The certified roll of Representatives elect was called by the Clerk and 142 members responded to the call, and a quorum found to be present.

On motion of Mr. TRUSSELL of St. George,

Messrs. Trussell,

Peaks of Dover,
Noble of Lewiston,
Parker of Belfast,
Newcomb of Eastport,
Dickey of Fort Kent,
Chadbourne of Biddeford,

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall, and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. TRUSSELL subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon the Governor, attended by the Council, came in and administered to the members elect, and they subscribed, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

The Governor and suite then retired.

On motion of Mr. HILL of Augusta,

Messrs. Hill,

Porter of Bangor, Shaw of Portland, Herrick of Bethel, Bird of Rockland, Tilton of Cape Elizabeth, Osgood of Lewiston,

were appointed a committee to receive, sort and count votes for Speaker.

Mr. HILL subsequently reported

The report was read and accepted, and Hon. Andrew P. Wiswell having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Sixty-Fifth Legislature for the years 1891–1892.

The Speaker elect was conducted to the chair by Mr. CHAD-BOURNE of Biddeford.

Mr. WISWELL said:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives:

Allow me to express my grateful appreciation of the compliment which you have conferred upon me, and at the same time my deep sense of the duties and responsibilities of the office to which you have elected me. I should indeed most keenly feel my inability to satisfactorily preside over your deliberations if I were not sure that I could safely rely to a very great extent upon your kind indulgence and coöperation. I can only assure you that to a faithful performance of the duties of the chair I shall bring my best endeavors, and it will be my chief aim to preside over this House with absolute impartiality. Gentlemen, we have been sent here by our respective constituents to deliberate and legislate for the welfare of the whole State. The rights of all the people and of all classes should be jealously guarded, and their interests advanced whenever practicable and possible. It seems to me that to so perform these duties as to

merit at least the approbation of the people whom we represent, two things are necessary: first, we should waste no time, but upon the other hand, no proposition submitted to us for consideration should be accepted without the most careful and painstaking deliberation and examination. Let me simply express the wish, in closing, that our deliberations may be thoughtful and our conclusions wise; that the greatest rivalry may be in search for the right and the truth, and that all of our acts shall be fruitful in good for our beloved State and the people within its borders. Gentlemen, I await the pleasure of the House.

Ordered, That Rev. D. B. Randall of Portland act as Chaplain of the House until otherwise ordered.

On motion of Mr. TRUSSELL of St. George,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House be directed to furnish each member and officer of the House with one copy of the Daily Kennebec Journal and New Age and one other daily paper published in the State such as each officer or member may direct. Amended by Mr. Porter of Bangor so as to read "three daily papers such as each member may select," and as amended was read and passed.

On motion of Mr. PEAKS of Dover,

Ordered, That the Clerk of the House cause to be prepared for the use of the members a catalogue containing their names alphabetically arranged, with the residences, post office address, boarding place, occupation, politics, number of seat and diagram of the House, and that the usual number of copies be printed and distributed.

Mr. PARKER of Belfast informed the House that Mr. Festus F. Merrill of Eddington, a member elect of the House, had appeared and was ready for qualification.

Mr. PARKER was charged with the duty of conducting Mr. MERRILL to the Governor for the purpose of taking the required oath, and subsequently reported that he had performed the duty assigned him, and Mr. MERRILL appeared and took his seat in the House.

Papers from the Senate:

Communication from the Secretary of State transmitting returns of votes for Governor given in the several cities, towns and plantations in this State for the term consisting of the political years 1891 and 1892, came from the Senate read and sent down, and was read in concurrence.

This order came from the Senate read and passed, and was read and passed in concurrence.

On motion of Mr. PEAKS of Dover,

Ordered, The Senate concurring that when this Legislature adjourn it shall adjourn until Wednesday, January fourteenth, at eleven o'clock A. M.

This order was read and on motion of Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent, tabled.

