnight, April 4, will be accepted.)

Dates for Filing Expense Accounts and Reports of Contributions Received

(Note: See Pages 6, 7 and 8 for detail and penalties.)

- Feb. 1 First monthly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representative to Congress, if expenses incurred.
- Mar. 1 Monthly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representatives to Congress.
- April 1 Monthly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representatives to Congress.
- May 1 Monthly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representatives to Congress.
- May 21 First return for candidates for County Offices and the State Legislature.
- May 25 First weekly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representatives to Congress.
- June 1—Weekly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representatives to Congress.

- June 8—Weekly return for candidates for U. S. Senator and Representatives to Congress.
- June 15 Last return prior to the primaries for all candidates. Must be on file on or before 10:00 A.M. of this date.
- June 16 Meeting of Committee on Election Expenditures to investigate returns of expenses.
- July 5 Final date for return of receipts and expenditures for all candidates, political agents, persons, firms, associations, committees, organizations and corporations on behalf of candidates. This should be a recapitulation of all expenditures and contributions previously reported in connection with the campaign, together with a report of expenses incurred and contributions received on Primary Election Day.

The Committee on Election Expenditures will meet again within 21 days after June 20 to investigate these final reports.

Nov. 23 — Date all state election candidates must file expense report, whether or not expenses were incurred. Forms sent to candidates prior to State Election. (This report should not include expenses made in connection with a primary nomination.)

Also date for filing reports by political committees and political agents.

SIGNING OF NOMINATION PAPERS

Date

Primary nomination papers must not be signed prior to January 1, 1960, and must be filed with the Secretary of State on or before April 4, 1960. (Ch. 4, Sec. 20.)

Signatures

Nomination papers may be signed only by members of the political party named therein who reside in the electoral division in which the nomination is sought. Each voter may sign one nomination paper for the same office and only one, except in cases where more than one person is to be elected to the same office. Each such signer of a nomination paper must make his signature in person, in a legible manner, and add to it his place of residence. Women should sign their given name and married surname. (Mary Jones and not Mrs. John Jones.) (Ch. 4, Sec. 20.)

Oath of Circulator

One of the signers, or the person circulating the nomination paper, must make oath thereon that to the best of his knowledge and belief the signatures are genuine, that the persons signing are members of the political party named therein and that they reside in the electoral district or division in which the nomination is to be made. The person proposed for nomination must sign the petition in the space provided, agreeing to accept the nomination if nominated at the primary election, not to withdraw and if elected at the state election to qualify as such officer. (Ch. 4, Sec. 19.)

Number of Signatures Required

The total number of signatures for the nomination of a candidate must amount in the aggregate to at least 1%, and must not exceed 2%, of the total gubernatorial vote for all candidates cast in the 1958 election in the electoral district or division in which the nomination is proposed. The appended schedule has been figured on this basis and is intended to show accurately the minimum and maximum number of signatures required and permitted in each and every electoral district in the state in which nominations are to be made in the June primaries of 1960. (Ch. 4, Sec. 19.)

Candidate's Name and Address

The name of the proposed candidate should either be printed or typewritten in order that there may be no misunderstanding as to the exact manner in which his name shall appear on the ballot. Particular care should be taken that the name of the candidate should be written and spelled the same on all the petitions circulated. All nomination papers, when filed with the Secretary of State, will be immediately opened, catalogued and subject to public inspection under proper restrictions. Candidates are urgently requested to give their post office addresses, as well as their residences, not only for their own protection but also in order that all communications sent out from this department may reach them promptly.

CANDIDATE'S EXPENSES

Reports Required

It shall be unlawful for any candidate or for any person, firm, association, committee, organization or corporation on behalf of a candidate or for the purpose of aiding the candidacy of any person, to make any expenditure or incur any liability unless reporting the same to the Secretary of State on the dates set forth on Page 3. (Ch. 4, Sec. 38.)

Committee on Election Expenditures

The Committee on Election Expenditures will meet on June 16, 4 days prior to the Primary Election, at which time they shall make a preliminary investigation of all returns. The Committee will meet again within 21 days after the Primary Election to make a final examination of such returns. (Ch. 4, Sec. 44.)

Penalty for Failure to Report

Any candidate failing to make return within the time required shall be assessed a fine of not more than \$5 for each day he is in default by the legislative committee appointed under the provisions of section 44, unless he shall be excused by said committee. If such assessment is not paid at the order of said committee, the candidate shall be disqualified and his name shall not be printed upon an official ballot used at any special or general election held during the same calendar year. Any candidate aggrieved by the decision of the committee not to print his name upon said official ballot may, within 5 days after notification of said decision, appeal to any Justice of the Superior Court, by presenting to him a petition therefor, in term time or vacation. Such Justice shall forthwith fix a time and place for immediate hearing, which may be in vacation, and cause notice thereof to be given to the committee; and after hearing, such Justice may, within 10 days after presentation of the

petition for appeal, affirm, modify or reverse the decision of the committee and the decision of such Justice shall be final. (Ch. 4, Sec. 38.)

COMMITTEES, CLUBS, POLITICAL AGENTS AND THEIR RECORDS

* Political Committee

A "Political Committee" is defined as including every committee or combination of 3 or more persons to aid or promote the success or defeat of any candidate for public office. (Ch. 9, Sec. 2.)

