Mr. SHAW subsequently reported that the Committee had discharged its duty, and that the Governor elect was pleased to say that he accepted the office to which he had been elected, and would meet the Legislature at such time as it might indicate, to take and subscribe the oaths of office necessary to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Tilden, Secretary of that body, proposing a joint convention, to be held in the House this day, forthwith, for the purpose of administering to the Hon. Joseph R. Bodwell, Governor elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and asking the concurrence of the House.

The clerk was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate, informing that body of the concurrence of the House in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of administering to the Hon. Joseph R. Bodwell, Governor elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of his office.

The hour for administering the necessary oaths to the Honorable Governor elect having arrived, the Senate came in, and a convention was then formed, Hon. Sebastian S. Marble, President of the Senate, presiding.

## IN CONVENTION.

On motion by Mr. LIBBEY of Penobscot,

Messrs. Libbey

Russell of Kennebec, Engel of Bangor, Kidder of Dixfield, Ryder of Springfield, Greer of Belmont, Horigan of Biddeford,

were appointed a committee to wait upon Hon. Joseph R. Bodwell, Governor elect, to inform him that the two branches of the Legislature were in convention assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and ready to administer to him the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and to receive from him such communication as he may be pleased to make.

Mr. LIBBEY subsequently reported that the Committee had delivered the message with which it was charged, and that the Governor elect had been pleased to say that he would, forthwith, attend upon the convention.

Whereupon, Hon. Joseph R. Bodwell, Governor elect, attended by the Executive Council and Heads of Departments, came in, and in presence of both branches of the Legislature, in convention assembled, before the President of the Senate, Hon. Sebastian S. Marble, took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Hon. Oramandal Smith, Secretary of State, then made the following:

## PROCLAMATION.

The votes given in on the 8th day of September last in the cities, towns and plantations of the State, for Governor, the returns of which have been made to the office of Secretary of State, having been examined and counted by the Legislature, which has declared that a plurality thereof were given to Joseph R. Bodwell, and that he is duly elected, and he having in the presence of the two branches of the Legislature, in convention assembled, taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge

the duties of that office, I, therefore, declare and make known to all persons in this State, who are in the exercise of any public trust, as well as all good citizens thereof, that Joseph R. Bodwell is Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of Maine, and that due obedience should be rendered to all his lawful acts and commands as such.

## GOD SAVE THE STATE OF MAINE.

The Governor then communicated to the convention, by address, information upon the condition of the State, as follows:

## Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives:

In accordance with the duty enjoined upon the Governor by the Constitution, I now submit to you information of the condition of the State, and recommend to your consideration such measures as I judge to be expedient at this time.

My first recommendation is that the State tax be reduced by the sum of \$235,945.33, which is  $26\frac{2}{3}$  per cent of the total amount now levied. The condition of the State finances, according to the annual report of the Treasurer, will justify this important step. The nominal amount of the bonded debt of the State is \$5,157,000, all of which is due and payable in the year 1889, \$2,330,000 in June, and \$2,827,-In offset to the total amount of the debt, 000 in October. there is in the treasury a sinking-fund of \$2,110,390.57. This fund is composed of our own State Bonds to the amount of \$1,161,500; United States Bonds \$834,300; New Hampshire State Bonds, \$92,600; and Massachusetts State Bonds, \$21,000. The premium on the three last named securities amounts, to-day, according to the statement of the Treasurer, to \$247,260.00,—thus making the aggregate value of the sinking-fund \$2,357,650.57. The premium will probably be higher rather than lower during the current year. Deducting the sinking-fund at its full and actual value, the aggregate debt of the State which remains to be provided for is \$2,799,349.43.

The sinking-fund operations, under the Act of 1868, should be brought to a close, now that the State is called upon to provide for the final liquidation of the bonds in aid of whose payment the fund was originally established. Of the securities in the fund, I recommend that the bonds of our own State be cancelled and destroyed by the Treasurer in the presence of a joint committee of the two branches of the Legislature and a committee of the Executive Council. I recommend further that the avails of the United States, Massachusetts and New Hampshire bonds be devoted directly to the liquidation of the State debt, according to the manner which is indicated below.

To provide for the State debt still remaining I recommend that a Refunding Bill be enacted, giving the Treasurer the right to sell, after due advertisement, to the highest bidder, bonds of the State of Maine to an amount not exceeding two million eight hundred thousand dollars, the bonds to run for thirty years at three per cent, interest to be paid semi-annually at the Treasurer's office and in the city of Boston. I also recommend that for the ultimate redemption of these new bonds a sinking-fund be established, amounting to one per cent annually of the whole amount, said sinking-fund to be invested in State bonds of the New England States, and city bonds of any New England city of twenty thousand inhabitants whose total permissible debt is not in excess of five per cent of its valuation. I think a sink\_ ing-fund should not be so closely restricted in the line of investments as to practically defeat a large share of the profit to be derived from its establishment. That has been, to some extent, the defect of the sinking-fund of 1868, as pointed out by the Treasurer in his annual report. I recommend only a small sinking-fund for the new bonds,-one which, without burdening the tax-payer, will rapidly extinguish the debt.

I recommend further that a provision be inserted in the Refunding Act, authorizing the Treasurer to exchange the new bond for the old at any time after the passage of the

Act, and further that the Treasurer be given the right to purchase, to the extent of the net amount remaining in the sinking-fund, all Maine bonds that may be offered in advance of their maturity, provided that the terms of exchange and purchase shall be obviously advantageous to the State. These authorizations to the Treasurer will probably result in a considerable saving to the treasury. The exchange of bonds and the purchase of bonds from the resources in the sinking-fund should be conducted with the knowledge and the approval, in writing, of the Governor—the old bonds, in all cases, to be cancelled and held as vouchers for the examination of the next Legislature.

The suspension of the interest on the State bonds now held in the sinking-fund, together with the suspension of the \$80,000 annual contribution to that fund and the termination of the \$50,000 for direct payment of State debt, form the groundwork for the reduction of the State tax, as I have recommended. With the successful refunding of the State debt and the provisions for a new sinking-fund of one per cent, as recommended, a further reduction of the State tax may be confidently expected by the next Legislature.

The State tax to be levied this year, after the reduction referred to, will amount to two and three-quarters mills on the dollar of State valuation, or twenty-seven and one-half cents on each one hundred dollars. But it must be noted that one mill of the two and three-quarters is not the ordinary State tax, but is specially levied for the School fund. Its beneficent operation is such that the rich towns of the State are held in part to educate the children of the towns not so well off in worldly goods. This tax is levied according to property, and divided among the towns according to the number of scholars, so that the rich towns get back a great deal less than they pay, and the towns of less wealth get back a great deal more than they pay. This tax was establised by the Legislature of 1872 and has worked well. Being levied directly by the State it is often confused with the State tax proper,

which is levied for the support of the State Government in all its departments. Deducting this mill tax for schools, the State tax proper for the ensuing year will be only one mill and three-quarters, which is the lowest rate of State tax for support of the Government that has been levied within the last fifty years, with the exception of the tax levied respectively by the Legislatures of 1846, 1860 and 1861. The reduction now recommended relates to the Stax tax proper, and amounts to nearly thirty-seven per cent of the whole amount levied.

These facts are encouraging to the tax-payers of the State and are, in the highest degree, creditable to the care and economy with which the State finances have been administered in the past. In 1868 the State debt was \$8,100,000, and every dollar, except \$699,000, was incurred on account of the war for the suppression of the Rebellion. The payment of five million three hundred thousand dollars which has been made on the principal, leaves only two million eight hundred thousand dollars of the debt and will impose a tax for interest of only \$84,000 per annum. If anything more were needed to guarantee the high credit of the State, it would be found in the constitutional provision which prohibits the incurring of any obligation in excess of three hundred thousand dollars, except for purposes of war. In this will always be found a large protection to our credit and an invaluable safeguard to the tax-payer.

It may be stated as a maxim that there is no expenditure for which the citizen gets so much in return as for the amount he devotes to paying taxes, and yet there is no subject upon which people are more justly sensitive than that the taxes be equal. If all communities, and all the citizens of each community, paid in equal and proper proportion, there would be no complaint among the people. The grievance arises, in large part, from the inequality of taxation, and the inequality arises, in large part, from the errors in valuation—errors in many cases innocently made, no doubt, but still working hardship in many ways.

It should be made the steady aim of the legislative power of the State to equalize the burdens of Government. that end I recommend that an earnest inquiry be made into the mode of our valuation, with the view to its improvement. A Board, composed of one Commissioner from each county, hastily summoned at the close of each decade, with each member naturally endeavoring to have his own county valued at as low a rate as possible, would not seem to be the best method devisable. And yet that is the character of our present system. A smaller number of Commissioners, say not exceeding three, at work for a longer period, chosen, not as the representatives of the counties in which they may reside, but for the whole State, would be less cumbrous, less expensive and in many ways more efficient. The systems of valuation in force in other New England States should be carefully examined. Some improved methods in those States could, I have reason to believe, be profitably incorporated in our own system.

One provision in the Valuation Act I specially recommend, viz: that in case of destructive fire or any other sudden and disastrous calamity in any city or town, the Governor, with the advice of the Council, be authorized to suspend the collection of a certain amount of the State tax levied on said city or town, proportioned to the loss incurred,—said suspension to remain in force until the adjournment of the next ensuing Legislature. If the calamities which have lately befallen the towns of Eastport and Farmington had occurred directly after the adjournment of the Legislature, those towns would have been subjected to great inconvenience and distress for the ensuing two years, which could only have been relieved by summoning an extra session of the Legislature.

In this connection, it may be profitable for the Legislature to inquire whether, in the rapid changes in the relative position of towns, with respect to property, it might not conduce to justice and equality of taxation if the valuation should be revised once in five years instead of once in ten as is now done. The Constitution of the State requires that "a general valuation shall be taken at least once in ten years"—implying that it might be wise to take the valuation oftener. In 1845 a valuation was ordered by the Legislature intermediate between the valuations of 1840 and 1850. I submit the whole subject, in all its important bearings, to your careful inquiry and most mature consideration.

