By virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Maine, pursuant to the Constitution and applicable statutes of the State of Maine, it is ordered as follows:

Section I: The State of Maine, its political sub-divisions and private agencies or organizations, should preserve and develop such historic resources as may be available in order to give a sense of orientation to the people of the State of Maine and their guests. In response to this need, the 105th Legislature established the Maine Historic Preservation Commission. It is the purpose of this Executive Order to appoint a Liaison Officer to represent the State in the participation of the benefits of the "National Historic Preservation Act of 1966" for planning for, development of and/or acquisition of the historic resources of the State of Maine as represented in districts, sites, buildings, structures and objects.

Section II: James H. Mundy, in his capacity as Director of the Maine Historic Preservation Commission, is hereby appointed and designated the authorized representative of the State of Maine with authority to represent and act for the State under the provisions of the "National Historic Preservation Act of 1966" and within the provisions of Public Law 536 of the State of Maine which declares the policy of the Maine Historic Preservation Commission.

IN FAITH WHEREOF, I have affixed by official signature and thereby authorized that this Executive Order be issued and become effective on this fourteenth day of August, A.D. 1972.