* Treasurer

"Treasurers" include all persons appointed by a committee to receive or disburse moneys to aid or defeat a candidate. No person shall act as Treasurer unless the Secretary of State is notified. (Ch. 9, Sec. 2.) Reports of receipts and expenditures of political committees are required to be filed by the Treasurer on the same dates that the candidates are required to file. (Ch. 4, Sec. 38 re Primary; Ch. 9, Sec. 5 re State.)

* Political Agent

"Political Agents" are defined as all persons appointed by any candidate to assist him in his candidacy. (Ch. 9, Sec. 2.) One report of receipts and expenditures of Political Agents is required to be filed within 15 days after the election. (Ch. 4, Sec. 35 re Primary; Ch. 9, Sec. 5 re State.)

* Persons Employed by Candidates

Any person accepting employment to aid the candidacy of any person for nomination to elective office whose remuneration for such employment shall exceed the sum of \$5 shall, within 48 hours after accepting such employment, cause his name to be entered and filed upon a docket form provided by the Election Division. Such report shall contain a complete statement of the basis of compensation on which his services in behalf of a candidate are being rendered. (Ch. 4, Sec. 41.)

^{*} Forms for appointment of Political Agents, appointment of Treasurers of Political Committees, Docket for Registration of Persons Employed by Candidates, expense forms for Political Agents, Political Committees and candidates are available from the Secretary of State's Office.

Preservation of Records of Persons Furnishing Service, etc.

Any person, firm, association or organization who shall receive money for labor, rent, printing, advertising or for any other service intended or designed to further the candidacy of a person for nomination to elective office or who shall furnish any such service or material on credit shall keep a careful and accurate detailed statement of the money received and the credit extended and preserve the same for a full period of 15 months following the date of the delivery or rendering of the materials or service. (Ch. 4, Sec. 42.)

Preservation of Records of Candidates or Committees Expenditures

Every candidate for elective office and every person, firm, association, committee, organization, club, group of voters or corporation who shall hire, contract for, arrange or otherwise provide or secure any material or service intended or designed to further the candidacy of himself or of any other person for nomination to elective office shall keep a full, detailed and correct account of the money expended and the liabilities incurred and preserve the same for a full period of 15 months following the date of the delivery or rendering of the materials or service. (Ch. 4, Sec. 42.)

Duty of Person Contracting for Services

It shall be the duty of any person, whether candidate or political agent or interested worker, who arranges for any labor, rent, printing, advertising or other service intended or designed to further the candidacy of a person for nomination to elective office to advise each and every individual with or from whom he contracts such labor, rent, printing, advertising or other service of the requirements of the foregoing paragraphs. (Ch. 4, Sec. 43.)

CONTRIBUTIONS

At Primary Elections it shall be unlawful for any candidate or for any person, firm, association, committee, organization or corporation, on behalf of a candidate or for the purpose of aiding the candidacy of any person, to accept any contributions, received or

promised, or to make any expenditure or incur any liability, either for printing, publication, postage, clerk hire, newspaper advertising, renting of halls or other places, soliciting agents, transporting voters, radio advertising, television, telephones and telegrams, stationery, express, traveling expense, hotel bill, or any other act or thing calculated to induce or procure any person or persons to vote for any candidate for office in a primary election unless on the dates hereinafter set forth next ensuing after the receiving of any such contribution or the making of any such expenditure or the incurring of any such liability such candidate, person, firm, association, committee, organization or corporation shall report the same to the Secretary of State setting forth in detail the nature and amount of the contributions, received or promised or expenditure made or liability incurred with the name of the candidate, his address, the election district and the office in question. (Ch. 4, Sec. 38.)

At State Elections, contributions may not be made directly to a candidate but must be made to a Treasurer of a Political Committee or a Political Agent. (Ch. 9, Sec. 8, Sub-sec. IV.)

ALL CANDIDATES TO BE NOTIFIED OF RESULT

The returns of the primary election will be canvassed by the Governor and Council not later than the 1st Tuesday in July, 1960. As soon as possible thereafter there will be sent to each candidate whose name appeared on the primary ballot, a copy of the detailed tabulation of the vote cast in the electoral district or division in which he was a candidate. (Ch. 4, Sec. 31.)

After the State Election, a tabulation of the votes will be printed and copies of the printed tabulation will be sent to all candidates. (Ch. 5, Sec. 50.)

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES

Successful candidates will be notified, by registered mail, of their nomination at the primary election. Within 7 days after the receipt of such notification the candidate must file his acceptance with the Secretary of State. The failure of any candidate to file such acceptance within the specified time shall be deemed a refusal thereof and his name will not be printed on the State Election ballot. (Ch. 4, Secs. 31, 34.)

Successful candidates after the State Election will be issued a certificate of election. (Ch. 21, Sec. 4.)

INSPECTIONS AND RECOUNTS Primary Election

An inspection of the primary election ballots may be requested of the town or city clerk and the same may be granted after proper notification to the election officers and interested candidates. (Ch. 4, Sec. 32.) Within 10 days after copies of the tabulation have been forwarded to all candidates, candidates may make written application to the Secretary of State alleging that the return of votes cast in any town does not correctly state the vote as actually cast and specifying the officers as to which such errors are alleged to have occurred. (Ch. 4, Sec. 32.)

State Election

Inspections and recounts may be requested in writing immediately after the election. Requests for recounts cannot be honored if made more than 10 days after the date copies of the printed tabulation are made available. The request should allege that the record does not correctly state the vote as actually cast and should specify the particulars with reference to the errors alleged to have occurred. (Ch. 5, Secs. 49, 50.)

NUMBER OF SIGNATURES REQUIRED AND PERMITTED ON PRIMARY NOMINATION PAPERS