The reports of the workings of our various public institutions for the past two years will be laid before you. They all show gratifying evidences of fulfilling the objects for which they were established. The Hospital for the Insane shows commendable progress in every provision for the comfort and cure of the inmates, and I think it may be said that in all its appointments it is the equal of any institution of the kind in the country. It has been, in all respects, prudently and efficiently administered. I have only one suggestion to make in regard to it, and that is that the criminal insane,-I mean those who have incurred the heavy penalties of the law and have had their sentences commuted on account of insanity,should be kept apart from the general class of patients. Whether this should be done by providing an entirely separate ward, or a small building on the grounds, a little removed from the other buildings, it must be for the wisdom of the Legislature to determine. I commend the subject to your careful inquiry.

I recently paid a visit to the Reform School for Boys and have witnessed with much gratification the condition of that Institution. Its discipline and management do honor to the Superintendent and all his teachers and assistants. I understand that the Trustees will ask for an appropriation for an experiment of the cottage plan, where the boys are treated precisely as though they were in a family, having smaller numbers associated together, and thereby increasing the direct influence of those to whose charge they are committed. I refer the subject to the Legislature, feeling sure that the most careful consideration will be given to it, as involving the wel-

fare of a class of our population who may be turned from evil and made useful and respectable citizens. No subject is more worthy of patient investigation and wise provision.

It was my pleasure, also, to pay a visit to the State Prison, the detailed condition of which will be found in the reports of the Warden and Inspectors. The work of the prisoners, principally engaged on carriage-making, is of a very excellent The carriages, I think, are not sold at prices to interfere with the rights or interests of citizens of the State who are engaged in the same line of business. It is, of course, necessary to keep the prisoners engaged in work, both with the view to proper economy and the view to their improve-It would be utterly cruel to keep ment and reformation. them in idleness, and it would be utterly useless to work them except to some good end. If the number of convicts was very large, it would not be fair to engage them all upon one line of business in competition with any special class of workmanship in the State. I recommend that if the present mode of working the prisoners should prove unfairly hurtful to honest citizens in their calling, there should be such division of the labor of the Prison as would make interference in any specific direction so small that no special influence would be felt from it. I commend to your attention the report of the Prison Commissioners, and specially suggest that due consideration be paid to the facts they have collected touching the number of prisoners in the jails of the several counties. The circumstances which lead to the overcrowding of our jails every winter with petty offenders against the law should, in my judgment, be carefully investigated.

The Industrial School for Girls, established some years since at Hallowell, has proved an excellent institution. It has saved a large number of girls from the unfortunate surroundings in which fate had placed them and has secured for them respectable employment. The report of the Superintendent is well worthy of your examination, and I hope the

Institution will receive the favor and assistance of the Legislature.

The Military and Naval Asylum for Orphans, located at Bath, is a well-managed institution, and continues to deserve the confidence and patronage of the State. There is some effort made to enlarge the basis of admission to its privileges. It will be your duty to carefully examine into the propriety of such action.

Beside the treaty obligations we are under to make certain grants to the remnants of Indian tribes within our borders, we are called upon to do it on the ground of philanthropy and charity. There has of late years been a moral and material improvement in the condition of these wards of the State, and I recommend that this tendency be aided and fostered by all that the Legislature may properly do to that end.

The last Legislature had under consideration the subject of establishing a separate reformatory for the female criminal It then received a large degree of approbation from the members of both Senate and House. I respectfully suggest that the subject be again taken under consideration. am sure that such an institution will elevate the character of our prison discipline and be the means of rescuing many women from a life of degradation. A separate institution, under the care of female officers, affords the delicacy of treatment which is due to women, even in their fallen state, and it is a duty we owe to humanity to provide an institution which will give this advantage in its discipline and treatment. The experiment has been tried with great success in other States, and I commend the subject to the careful consideration of the Legislature. It is one which appeals to manhood and philanthropy with peculiar force and earnestness.

The Board of Health is discharging an important function in the State, and I think the sphere of their duties might be enlarged with great advantage. Every abuse that may lead to disease should be promptly removed, every avenue that

may lead to infection should be promptly closed. The Board of Health should be empowered to see that municipal organizations, common carriers and licensed inn-keepers do their duty in these respects, and that everything practicable be done to render Maine, as nature seems to have designed her, one of the healthiest States on the continent. nection, I beg to suggest that we owe a duty to the large number of citizens of other States who stay among us for the summer season, who have erected residences upon our soil, and who pay taxes into our treasury. Whatever we can properly do to promote their wishes and their comfort should be ungrudgingly and cheerfully done. Our climate has lured them in great numbers, and we shall be negligent in our duty and unmindful of our own interests if, by any carelessness or neglect, we fail to extend them a welcome, give them the most complete protection of our laws, and provide such acts of liberal legislation as may render their stay agreeable and healthful.

The laws for the preservation and increase of fish and game in the State should be rigidly enforced, and, if necessary, additional provisions should be enacted. I call your attention to the report of the Commissioners on this subject. laws already enacted are valuable and beneficent in their operation and effect. Under their enforcement fish and game are both rapidly increasing in the State. The opposition to these laws and the determination to violate them led to a deplorable crime in the county of Washington, in November last, but I trust such an occurrence will stimulate and not discourage the enforcement of the law. I suggest that an inquiry be made, whether the State should not make some provision for the families of the two men who lost their lives in the line of their duty while enforcing the laws of the State. It is important to have a proper public sentiment on this ques-Those who oppose these laws and insist on fishing and hunting in unlawful ways and without regard to seasons, are as unwise as those would be who, with a famine impending,

should insist on devouring the seed corn. Unless these laws be rigidly maintained, there is danger that we shall ultimately have no fish in our waters and no game in our forests.

The attention of the Legislature should be given to ascertaining the best mode for preventing the introduction and spread of the fatal disease of pleuro-pneumonia among the cattle of the State. The disease is not known at present to exist in Maine, but a salutary warning was given by the experience on the farm attached to the Agricultural College at Orono, in 1885. Fuller authority should be given to the State to destroy at once all cattle known to be affected with the The owners will not do the work of destruction themselves, on account of the direct loss incurred, and, therefore, the Government, as a general safeguard to the herds of the State, should assume the task and the cost of instant destruction when the disease is ascertained to exist. One neglected case that might have cost the State fifty dollars to destroy would possibly entail a loss of many thousands of dollars to our cattle growers. It has cost England millions of dollars in her efforts to extirpate the disease, and if the contagion should break out among our vast herds on the western plains the loss would be incalculable. guarding our own State by proper enactments on the subject, I recommend that Congress be memorialized to take the utmost care and precaution, through the national power, to prevent the importation and spread of the disease.

The Agricultural College is doing a good work, which could be made still more effective by increased means. You will be asked for an appropriation for that Institution to replace the valuable herd of cattle destroyed on account of a disease which was infectious and threatening to other herds in the State. This claim is well based and, I think, should be favorably considered. The Trustees of the Institution should guard against experiments in farming and dairying, in competition with neighboring farmers, but they should, at the same time, be enabled to make tests of fertilizers, of the dif-

ferent modes of applying the same, and of the different methods of feeding cattle, sheep and swine; so that the farmers of the State may have the benefit of the knowledge thus derived.

Whatever the Legislature can do to aid and encourage the agricultural interests of the State should be cheerfully and promptly done. The agricultural resources of Maine are very great and are, as yet, only partially developed, and whatever tends to make farming more pleasant and more profitable is always worthy of attention and encouragement.

A measure now before Congress, known as the Hatch bill, for the establishment of experimental stations in different States, will, if it becomes a law, enlarge the power of the Agricultural College, and to a considerable extent, remove the cost of its maintenance from the treasury of the State.

Official reports concerning our educational progress will be laid before you. Maine has always maintained a high rank in the scale of intelligence,—the degree of her illiteracy, by the census tables of the United States, being very small. It would, in fact, be difficult to find a native of Maine of adult years and sound mind who cannot read and write. It is our duty to maintain and still further advance our educational standard, and I am sure the Legislature will not neglect any needed action in this important field.

The provisions for educating the blind and also the deaf and dumb children of the State have thus far proved adequate. These unfortunate children have had the advantages of the best institutions in other States. There is a wish expressed by many for an institution of our own to carry forward the work. While this is in itself desirable, the need of it is not pressing, the children are not neglected, and I cannot recommend that the State should undertake it at present. The expense would, in any event, be large, and it would be several years before the facilities of the new institution would be equal to those already enjoyed.

The militia system of the State, now organized upon a very economical scale, should be cheerfully maintained. I

trust there will be no hesitation on the part of the Legislature to make the appropriation necessary to ensure such advantages of uniform, discipline and drill as may enable Maine soldiers to rival the best organizations in other States. venture to suggest, though not within the domain of State legislation, that it might be wise to have the militia of the several States organized as a national guard, the uniforming, equipping and maintenance of which should be at the expense of the national treasury. Our experience in the late war showed how readily the organization of troops and appointment of officers could be effected under State authority, and yet the whole body, at the moment of necessity, placed under the command of the national government. If a regiment were authorized for each congressional district throughout the country, it would make a large and effective force, furnish a bond of strong sympathy between all the States, especially between the young men of the States, and would give, regardless of the disparity in the wealth of the States, the same ability to organize for the cause of common defense.

While the general government is seeking to get rid of a surplus revenue derived from indirect, unoppressive and unfelt taxes, the militia system of the several States is sustained by direct taxes upon the lands and homes of the people, and in many States is felt to be a financial burden. I think few wiser measures could be enacted by Congress than to unify the militia, give it a truly national character, and create that spirit of pride and emulation between the several States which would tend to make the whole force one of patriotic usefulness, without great expense and without involving any one of the many objections to a standing army. The Constitution of the United States declares that "a well-regulated militia is necessary to the security of a free State," and I think that a national guard, thus organized, would, for the first time in our history, fully carry out the idea of what the militia should be.