A communication from the Secretary of State transmitting returns of votes for Representatives to the Sixty-Fifth Legislature of Maine was received, read and tabled on motion of Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston, pending appointment of House Committee on Elections.

On motion of Mr. HILL of Augusta,

Adjourned to to-morrow at ten o'clock.

Journal read and approved.

On motion of Mr. PORTER of Bangor, the vote whereby the order of yesterday, providing members with three daily papers, was given a passage, was reconsidered.

On motion of same gentleman the order was then amended so as to read as follows:

Ordered. That the Clerk of the House be directed to furnish each member and officer of the House with one copy of the Daily Kennebec Journal and one other daily paper published in the State, such as each member may select, and as amended was given a passage.

On motion of Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent, the order relating to adjournment of the Legislature, was taken from the table.

Mr. CALLAHAN of Lewiston moved to amend the order by striking out the words "Wednesday, January fourteenth" and inserting instead the words 'Tuesday, January thirteenth.'

Mr. PORTER of Bangor, moved to amend the amendment so as to read two o'clock P. M. The amendment as amended was adopted and the order as amended was passed and sent to the Senate. Subsequently it came back non-concurred and amended by substituting four o'clock P. M. for two o'clock P. M. and on motion of Mr. HAWES of Deering the House voted to recede and concur.

On motion of Mr. PORTER of Bangor,

Ordered, That the Secretary of State be requested to prepare and furnish for the use of this House, a tabulated list of the valuation of each city and town in this State for 1889 and the amount of taxes raised for town purposes for the same year.

Ordered, That a committee of three on the part of the Senate with such as the House may join, be appointed a committee to wait upon the Honorable Edwin C. Burleigh, and inform him that he has been duly elected Governor of the State of Maine for the current political years 1891 and 1892.

This order came from the Senate read and passed, and

Messrs. Hunt of Waldo,

Haines of Kennebec,

Poor of Cumberland,

appointed on its part.

The order was read and passed in concurrence, and

Messrs. Drew of Fort Fairfield,
Hiscock of Wilton,
Littlefield of Penobscot,
Clason of Gardiner,
Fisher of Topsham,
Chadbourne of Biddeford,
Stone of Troy,

were joined to the committee on the part of the House. Mr. DREW subsequently reported that the committee had discharged its duty, and that the Governor elect was pleased to say that he accepted the office to which he had been elected, and would meet the Legislature at such time as it might indicate, to take and subscribe the oaths of office necessary to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

A message was received from the Senate by Mr. DUNBAR, Secretary of that body, proposing a joint convention to be held in the House this day, forthwith, for the purpose of administering to the Hon. Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and asking the concurrence of the House.

On motion of Mr. STEARNS of Caribou, the House concurred, and the Clerk was charged with and conveyed a message to the Senate, informing that body of the concurrence of the House in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of administering to the Hon. Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of his office.

The hour for administering the necessary oaths to the Hon. Governor elect having arrived, the Senate came in, and a convention was then formed, Hon. Charles F. Libby, President of the Senate, presiding.

IN CONVENTION.

On motion of Mr. RYDER of Penobscot,

Messrs. Ryder,

Mallet of Cumberland, Penley of Auburn, Plummer of Brunswick, Webb of Deer Isle, Crocker of Machias, Deering of Waterboro',

were appointed a committee to wait upon Honorable Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor elect, to inform him that the two branches of the Legislature were in convention assembled in the Representatives'

Hall, and ready to administer to him the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties, and to receive from him such communication as he may be pleased to make.

Mr. RYDER subsequently reported that the Committee had delivered the message with which it was charged, and that the Governor elect had been pleased to say that he would, forthwith, attend upon the convention.

Whereupon Hon. Edwin C. Burleigh, Governor elect, attended by the Executive Council and Heads of Departments, came in, and in presence of both branches of the Legislature, in convention assembled, before the President of the Senate, Hon. Charles F. Libby, took and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Hon. Oramandal Smith, Secretary of State, then made the following proclamation:

PROCLAMATION.