If this suggestion should meet with the favorable consideration of the Legislature, I recommend that by proper memorial it be brought to the attention of Congress.

Many of the States whose troops were engaged in defense of the Union at Gettysburg have erected on the battle field monuments or memorial stones commemorative of the event. The troops of Maine were honorably distinguished on that bloody field, and the memory of their heroic deeds should be honored with those of their compatriots. I recommend that the Legislature take appropriate action in the premises,—as justly due to the living and to the dead, and to the honor of the State for all time.

The question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic in Maine has engaged popular attention within the last year to a considerable extent. The agitation has resulted in a re-affirmation on the part of the people, at the polls, of their full faith in the prohibitory system, and of their desire to see the law fairly administered and properly enforced. The situation in the State respecting the law may be briefly and candidly In from three-fourths to four-fifths of the towns of the State the law is well enforced and has practically abolished the sale of spirituous and malt liquors as a beverage. In the larger cities and towns, on the seaboard and at railway centers, it has been found more difficult to secure perfect compliance with the law, but it can still be said that at very few points in the State is liquor openly sold. The offenses against the law are in large part clandestine, and therefore difficult to detect and expose by legal testimony. But it is a great moral gain when the liquor seller is driven from the light of day to secret places and to stealthy devices to carry on his hurtful and demoralizing traffic.

Some of the more zealous friends of the temperance cause think that an increase of the penalties, especially for the first offense of liquor selling, would cure the admitted evil of imperfect enforcement, but the more prudent, and I think by far the larger number, are of the opinion that an increase of the penalty would do harm, rather than good. What is actually needed at the points named is a sound public opinion to urge and uphold the enforcement of the law. Where that is wanting the case is made difficult with the prohibitory law, as indeed it always is with every form of law. Perhaps an increase of penalty would, in the places referred to, enhance, rather than diminish, the evils of indifference and of hostility.

It can, however, be said with satisfaction that even with this imperfect enforcement at certain points, the law has been of immeasurable value in reducing the liquor traffic, and has correspondingly increased the wealth of the State by increasing the sobriety of the people and saving the fruits of industry. One evil, inseparable from a law enacted after a strong popular contest, is that the prevailing side is looked to as the one to enforce its provisions, whereas every law should be as binding upon those who opposed its enactment as upon those who labored for it. The experience of Maine for the last thirty years abundantly justifies the adoption of the prohibitory system, and it will be the duty of the Legislature to add to its efficiency in whatever way, after full and impartial investigation, may be found practicable,-always remembering that legal penalties must be kept inside, and not pressed beyond, the bounds of public opinion.

For several years complaint has been made of the law in this State which, under certain conditions, permits imprisonment for debt. There is something repulsive to our better feelings in this treatment; something, also, that contradicts common sense in such a remedy. If a man owes a debt and has no property, and you deprive him of the power of working, how can he pay it? Morcover, society has no right to inflict an ignominious punishment upon a man for the misfortune that deprives him of the power of meeting a pecuniary obligation. I therefore recommend that every law and part of law which permits imprisonment for debt in Maine be repealed. In taking this step we are but following the

enlightened policies of the great majority of our sister States in the Union.

I also recommend that trustee process, so far as it relates to the wages of a laboring man, be abolished. The undoubted result of these steps will be to curtail the credit of laboring men, and to keep them from incurring obligations which readily absorb their earnings. It will force the relations between employer and the employed to a cash basis, and will largely benefit the laboring man by adding perceptibly to the value of his day's wages. It will, I think, be found that the saving resulting to the labor of the State from the cash basis will show itself in an addition to the aggregate deposits in the savings banks of the State. Imprisonment for debt and trustee process both being removed, the laborer is made a free man, with no unjust penalties menacing him and no one tempting him to incur needless debt.

There is reason to believe that abuses occur in permitting children of too tender age to work in our factories. This should be prohibited by law. I recommend that children shall not be admitted to work in factories before the age of fifteen years. This will give time for strength and growth, and also for acquiring the rudiments of a good education. In this matter, the parents who seek work for their children are as often to blame as the employers in factories, and the penalty adopted should be made to apply to whichever is the offending party. A special penalty should be attached to the offense of misrepresenting the age of the child.

I recommend, further, that labor in all corporations in the State be absolutely restricted by law to ten hours a day, and that a day's labor outside of corporations shall always be left, as now defined by statute, at ten hours. If a day's labor be less or more than that, it must be by virtue of a special contract between the parties, and be regulated by the hour. The multiplication of machinery and the great addition to the power of manufacturing ought naturally to be followed by some amelioration in the hours of labor. The

length of a day's work might be, even now, further reduced, if the wants of the people did not multiply in equal ratio with the facilities for gratifying them. If men with the earnings of to-day should live after the manner of forty or fifty years ago, a large surplus would result from daily wages; but as wants multiply additional means are required. It is, however, a satisfaction to believe that the tendency is in the right direction, and that the average wages of working-men throughout the United States, reckoned in coin and measured by their ability to purchase the necessaries and luxuries of life, are larger than they have ever before been in any period of our history, while at the same time the average hours of labor are shorter.

A pleasant custom has grown up within the last few years in many of the States to have an annual holiday, known as "Arbor Day." It is devoted wholly to the planting of trees, useful, ornamental, and in many cases for memorial purposes; and under the proclamation of the Governor appointing the day and specifying its purpose, a very large amount of tree planting has been accomplished in many of the States. The custom is one which I think may be profitably adopted in this State, and I suggest that a law to that effect be enacted by the Legislature.

The State Government of Maine is now in the sixty-eighth year of its organization. In that long period the archives of the State have increased in interest, in value and in magnitude. It certainly is a matter of great regret that, aside from the vault in the Treasurer's office, there is no provision whatever in the State House for fire-proof chambers. If a fire should destroy the documents in the several departments, the loss to the State Government and to the people would be incalculable. After the calamity was accomplished we should all wonder that we had been willing to take the risk of a single day's delay in making suitable provision for the preservation of these documents, which are incapable of duplication.

As the plan of enlarging the State House, including a library and large fire-proof chambers, at a cost of \$80,000, has not received the favor of past Legislatures, I do not now renew it. But I urgently recommend that a fire-proof brick building of moderate cost be erected in the rear of the State House, the upper floor to be given to the State Library and the lower floor to fire-proof vaults for the permanent security of all the papers of the State which have permanent value. As the burden of State taxation will be much lighter hereafter, the comparatively small cost of a building of this character is hardly worthy of consideration, in view of the very great object to be attained by its construction. Its inestimable importance is my excuse for urging it upon the attention of the Legislature with such earnestness.

Our ship-building and navigation interests, in common with those of other maritime nations, are not as prosperous as could be desired. The cause of the decay in the American marine is not difficult to explain, and I regret that the remedy is not within the power of the State. In addition to this, we are vexed with a serious trouble to the American fishing interest. It is evident that our fishermen are now to be antagonized by every possible effort on the part of the Canadian Government. The Imperial Government of Great Britain, it is now announced, has sanctioned an act of the Canadian Parliament by which every harsh and unreasonable condition of the Treaty of 1818 is to be revived and enforced against The plain motive of this is to coerce American fishermen. the United States into conceding trade relations which, under the name of "reciprocity," are hostile to many interests of our people.

It is always desirable to maintain the most friendly relations with our neighbors, but I think it is the plain duty of our national government to teach Canada that the spirit of vindictive aggression, which she is showing towards our fishermen, cannot bring any advantage to her. A simple and direct remedy would be to levy such increased duty on the

fish which Canada sends to the United States as would stimulate our own fishermen, and partially, if not wholly, exclude Canadian fishermen from the advantages of our market. It would, I think, be advantageous to demonstrate to the Canadian government that retaliation is very easy, and that, reluctant as we should be to resort to it, we could soon throw the loss incident to the existing dispute wholly upon the fishermen of the Dominion.

It may, upon investigation, seem expedient for you to make a proper representation to the national government on this subject, which closely touches the interest of many of our citizens.

Gentlemen of the Senate and House, we may congratulate ourselves that we assemble at a time of general prosperity in the State. While our progress is not so rapid as that of some States more highly favored in natural advantages, our growth is steady and substantial. One most gratifying feature in our advance is shown in the general participation of the people in all that relates to the growth of the State in wealth and comfort. We do not have one class in Maine growing unfairly at the expense of any other. Under the beneficent influence of a protective tariff our manufactures have largely expanded and every other industry of the State, except the one already referred to, has grown with them. The fifty-four savings banks show that a large surplus is in the hands of the mass of the people. On the first day of November the aggregate deposits in those banks were in excess of \$38,000,000. The wide distribution of ownership of this large sum of money is shown by the fact that the number of depositors was 114,691, and of this number more than 90,000 owned less than \$500 each. The increase of deposits in the past year was more than \$2,000,000, and the increase of depositors was 5,293.

These figures tell their own story and speak more eloquently and more persuasively than any argument for the present industrial system of the United States, which gives such large facilities for the honest workingman to secure an independence. The savings banks have done a faithful work for the people of the State, and have encouraged a spirit of thrift and economy among all classes which cannot be too highly praised. With the same general object in view, another form of combined effort is now being made by the building associations of the State, by which men of very moderate means are enabled to acquire comfortable homes on easy terms and long time. If anything can be done by the Legislative power to promote the object of these new associations, I am sure they will receive your most favorable consideration.

We are entrusted with the government of a State whose affairs in the past have been wisely and prudently administered. Cherishing a spirit of devotion to public duty, and invoking the blessing of God, without whose aid all human effort is vain, let us turn to the work that is set before us to do.

## JOSEPH R. BODWELL.

At the conclusion of the address, the Governor and his suite retired.

The purposes of the convention having been accomplished, the Senate retired, and the House was called to order by the Speaker.

The House here took a recess of fifteen minutes.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. Tilden, its Secretary, proposing a joint convention, to be held this day, forthwith, in the Representatives' Hall, for the purpose of electing a Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Adjutant General and seven Executive Councillors, and asking the concurrence of the House.

The Clerk was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate, informing that body of the concurrence of the House in the proposition of the Secretary for a joint convention to be held forthwith in the Representatives' Hall, for the purpose of electing a

Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Adjutant General and seven Executive Councillors.

The hour for the joint convention for the election of a Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Adjutant General and seven Executive Councillors having arrived, the Senate came in and a convention was then formed.

The report was read and accepted and Hon. Oramandal Smith, having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly elected Secretary of State for the current political years of 1887 and 1888.

Mr. WAKEFIELD of Bath sent to the desk and had read "Resolutions in opposition to the Dunn Free Ship Bill," now pending in the United States Congress, and in a brief speech moved the suspension of rules and passage of the resolutions.

The motion was seconded by Mr. O'BRIEN of Thomaston, and, rules being suspended, resolutions were read twice, passed to be engrossed and sent to the Senate.

WHEREAS, There has been a petition presented to the Legislature, asking to be granted a charter for a railroad from Sebago Lake to Mechanic Falls; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution, article 4, section 4, provides that "corporations shall be formed under general laws and shall not be created by special act of the Legislature, except for municipal purposes, and in cases where the objects of the corporation cannot otherwise be attained; and, however formed, they shall forever be subject to the general laws of the State,"

Now, therefore, as much litigation may arise as to the right of the Legislature to grant railroad charters, and also such corporations organized under the general law by the Railroad Commissioners, be it

Resolved, That the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court of the State be requested to give their opinion to the Legislature on the following questions, to wit:

Is the general law referred to in the Constitution sufficient in all its provisions to organize railroad corporations? and, if so,

Has the Legislature power to grant charters to railroads? and in a brief speech, moved suspension of rules and the immediate passage of same. Whereupon Mr. TALBOT of East Machias moved that same be referred to the Judiciary Committee. Pending

action thereon, Mr. MOORE of Deering moved that the matter be laid upon the table, and this motion, having precedence, was put and carried by a *viva voce* vote of 54 in favor to 32 opposed, and the matter was then tabled.

Before this question was put, Mr. TALBOT withdrew his motion, and finally, on motion of Mr. MOORE, the matter was ordered printed and referred, after printing, to the Committee on Railroads, Telegraphs and Expresses.

The House here took a recess of twenty minutes, at the expiration of which time the Speaker called to order.

The purpose of the convention having been accomplished, the Senate retired.

Mr. PATTANGALL of Pembroke moved the "previous question." This motion was lost, 44 members only voting in favor.

Mr. TALBOT then moved a call of the roll, but subsequently withdrew this motion by consent of the House.

Mr. WAKEFIELD of Bath then moved that the House do now adjourn to meet at four P. M., to-day.

This motion, amended on motion of Mr. DAVISON of Greenville, to 4.30 P. M., was carried, and the House adjourned to afternoon, the pending question being the substitution of the minority for the majority reports.

Said committee shall have power to employ a stenographer and to send for such persons and papers as may be necessary to accomplish the purposes of such investigations, their report to be made to this Legislature as soon as practicable,"

Came from the Senate, report read and accepted, amended order read and passed in accordance with recommendation of conference committee, and sent down for concurrent action, and the report was read and accepted, and amended order read and passed in concurrence.

## Mr. WALTON of Skowhegan:

Mr. Speaker—I noticed a bill among those passed to be engrossed which troubles me somewhat—an act to protect trout and land-locked

salmon in Wilson and North Ponds, in Franklin County. I do not know as I understand that bill, but if I do understand it, the act leaves the "suckers" in those ponds to the mercies of the cold, unfeeling world at all seasons of the year. (Laughter.)

Speaker-The chair takes that view of it.

Mr. WALTON—We have legislated upon all sorts of fish and birds and animals, I think, even to the woodchuck. (Laughter.) We refused to legislate against him, which is equivalent to legislation for his protection. Now the sucker was the first fish that I became acquainted with in my boyhood days. (Laughter.) I have a great respect for the sucker. (Great laughter.) I don't see why the sucker should be left out of the legislation of the Legislature. (Prolonged laughter.) And, Mr. Speaker, I move to reconsider the vote passing this bill to be engrossed. I wish to offer an amendment to strike out of a bill the words "except suckers."

Speaker—The gentleman from Skowhegan moves to reconsider the vote passing the bill to be engrossed. Is the House ready for the question? The question is, "Shall the suckers stand or fall?"

Mr. WALTON—Mr. Speaker, when the question is taken I call for the yeas and nays.

The yeas and nays were ordered.

Mr. TALBOT—Mr. Speaker, I rose simply to say that I shall cast my vote entirely upon the representations of the gentleman from Skowhegan that he has been acquainted with suckers from his boyhood up.

# Mr. HAYDEN of Sangerville:

I should like to hear from the member in that vicinity. I know the pond and I know the people have taken great pains to stock it with fish. Suckers are a nuisance. They catch all they want of them and the people are glad of it.

### Mr. VAUGHN of Jay:

Mr. Speaker—I believe I know the wish of these petitioners as well as any person in this House. I understand something about who they are, and I believe that the committee, before which this petition was brought, by looking over the names on the petition and referring to those who knew them, found that they are gentlemen whose wishes should be granted; and as I believe that this is one of the

best petitions that has been presented to this House asking for any measure to be granted in relation to the fish laws, I ask this House to support that petition in full, as it is given to us.

Mr. CORSON of New Sharon:

Mr. Speaker—I wish to base my remark on the statement of the gentleman from Skowhegan. He said the first fish he became acquainted with in his boyhood days was the sucker, and now he votes to deprive all the boys in that section of the privilege of becoming acquainted with the sucker. (Great laughter.) On that basis of fact he should vote against the motion of the gentleman.

Mr. CLARK of Calais:

Mr. Speaker—I rise to suggest that by this action the gentleman from Skowhegan also proposes to deprive the farmers of that vicinity of the privilege of raising potatoes from suckers. (Laughter.)

Mr. RANDALL of Augusta:

Mr. Speaker—The sentiment of this House is decidedly opposed to class legislation, and I believe the gentleman from Skowhegan will withdraw his motion to protect the class for which he seems to counsel here. (Prolonged laughter.)

Mr. WALTON—Well, Mr. Speaker, if the gentleman wants to go home and go suckering, I suppose I must withdraw my motion. (Laughter.)

No objection being made, the motion was withdrawn.

Mr. TALBOT—Mr. Speaker, I would like to inquire where that action leaves the sucker.

Speaker. I understand that the sucker is by this left to the tender mercies of this cold, unfeeling world. (Laughter.)

On motion of Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston,

Voted, That when the House adjourn it be to meet Monday next at 4.30 P. M.

On motion of Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent, Adjourned.

On motion of Mr. FOGG of Portland,

House Document No. 142, bill "An Act to amend section 4, chapter 505, Private and Special Laws of 1885, relating to the Provident Aid Society," was taken from the table, amendment "A" offered by Mr. DOW adopted, passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate Amendments and House Amendment A, and was sent to the Senate.

Mr. CHASE of Damariscotta moved to reconsider the vote of yesterday, by which the House passed to be engrossed Senate Document No. 18, "Resolve in favor of the Maine State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts," and to assign Friday of next week at 11 o'clock for consideration of this motion. This motion was put and carried. Mr. MANLEY of Augusta then moved that the House reconsider its action in adopting Mr. CHASE'S motion, and the House thereupon reconsidered said action. Mr. BARKER of Bangor then moved that the motion to reconsider and assign be indefinitely postponed, which motion was put and carried, and the papers were then sent to the Senate.

Mr. LOMBARD of Windham offered amendment "A," which was adopted, and also offered an amendment to strike out section four of said bill, which was also adopted. Mr. TALBOT of East Machias then moved the indefinite postponement of the bill, and pending action on this motion, Mr. HORIGAN of Biddeford moved to commit the bill to the Committee on Legal Affairs. Committee on Legal Affairs and subsequently withdrew the motion. Mr. WALTON of Skowhegan then moved that the bill and amendments be re-committed to the Committee on Agriculture. This motion was carried, the bill and amendments re-committed to the Committee on Agriculture, and the papers sent to the Senate.

Paper from the Senate:

Ordered, That the Treasurer of the State be authorized to assess the State Tax for the years 1887 and 1888, and to employ such additional clerical assistance at the expense of the State, as he may deem necessary for that purpose.

This order came from the Senate read and passed, and was read and passed in concurrence.

Mr. BEAL of Fairfield presented the following order:

Ordered, That when this House adjourn next Friday, one week from to-day, we adjourn to meet on the first Wednesday of January, 1888, at 11 o'clock A. M.

On motion of Mr. MANLEY of Augusta, this order was laid on the table.

House Document No. 159, bill "An Act to provide for a bureau of industrial and labor statistics," came up as the next special assignment in order, pending second reading.

On motion of Mr. MARSTON of Hallowell, the House voted to suspend the rule and to postpone the consideration of this assignment, taking up in its place House Document No. 160, House Document No. 161, House Document No. 162, being the several reports of the Committee on Labor, with the several labor bills accompanying, standing next on the list of to-day's assignments.

Mr. MARSTON, then moved to re-assign these matters for consideration to Tuesday next at 11 o'clock A. M. This motion was lost on a *viva voce* vote, 37 voting in favor to 62 against the same.

Mr. TALBOT of East Machias then moved that these matters be re-assigned to Wednesday next at 11 o'clock A. M. This motion was also lost.

Mr. BURNS of Poland moved that minority report "B," reporting "ought to pass" on House Document No. 162, bill "An Act

regulating the hours of labor of men, women and children in manufacturing and mechanical establishments," be substituted for the majority report, reporting same on House Document No. 160, the "Looney Bill" so-called.

Mr. WALTON of Skowhegan here made the point of order that the Committee on Labor having disregarded the instructions of the Legislature, re-committing to them these matters and the Bureau of Labor Statistics Bill, and having reported contrary to said instructions, that the matter was not in order.

This point was overruled by the Speaker, and unappealed from.

Mr. SHAW of Portland then moved to amend the motion offered by Mr. BURNS by substituting for the majority report minority report A of said committee, reporting "ought to pass" on House Document No. 161, the Bryant Bill, so-called, "An Act regulating the hours of labor and establishing a bureau of industrial statistics and labor."

Pending action on this motion, Mr. BARKER moved to lay these matters on the table for the purpose of considering House Document No. 159, bill "An Act to provide a bureau of industrial and labor statistics," pending its second reading.

This motion prevailed, and the House proceeded to consider House Document No. 159.

On motion of Mr. LYONS of Vinalhaven, rules were suspended and the bill received its second and third reading.

Mr. SHAW of Portland offered and withdrew amendment A to section three of said bill.

Mr. MARSTON of Hallowell offered amendment B to section three of said bill, which was adopted, also an amendment (G) to section two thereof, changing comma to semicolon after the word "peoples," which was also adopted.

Mr. NEWBERT of Appleton offered an amendment striking out the word "laboring" in section two of the bill, which was rejected.

Mr. RANDALL of Augusta offered amendment E to the sixth section of said bill, which was adopted.

Mr. MARSTON of Hallowell offered amendment D to section seven of said bill, changing the word "monthly" to "quarterly," which was adopted.

Mr. HARRINGTON of Norridgewock offered amendment F, striking out section nine of said bill. This amendment was adopted. The bill then passed to be engrossed as amended by House Amendments "B," "D," "E," "F" and "G," and was sent to the Senate.

Mr. NEWBERT of Appleton presented the following:

Ordered, That when this House adjourns it adjourn to meet on Monday next at 4.30 P. M.

Mr. CONDON of Friendship moved to amend the order by substituting for "Monday next at 4.30 P. M." 'this afternoon at 2.30 P. M.'

The amendment was adopted, and the order as amended was then read and passed.

On motion of Mr. LYONS of Vinalhaven, adjourned to afternoon at 2.30 P. M.

Mr. LOONEY of Portland at this stage raised the point that there was "no quorum present."

Mr. WRIGHT of Paris:

Mr. Speaker, I rise to a question of privilege. When the vote was taken yesterday on the labor bill, on its passage to be engrossed, my name was recorded as among the absentees, which is the fact. When I went away on Saturday I supposed, beyond any question, that the labor bills were to go over until Tuesday, and under those circumstances I felt it safe to be absent, as it was a matter of some interest that I should be. Had I been here I should have recorded my vote "yea" on the passage of the bill to be engrossed. And if the rules would permit of it, I should desire to have my name recorded as so voting.

The Speaker—By the unanimous consent of the House the record can be so amended, and if no objection is made, the Chair will instruct the clerk to so enter it on the record.

#### Mr. ALLEN of Alfred:

I have the same reason to offer. An attempt was made on Friday to postpone the bill until Tuesday, but was defeated. Saturday morning I was informed that opposition would be withdrawn and the bill postponed. Mr. WALTON thought such a commission would be an expensive one, and that it was the business of the superintendent of schools to attend to such matters and make such recommendations to the Legislature as he saw fit. If the Legislature saw fit, they would adopt his recommendations.

Mr. HERSEY of Harpswell thought that several supervisors of schools in districts were commission enough to investigate matters connected with the schools.

Mr. WALTON said that in order to settle the question properly, he would withdraw his motion to lay on the table, and substitute a motion to indefinitely postpone the order.

The motion to indefinitely postpone prevailed.

In reply to the order of the House of Representatives of yester-day, I will say that I do not find any evidence in this office that the State has claimed any title to land in Township 18, Range 6, since the treaty lots were conveyed and land in that township conveyed to James Jenkins in 1853.

I find no evidence of application for settling land by any settler in that township. I am not prepared to say that the State does not hold title to some land in that township, but how much and what part, if any, I am not able to state from the hasty examination I have been able to make.

If the resolve, House Document 257, should pass, it may be necessary to make a partial survey, as the description in Barker's report is too indefinite for a conveyance.

Rules were suspended, the votes engrossing and enacting the bill were reconsidered, Senate Amendment was adopted, and the bill passed to be engrossed as amended in concurrence.

Senate Document No. 56, bill "An Act to regulate the employment of the convicts at the Maine State Prison," which passed to be engrossed in the House March 15th as amended by Senate Amendment "A," and House Amendment "B" came back from the Senate further amended by Senate Amendments "C" and "D," passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate Amendments "A," "C" and "D," and House Amendment "B," and sent down for concurrence.

Mr. BARKER moved that the House concur in the adoption of the amendments.

Mr. HARRINGTON of Norridgewock hoped the gentlemen would consider the fact that this bill was an interference with the rights of the Governor and Council, who had the management of the prison.

Mr. MOORE of Deering moved that the bill lie on the table.

Mr. RANDALL would like to have an explanation of the Senate Amendment "C."

Mr. O'BRIEN afforded the same.

The motion to lay on the table was lost.

The question then recurred on the motion to concur with the amendments of the Senate.

Mr. O'BRIEN said that the House yesterday refused to pass the appropriation for this prison, and now the Legislature was providing for a radical change in the operation of the prison, without appropriating the money to carry it out. He therefore moved to indefinitely postpone the bill.

Mr. WISWELL raised the point of order that the motion was decided yesterday.

The Chair ruled that the question now was upon the adoption of the Senate Amendments. After that was disposed of he should entertain the motion to indefinitely postpone.

Mr. MANLEY of Augusta, presented bill "An Act to incorporate the Maine Improvement Manufacturers, Contractors and Constructing Company," and the House refused to receive and consider the same.

House Document No, 257, "Resolve requiring the Land Agent to convey certain lots in Township No. 18, Range 6, W. E. L. S.," was taken from the table, amended by substituting printed House Document No. 257, as amended in writing, rules suspended, resolve read twice, passed to be engrossed, and was sent to the Senate.

The Temperance Bill: House Document No. 146, bill "An Act amendatory of and additional to chapter 27, Revised Statutes, and amendatory of chapters 359 and 366, Public Laws of 1885, relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors," which passed to be engrossed and enacted in the House, came back from the Senate amended by Senate Amendment "L," the Senate having reconsidered its action, engrossing and enacting the bill, passed to be engrossed as amended and sent down for concurrence.

On motion of Mr. NEWBERT of Appleton, the House voted not to concur, and the bill was returned to the Senate. Subsequently, the same was returned from the Senate, the Senate having voted to insist, and a committee of conference appointed on its part, as follows:

Mr. WISWELL addressed the House in opposition to the bill, as also Mr. Billings of Brownville, Mr. Small of Steuben and Mr. Randall of Augusta.

Messrs. Gifford of Auburn, Condon of Friendship, Hersey of Harpswell, Hamilton of Cumberland, Chase of Damariscotta, supported the bill.

Mr. ALEXANDER called for the previous question.

Mr. WAKEFIELD was opposed to indefinite postponement, but he wanted the bill perfected.

Mr. WILSON then spoke in favor of the bill.

During his remarks, Mr. ALEXANDER again called for the previous question.

Mr. WRIGHT of Paris raised the point of order, that the Chair should take the sense of the House on the motion for the previous question.

The Chair (Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston), sustained the point of order, and the motion being put, the main question was ordered.

Mr. WILSON of Belfast made the point of order that one-fifth of the House had not ordered the previous question.

The Chair ruled that the vote had not been doubted, and he should hold the previous question ordered.

On motion of Mr. SHAW, the gentleman from Belfast was allowed to proceed by unanimous consent.

The report of the committee was then accepted on motion of Mr. CONDON of Friendship.

Mr. WISWELL moved to amend by striking out section 6 of the bill.

After discussion between Messrs. Wiswell, Condon and Wilson, the amendment was defeated by a vote of 36 to 54.

Mr. WISWELL moved to amend section 5, line 15, after the word "liberated," by inserting the words 'provided, however, if it appears that he intended to liberate them in accordance with the provisions of this act, he shall not be liable, though he may have failed from any cause not within his control to so liberate them.'

Messrs. Condon and Wilson opposed the last amendment.

The amendment was adopted on a viva voce vote.

Mr. MANLEY moved to amend section 7, by striking out the words "one-half to the complainant or prosecutor, and one-half," and also to strike out the word "county," and insert the words city or town.

Messrs. Wilson, Condon, Fisher and Gifford opposed the amendment. It was supported by Messrs. Manley, Hersey and Wakefield.

The amendment was adopted by a viva voce vote.

Mr. WISWELL offered also the following amendment as an additional section. 'No prosecution or action shall be settled by the complainant or prosecutor without first having in writing the consent of the municipal officers of the city or town entitled to a part of the penalty; and no settlement shall be made without payment to said city or town of its share of penalties. Any person settling such complaint or prosecution contrary to the provisions of this act shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$100.' Subsequently Mr. WISWELL withdrew this amendment.

Mr. WISWELL moved to amend the last line of the last section by striking out the word "seven" and inserting the word 'eight,' so as to make the law go into effect July 1st, 1888.

Mr. CONDON opposed the amendment.

Mr. WAKEFIELD suggested that the amendment be changed so as to allow it to go into effect on the west side of the coast at once, and the east part July 1st, 1888. He thought that would obviate objection.

Mr. WISWELL doubted the power of the Legislature to make such a distinction, but he was willing to make the provisions of the bill, as to the canning of lobsters, go into effect July 1st, 1888.

Messrs. Hersey, Hamilton of Cumberland, opposed the amendment. The amendment was defeated by a vote of 38 to 65.

Bill as amended was read three times and passed to be engrossed, under suspension of the rules.

On motion of Mr. MANLEY of Augusta,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be directed to forward to each member and officer of the House, when the same are printed, one copy of the acts and resolves of 1887, one copy of the Maine State Year Book for 1887 and 1888, one copy of the Journal of the House for this session.

Report of the second committee of conference on bill "An Act to repeal section 46, chapter 38, Revised Statutes, relating to the measure of milk," reporting that the committee are unable to agree, was read and accepted. Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston moved that the

House still insist, the motion prevailed. A third committee of conference was appointed, as follows:

and the bill returned to the Senate.

Subsequently, the bill came back with the committee joined upon the part of the Senate, as follows:

Senate Document No. 37, bill "An Act to amend section 6, chapter 20, Revised Statutes, relating to ferries," came up as a special assignment pending passage to be engrossed, was amended by House Amendment "A," and, on motion of Mr. BILLINGS of Brownville, was indefinitely postponed, and sent to the Senate.

House Document No. 263, bill "An Act to amend sections 92, 95, 100 and 119, chapter 47, Revised Statutes, relating to savings banks," tabled before recess, pending passage to engrossed, was taken from the table, passed to be engrossed, and sent to the Senate.

House Document No. 207, bill "An Act authorizing the appointment of special insurance brokers," was taken from the table, the pending question being its third reading, received its third reading, was amended on motion of Mr. SHAW of Portland by House Amendment "A," passed to be engrossed as amended, and was sent to the Senate.

Bill "An Act to amend section 4, chapter 141, Revised Statutes, relating to vagrants," was reported from the Committee on Engrossed Bills, as truly and strictly engrossed, was amended on motion of Mr. WRIGHT of Paris by House Amendment "A," passed to be engrossed as amended, and was sent to the Senate.

"Resolve relative to clerk hire for the Bank Examiner," was reported from same committee as truly and strictly engrossed, was finally passed, signed by the Speaker, and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. MOORE of Deering,

Bill "An Act to amend an act entitled An Act to amend section 8, chapter 24, Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter 269, Public

Laws of 1885, approved February 1, 1887, relating to paupers," was taken from the table.

Mr. MOORE moved to suspend the rules, consider the bill without reference to committee, read the bill three times and pass it to be engrossed.

Mr. MOORE supported his bill, claiming that the law as it now stood was a reflection upon soldiers of the State.

Messrs. HARRINGTON, WALTON and WRIGHT, would not favor any bill that cast a reflection upon soldiers, but they wanted the towns also protected. They desired such an amendment as would meet the objections of Mr. MOORE, without disturbing the law.

Mr. HARRINGTON, therefore, moved to amend by substituting a bill which he submitted.

Mr. WRIGHT moved to amend the amendment by adding at the end of the words 'other than on the poor farm.'

The amendment to the amendment was accepted by Mr. HAR-RINGTON.

Messrs. MOORE and SANBORN of Standish opposed the amendment.

The amendment was lost.

The question recurred on the motion to suspend the rules and consider the bill without reference.

Mr. HARRINGTON moved to indefinitely postpone the bill.

The motion to indefinitely postpone was defeated on a viva voce vote.

The motion to suspend the rules prevailed; the bill was read twice.

Mr. SHAW moved that the bill be tabled for the purpose of allowing an amendment to be offered that would meet the desires of the gentlemen opposed to the bill.

Mr. MOORE was willing to accept any amendment for that purpose.

Mr. HARRINGTON thought that the amendment ought to come from the other side at the present time.

The motion to lie on the table was defeated.

Mr. MOORE moved that the rules be suspended and the bill take its third reading at the present time.

Mr. WALTON hoped the matter would lie on the table until tomorrow morning to allow amendments to come in.

On motion of Mr. MANLEY of Augusta, the House voted to take a recess until 7.30 this evening.

## EVENING SESSION.

Mr. MOORE'S motion pending at time of recess, was again considered, and rules were suspended.

Mr. SHAW of Portland offered an amendment "A," which was adopted, and the bill, as amended, passed to be engrossed, and was sent to the Senate.

Bill "An Act additional to chapter 30, Revised Statutes, providing for a bounty on crows," which passed to be enacted in the House,

Came back from the Senate indefinitely postponed, and, on motion of Mr. RYDER of Springfield, the House voted to recede and concur with the Senate.

Bill "An Act to amend section 18, chapter 4, Revised Statutes, relating to time of opening and closing of the polls at elections," which passed to be enacted in the House,

Came back from the Senate indefinitely postponed, and, on motion of Mr. POWERS of Houlton, the House voted to recede and concur with the Senate.

Report of the Committee on State Prison, reporting bill "An Act establishing the salary of the Warden of the State Prison," Senate Document No. 25,

Came from the Senate indefinitely postponed, and was indefinitely postponed in concurrence, on motion of Mr. ROBERTS of Brunswick.

House Document No. 252, bill "An Act to abolish the attachment of wages by trustee process," which was indefinitely postponed in the House, came back from the Senate refused a passage, and the House voted to concur on motion of Mr. WILEY of Fryeburg.

House Document No. 188, bill "An Act to amend section 31, chapter 40, Revised Statutes, relating to migratory fishes in Damariscotta River," which passed to be engrossed in the House March 1st, came back from the Senate indefinitely postponed.

Mr. NOBLE'S order relating to the report of the Railroad Committee, was taken from the table and indefinitely postponed.

House Document No. 246, bill "An Act to amend chapter 351, Public Laws of 1885, relating to agricultural institutions," on the table pending passage to be engrossed, was taken from the table, and, on motion of Mr. WRIGHT of Paris, was indefinitely postponed and sent to the Senate.

House Document No. 253, bill "An Act to authorize towns to hold money for cemetery purposes, on the table pending passage to be engrossed, was taken from the table on motion of Mr. ROBERTS of Brunswick, and indefinitely postponed. For many successive sessions of this Legislature, that gentleman has been a member of this House, faithfully and always pleading the cause of his constituents living

in that far off region, who speak a language not our own, and never neglecting an opportunity to provide for and look out for their welfare.

Take the picture then, Major, and when you look at it, try to emulate the virtues of the gentleman whose picture it is, and at the same time give a friendly thought to the donors.

# Mr. DICKEY:

As you remark, it is the first time I have been called upon accept a present thus presented, and to you, Mr. Walton and the gentlemen who through you present me with this picture, I return my sincere thanks, believing as I do that it comes not only from the heart but through the social intercourse and love, one for the other.

To me this picture is of great value, not that I shall live long to possess it and to see it, but I have children that will like long perhaps and honor their father and honor those that gave it.

It is to me a source of great consolation that in my long life with the Legislature and with social friends, I can say that I have but few enemies. I do not know that I have any. It has been my desire to live and do for my constituents all that I could. They have been incapable of doing for themselves; their language is different, and they had been a simple people for many years before we took them. The result is that I have a large amount of that kind of business that no other member has. But to them all I return my sincere thanks for their kindness, and I now say to those who gave me this picture that I accept it in all gratitude and love.

To the honor of the Speaker, to the honor of this House, that promise has been fulfilled. Long has been our session, and but for the ability and energy with which our presiding officer has pushed forward the affairs of State, it would have been still further protracted. For this we, on behalf of the public, thank him. No member, however inexperienced or diffident, has sought the eye of the Speaker and found it wandering. For this we, as individuals, thank him.

I desire to offer a resolution which I will shortly read, and I move its adoption by a unanimous and a rising vote. I offer this resolution and I hope it will be adopted, not in the fulfilment of a mere formal duty, not in deference to any ancient custom, but because it voices alike the impulsive feelings of the heart and the cool judgment of the head; not to honor our Speaker, for he who has so worthily filled that high position has honored the Speaker's chair by his acceptance. It is rather to honor ourselves by showing to the

world both our ability and our disposition to appreciate the work of a public servant who has been at once diligent and faithful.

Surely, these alone are glories enough for a lasting monument to us, and I may say as did our honored statesman, Hamlin—"Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace."

During our long and patient labors together, we have cultivated for each other a lasting friendship and have felt a depth of warm love. We have felt the radiant sunset of evening, a glow of pure affection for each other, and an ardent love and admiration for our Speaker. Surely no former presiding officer has more fully satisfied the members of the House of Representatives—dignified, impartial as he is. His force to accomplish, his cordial greeting, his glow of mirth, his quick decision, his love of right in all his official course, endear him to us. As members, one to another, party has blended in love. Kindness has guided us in the most fierce debate.

Allow me, as the "senior" member of the House, to thank you for you great kindness to me, and your unanimous support in all my measures for the relief and benefit of my people

Our separation so abides and flies, That those residing here go yet with me; And I, home fleeing, here abide with thee.

## Mr. BARKER said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen of the House:—After a long and very pleasant session, the time has now come when we are about to depart and return to our respective homes with feelings of mingled sorrow and gladness. I feel that it is my duty, as I assure you it is my

pleasure, to raise my voice here in tribute to the gentleman who has done so much to make this session pleasant to us. I allude to our Speaker.

By his great ability, by his strict fidelity, he has won in the minds of the members of this House the profoundest esteem. But he has won, also, gentlemen, what I believe he appreciates more, what I believe is dearer to him than that; by his kindly courtesy, by his fairness and impartiality, he has won a place in the affection of our hearts which no time can ever efface. I predict for him, gentlemen, a bright, a brilliant, and a happy future. And I think I echo the sentiment of this House in saying that the best wish I can possibly accord him, as he goes from the Speaker's chair, is that his future may be as bright, as brilliant and as happy as I know the House of Representatives that is now about to disappear from view would unanimously accord him by their votes. ## Mr. MANLEY said:

If in the course of our deliberations there have been conflicts of opinion they have only served, I believe, to awaken emotions which have ended in mutual respect and esteem.

I cannot permit this opportunity to pass without calling the attention of the House to the record we have made. It has been asserted broadcast that we have been an extravagant Legislature, making unusual appropriations. The record shows that the Legislature of

1885 appropriated for the years 1885-6 two million, six hundred and nineteen thousand, four hundred dollars and forty-nine cents. It is true that we have in a few instances increased to a limited degree the salaries of worthy officers, and we have dealt generously, as we ought, with the charitable and educational interests of the State. But our appropriations for the years 1887-8 are only two million, four hundred and forty-seven thousand, seven hundred and eightyfive dollars and fifty-six cents, showing a reduction of one hundred and seventy-one thousand, six hundred and fourteen dollars and ninety-three cents. Again, gentlemen, we have reduced the annual amount of the tax to be assessed upon the people of this State two hundred and thirty-six thousand, nine hundred and two dollars and seven cents; thus lightening to an appreciable degree the burden of every tax-payer. It is a record in which we can take pride, and confidently appeal for an approving verdict from the people. [Applause.]

## Mr. BRADLEY said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen:—I am glad that I came here to this session of the Legislature in this capacity. While I have heard some complaints from some members of the monotony of life here, I am prompted to say that I never passed the same period of time as pleasantly as this. I do not begrudge a minute of the time spent here. It has been an experience that will be worth all that it has cost me. It has been a noticeable fact that partisanship has been displayed, if at all, only in a slight degree, for we have often witnessed democratic members supporting measures having a strong republican backing, and vice versa.

My connection with this body has been of the pleasantest, and I should be an ingrate if I should omit to speak of our presiding officer in this connection. He has filled that position well. He has presided with brotherly care over the new members. The humblest member of this body has had the same rights and privileges as the more brilliant. He has presided impartially, magnanimously, and in a masterly manner. To him we are deeply grateful for many courtesies, and I believe that a career, such as he so much deserves, of great brilliancy, success and usefulness awaits him. Of the many kindnesses I have experienced from all the members, from the messengers, clerks, folders, pages and representatives of the press, I

shall always cherish a pleasant remembrance. Many of us met as strangers; we part as friends. We have differed honestly, and we inish in harmony. We have received each other's ideas with respect, and each has advanced his own without arrogance. We may not have accomplished all we desired and hoped for, yet we have the satisfaction of feeling that we have done the best we could under the existing circumstances.

## Mr. DOW said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen:—No word of mine is needed to add to the evidences of universal appreciation in which we hold our Speaker. He has so satisfactorily discharged the duties of that office as to have earned the profound esteem which we all heartily accord; and it is no disparagement to say that he has discharged all the duties of that position, during the seventy-three days of this session, in such a way that we are enabled to say that in the long line of distinguished men who have occupied the Speaker's chair before him, he has had few equals, and no superiors.

But I rise, Mr. Clerk, not so much to say anything on my own account, as to state that I have been requested to say for the distinguished gentleman from East Machias, whose absence to-night we all regret, that he, if present, would be glad to say upon this floor that in all the years of his service in the Maine House of Representatives he had seen no abler Speaker, no one who has been more uniformly fair and courteous to the minority of this House. [Applause.]

## Mr. NEWBERT said:

Mr. Clerk:—I have but a word to add to the eloquent and feeling sentiments which have been already uttered.

We have all looked forward with considerable anxiety for the closing hour of this long and laborious Legislature, that we might return to our homes and friends, and again engage in our various avocations; but now that the time of separating is actually upon us, I confess that my heart is filled with emotion not unmixed with sadness. When I came here eleven weeks ago, I was a stranger to nearly every member of this House. I met gentlemen then as representatives of their respective districts; I take my parting leave of

them now as of friends, the recollection of whom will have a place in my memory so long as my life shall continue.

The closing hour has come, our work is done, our fraternal intercourse must now be broken; but the bonds of friendship formed and cemented here will be broken never.

And now, gentlemen, extending to you all a cordial welcome to visit me at my home, wishing you a safe return to your happy homes, and invoking for you the richest blessings of a bountiful Providence, I bid you, one and all, good bye! [Applause.]

### Mr. WALTON said:

Mr. Clerk:—The hour is getting late, and I do not design to say anything more than one word in relation to the subject that is now before us. I, certainly, as a member who sat in this House two years ago with the distinguished gentleman who has filled the Speaker's chair during this session, should not, and I cannot hold my peace.

I had the honor and the pleasure of nominating that gentleman to the position which he now holds, in a caucus of the members of the party to which he belongs, at the commencement of this session; and whatever mistakes we have made during this session, Mr. Clerk, in that the result shows that we "builded well." I cannot expect, and I will not attempt, to add anything to what has been said by the various gentlemen who have preceded me, in regard to our Speaker. I endorse it all, and in addition I want to say one word to the members of this House.

First, I thank, I cordially thank, the Speaker of this House for his uniform kindness to me and to every member of the House during this session. I also want to thank the members of this House for their kindness to me. I have received nothing but kindness and courtesy from them during the entire session. I cannot hope, Mr. Clerk, to ever meet these gentlemen, all, again. If I do not-and I say I cannot hope to-I trust we shall meet in the great hereafter, for if there is not a great hereafter for us all, of what good is this But I will say this, that so far as the gentlemen of this House are concerned, my latch string will always be out, and I shall always have a friendly grasp for the hand of every man that I have associated with during this session. If any gentlemen ever happen within the vicinity where I live, I shall be exceedingly glad at any time and all times to see them and to shake the friendly hand again with them. [Applause.]

### Mr. SHAW said:

Gentlemen:—I think, perhaps, that I of all men upon the floor of this House have the most reason to extend my heartfelt thanks to the Speaker and to every member upon this floor for courtesy and constant, unabated kindness. Somehow or other I have always had the good fortune to have my lines fall in pleasant places and this seems to be an addition to the large number of goodly fortunes which have fallen to me in such a way. I have received nothing but courtesy from the Speaker, nothing but courtesy and kindness from every member of this House, and I wish to assure you all, both Speaker and members, that I have become attached with a strong friendship to you all. [Applause.]

## Mr. CUSHING said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen:—I did not think to say a word in the closing moments of this session, but I cannot resist the impulse of my heart to rise and give my testimony in this matter. I came here, perhaps, unlike most of my associates. I came here a stranger to every member of this House. At the time of the election I knew not a man that was to help compose either branch of this Legislature. I came here, as I say, a stranger—having lived the greater part of my life out of the State. It was with some feelings of timidity that I came, but as I came I received the warm grasp of affection from every member that I have met.

I have received such kind consideration from our Speaker—never have I attempted to address this House but our Speaker has instantly recognized me—that I feel to extend my heartfelt thanks to him at this time for this constant courtesy that he has bestowed upon me. I also feel to extend my grateful thanks to every member of this branch. I came a stranger. You have received me into your affectionate regard, you have treated me cordially, generously, kindly. I shall always hold dear in my memory every member of this House. [Applause.]

## Mr. CONDON said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen:—I do not believe that I can add anything to the words of commendation that have been uttered of our Speaker, coming from the eloquent gentlemen who have preceded

me. I can only say that where we have the best there we honor it the most. We honor him who has so gravely, politely, and cordially filled the chair that has been filled by so many able men of this State. And, gentlemen, I cannot refrain from heartily thanking you for the many words of cheer and kind encouragement that you have given to the youngest member of the House. [Applause.]

The resolve offered by Mr. Scott was passed by a unanimous rising vote.

### Mr. HORIGAN said:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives:— I have seen somewhere the saying that "some men are born great, others achieve greatness, still others have greatness thrust upon them." To-night I find myself in this latter position. Without any ability I have been called by several members of the House to act as spokesman and present this elegant portrait of our noble Speaker. With this portrait, which for the past three weeks has excited so much admiration among visitors to the State House and members of this Legislature, I have the honor to present two beautiful albums, containing within their covers a sufficient number of leaves upon which to place the photographs of every member of this body, and also every officer connected with it, and I trust, gentlemen of the House, that you will within a very short time see to it that your photographs are placed upon the pages alloted to them.

I present these gifts to you, Mr. Speaker, not because of their intrinsic value, but as a token of the heartfelt honor and esteem in which you are held by every member of this House. I present them to you because you have endeared yourself to the members of this House by your honorable and gentlemanly conduct, by your courte-ous and impartial rulings, by your kind attention to each and every member of this House. I congratulate the majority members of the House that in their selection of the Speaker they chose the one who above all others was so admirably fitted to fill the position of presiding officer of this legislative body.

Mr. Speaker, accept these gifts, and with them our hopes that as you pass down the pathway of life they will be to you gentle reminders of the pleasant and kindly intercourse and feeling between yourself and the members of the House of Representatives of the Sixty-Third Legislature of Maine.

Loud bursts of applause followed Mr. Horigan's remarks, and when they had subsided, Mr. Littlefield responded:

Gentlemen of the House:—It is with the most lively sense of the uninterrupted favors which I have received from your hands, that I rise at this time, to express my sincere appreciation of this final act of courtesy. I cannot hope to adequately express my feelings upon this occasion. The duties of my office during this long and arduous session have been rendered exceeding pleasant and agreeable, by reason of your unfailing kindness, forbearance and courtesy. most friendly rivalry has existed between the members in aiding the chair to facilitate business. The session has been one of hard, diligent, careful, painstaking work, and the business accomplished is much greater than usual. The average number of acts and resolves passed by the several Legislatures during the past fifteen years has been 329. This session you have passed 559. As an evidence of the diligence with which you have acted, it may be noted that the average length of the sessions during that period has been 59 days. You have been in session 72 days.

"By their works, ye shall know them."

You have endeavored to be unusually mindful of the great mass of the people. You have enacted many measures of great public moment, designed by you, to place our State more completely in union with the spirit of the age. Whether the best possible results have been thereby attained, time and experience can alone determine. You have wrought faithfully and well, seeking the best results. If they have not been reached, it is your misfortune, and not your fault. No House has ever assembled, which has, in my judgment, contained so much debating ability, so generally distributed among the members, as the present House.

I feel that I can entertain a most just pride in having had the honor of presiding over a deliberative body which contains, not only the usual quota of brilliant and accomplished speakers, but such an exceedingly large number of men from the "plain people" who have so amply demonstrated their capacity to participate effectively in the debates of this House. I congratulate you upon the continued existence of kindly feeling. When you part, it will be with warm friendships, unmarred by untoward incident, undisturbed by heartburnings. Partisan rancour has not been allowed to impede and disturb your deliberations. Your contests have, not infrequently,

been intensely warm and exciting; yet when the heat of debate has been followed by the coolness of decision, you have cheerfully acquiesced.

We cannot be unmindful of the fact, that the skill and faithfulness of our competent clerk and assistant clerk, have contributed in a very marked degree, to the despatch of business. Nor should we fail to remember the valuable assistance rendered by the official stenographer, the messengers, the folders, and the pages. The enterprise of the various representatives of the press has contributed in no small degree to whatever of success we may have attained.

The gavel, the crayon and the albums, so heartily and generously presented, I accept with unfeigned pleasure. I shall cherish them with pride and satisfaction. They will always remind me of your affectionate regard, and of obligations that I can never hope to adequately discharge. With them will be associated the most pleasant memories of my life.

Gentlemen of the Sixty-Third House, the hour when we must part has arrived. Our duties as legislators are ended. We return to our homes and to our several vocations. May that beneficent Power which has thus far guided and directed us, be always with us. May the friendly ties that now bind us to each other like

"Our echoes, roll from soul to soul, And grow forever and forever."

As the Speaker approached the conclusion of his address, the influence of the hour affected him visibly. His voice, usually so resonent, sank lower and lower; and as the gavel descended and he pronounced the final words, "I declare this House now adjourned, without day," his words were hardly audible under the strain of emotion, while the silent tear coursed down the cheeks of those present.

# RULES OF THE HOUSE.

## CONTENTS.

#### OF THE DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

- " 56. Cushing's Manual to govern when not inconsistent with the rules of the house.
- 57. No rule to be dispensed with without consent of two-thirds of members present.
- 58. No rule to be altered or repealed or new rule to be adopted without one day's notice.

#### RULES.

#### DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

1. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result;

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct;

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

#### DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; make up the pay-roll of the members; and in the absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until speaker pro tem. be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of speaker; and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

#### CHAPLAINS.

- 4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplains in religious service.
- 5. The chaplains may change duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

#### MONITORS.

- 6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.
- 7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

#### COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon:

On ways and means,
On leave of absence,
On change of names,
On bills in the third reading,

On engrossed bills, On elections. To consist of seven members each.

On county estimates,

To consist of one member from each county.

On business of the house,

To consist of three members.

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their number shall elect a chairman.

#### RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

- 10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.
- 11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.
- 12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak; but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair shall speak first.
- 13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake.
- 14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.
- 15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.
- 16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the house.
- 17. No member shall be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.
- 18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.
- 19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the house for more than six days after the session commences shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason for such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any

member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

- 20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same with the clerk.
- 21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.
- 22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the house for special reason shall excuse him, and when the yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.
- 23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.
- 24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of state, land agent, adjutant general, judges of the supreme judicial court, chaplains of the senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the house.

#### PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

- 25. After reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
- 1st. Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. Reception of petitions, bills and resolves requiring reference to any committee.
  - 4th. Orders.
  - 5th. Reports of committees and first reading of bills or resolves.
- 6th. Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.
  - 7th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.
  - 8th. Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration,

and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.

28. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but-

1st. To adjourn.

2d. To lay on the table.

3d. For the previous question.

4th. To commit.

5th. To postpone to a day certain.

6th. To amend.

7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

1st. To recede.

2d. To concur.

3d. To insist.

4th. To adhere.

- 29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.
- 31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: Shall the main question be put now? No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.
- 32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.
- 33. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

- 34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.
- 35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that underconsideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- 36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.
- 37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.
- 38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.
- 39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.
- 40. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in any order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.
- 41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.
- 42. In all elections by ballot, of the house, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.
- 43. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.
- 44. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the house with the decision thereon.
- 45. A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.
- 46. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker, or by a member in his place, and shall

be endorsed with the name of the person presenting it, and the subject matter of the same. They shall be read by the speaker, clerk, or such other person as the speaker may request, and shall be taken up in the order they were first presented, unless the house shall otherwise direct.

- 47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading, shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.
- 48. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on Wednesday of the week following that of their first reading.
- 49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.
- 50. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.
- 51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.
- 52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corporations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.
- 53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.
- 54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.
- 55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor? and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.
- 56. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions, shall

govern the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

- 57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless two-thirds of the members present shall consent thereto.
- 58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

# JOINT RULES.

1. The following joint standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

On the judiciary,

On legal affairs,

On financial affairs,

On federal relations,

On education,

On railroads, telegraphs and expresses,

On commerce,

On mercantile affairs and insurance,

On banks and banking,

On manufactures,

On agriculture,

On military affairs,

On interior waters,

On state lands and state roads,

On ways and bridges,

On fisheries and game,

On counties,

On towns,

On Indian affairs,

On claims,

On pensions,

On insane hospital,

On reform school.

On state prison,

On public buildings,

On library,

On state college of agriculture and mechanic arts,

On mines and mining,

On labor.

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

- 2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.
- 3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house, and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the senate, or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to

the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.

- 4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be briefly endorsed on the back of the same.
- 5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute shall state the subject matter of such statute—also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.
- 6. The titles of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject matter of the same.
- 7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz:
- "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, as follows:"

All bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with "Section 1."

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

- 8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shal have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.
- 9. All endorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.
- 10. Every bill or resolve of a public nature, and every bill or resolve appropriating money, or disposing of state lands or other state property, reported in either house by a committee, or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses, before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.
- 11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be five hundred, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving one hundred copies for the departments and for binding, and twenty copies for the committee having the same under consideration.

- 12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses, unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.
- 13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house, representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.
- 14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by re-consideration; and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session, unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.
- 15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and it shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.
- 16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.
- 17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

# Senate Order of Proceedings and Debates.

After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

- 1st. House papers not acted on; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. The reception and reference of petitions, and such other papers, except bills and resolves, as require action by a committee.
- 4th. The report of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve. Bills, resolves, etc., offered by senators, and their reference or first reading.
- 5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.
- 6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but,

- 1st. To adjourn.
- 2d. To lay on table.
- 3d. To postpone to a day certain.
- 4th. To commit.
- 5th. To amend.
- 6th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the House shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.

A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

The name of the senator presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the place of his residence.

The senator presenting an order should put his name thereto, on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the place of his residence.

# RULES OF THE SENATE.

  - " 14. Questions of order.
  - " 15. Division of questions,
  - " 16. Filling up blanks.
  - " 17. Reading of papers.
  - 18. Bills in second reading to go to committee—their duty.
  - " 19. Consideration of bills by paragraph on second reading.
  - " 20. Engrossment of bills.
  - "21. Grants of money or land to be read on two several days—papers from house disagreeing with senate action.
  - 22. Order of business-secretary to keep a calendar of bills.
  - " 23. Taking yeas and nays.
  - " 24. No debate after question is put to vote.
  - " 25. Unfinished business to have precedence.
  - " 26. No engrossed bills to be sent to house without notice to senators.
  - " 27. Manner of presenting petitions.

## RULES.

- 1. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case of his absence at such time, the secretary shall preside until a president pro tempore be chosen.
- 2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read; and the president shall ascertain whether a quorum is present before such reading.
- 3. When the president speaks he shall address the senate; when a senator speaks he shall stand in his place and address the president.
- 4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members, when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of *senator*, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.
- 5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.
- 6. The president shall rise to put a question, and shall declare all votes, but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.
- 7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.
- 8. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to reconsider, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.
- 9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw it at any time before a decision, or any amendment be made to it.
- 10. No senator shall address the senate until recognized by the president, nor more than once to the exclusion of any other senator, without

leave of the senate, if objection is made, unless he be the mover of the matter under debate, and not then more than three times without leave.

- 11. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; nor shall an amendment proposing to ingraft a general provision of law upon a private bill be in order; nor any amendment beyond the second degree.
- 12. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, unless the vote adopting it be first reconsidered, and no senator shall be competent to move any reconsideration, unless he voted with the majority and upon the same or a succeeding day; and a motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid upon the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.
- 13. A motion to reconsider shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, but if made while another question is pending, it shall not be put until the other question is disposed of, but simply entered.
- 14. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.
- 15 A question containing two or more propositions capable of division shall be divided whenever desired by any member.
- 16. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.
- 17. Every paper shall be once read at the table before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.
- 18. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.
- 19. Upon a second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading unless a time (not less than one hour after the first reading) be assigned therefor.
- 20. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills, whose duties shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.
- 21. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property, shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.

- 22. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
- 1st. House papers not acted upon; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers, except bills and resolves, as require action by a committee.
- 4th. Reports of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve. Bills, resolves, etc., offered by senators, and their reference or first reading.
- 5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.
- 6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the house, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

- 23. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.
- 24. After question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.
- 25. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have precedence in the orders of the day.
- 26. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.
- 27. Every member who shall present a petition shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.
- 28. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secrecy.
- 29. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of two-thirds of the members present.
- 30. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.
- 31. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leave, unless there be a quorum left present.

- 32. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot,) and appointed by the senate.
- 33. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

#### STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in second reading. On engrossed bills.

To consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first, and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

- 34. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.
- 35. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall be transmitted to the governor and council and the house by the secretary or his assistant.
- 36. The senate may at any time, upon motion, by a vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.
- 37. The rules of parlimentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or of the joint rules of the two houses.

## MEMORANDA.

- 1. Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees should never be presented on less than a half sheet of paper.
- 2. When a report of a committee is made to either house it should be accompanied by the order appointing said committee.
- 3. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from towns in their corporate capacity, should be endorsed thus, "Petition of town of—," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 4. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from individuals should be indorsed thus, "Petition of——and others of the town of——," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 5. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from corporations should be endorsed thus, "Petition of———," [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances, should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the place of his residence.
- 7. The member presenting an *order* should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the place of his residence.
- 8. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances, on which leave to withdraw was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files, with a view of being again referred. The original, however, may be taken from the files, and the subject presented de novo.
- 9. Bills and resolves refused a passage, rejected or postponed indefinitely by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.