The votes given in on the eighth day of September last in the cities, towns and plantations of the State, for Governor, the returns of which have been made to the office of Secretary of State, having been examined and counted by the Legislature, which has declared that a plurality thereof were given to Edwin C. Burleigh, and that he is duly elected, and he having in the presence of the two branches of the Legislature in convention assembled, taken and subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to discharge the duties of that office, I therefore declare and make known to all persons in this State, who are in the exercise of any public trust, as well as all good citizens thereof, that Edwin C. Burleigh is Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of Maine, and that due obedience should be rendered to all his lawful acts and commands as such.

GOD SAVE THE STATE OF MAINE.

The Governor then communicated to the convention, by address, information upon the condition of the State, as follows:

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives:

At the beginning of the important and exacting duties which, as the chosen representatives of the people of Maine, will devolve upon you during the next few months, it is my pleasant privilege to welcome you to more commodious and convenient quarters than have been enjoyed by your predecessors.

The increased health and comfort thus secured to you will, it is hoped, go far towards facilitating the labors of the session.

FINANCIAL.

On the first day of October, 1869, when bonds were issued under the Act of 1868, in payment of the Municipal War Debts assumed by the State, the total bonded indebtedness of Maine reached its highest point, amounting at that time to \$8,100,900. Deducting from this the accumulations then in the Sinking Fund, amounting, at their par value, to \$972,-530, it will be seen that the total net indebtedness of the State was \$7,128,370. This debt was bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, and the amount due for interest in 1870 was \$486,054.00.

The total bonded debt of the State at the present time is \$2,602,300. Of this amount \$118,300 is drawing interest at five per cent. \$150,000 at four per cent. and \$2,334,000 at three per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, being just one-half the rate which the State had been paying for the previous twenty years. During the past year the sum of \$50,000 has been paid on the principal of the public debt.

Briefly stated, the financial operations of the State from 1869 to the present time are as follows:

A comparison of these figures will clearly show to the people of Maine what has been accomplished during the last twenty years, and how carefully and prudently her financial interests have been managed during that time.

In 1865 the rate of taxation in Maine was fifteen mills on the dollar of the State valuation, and the State tax assessed upon the County of Cumberland alone was larger, by nearly fourteen thousand dollars, than the entire State tax for 1890. Indeed, the State tax for 1865 was only \$126,000.00 less than the entire amount of the bonded debt of the State at the present time. Within the last decade the rate of taxation in Maine has been reduced from five mills in 1880 to two and one-quarter mills in 1890. If we take from this the one mill that is levied directly by the State, under the Act of 1872, for the support of Common Schools, and is distributed by the Treasurer of State to the several cities, towns and plantations, there remain but one mill and a quarter to be used for general State expenses,—the lowest State tax that has been levied during the past thirty years.

This tax would not be a burden to any one, were it fairly assessed upon all the property of the State, at its full value. The benefits derived from a State Government, the protection of person and property which renders possible increased production, through the division of labor, cannot be overestimated. Nowhere else do we secure so large returns from so small an expenditure of money.

Of all the public burdens resting upon the people of Maine, the State tax is to-day the least onerous. The total amount levied during the past year was \$531,697.17, of which more

than \$400,000 were returned directly to the people for school purposes, leaving but about \$130,000 of the amount thus assessed to be used towards defraying the expenses of the State Government. During the present year 287 towns and plantations will receive from the State more money on account of the School Fund and Mill Tax alone than they pay into its Treasury. In a large number of the remaining towns the difference between the amount to be paid the State, and the amount to be received from it on this account, will be exceedingly small.

By virtue of the Act of 1872, known as the Mill Tax law, all the property of the State is assessed one mill upon every dollar for the support of Common Schools. Under this system of taxation, which has given eminently satisfactory results, the cities and wealthy towns are obliged to materially aid in lightening the burdens of the less prosperous communities. It will therefore be readily seen that the burdens resting upon the people to-day will be found largely in what may be termed municipal or town taxation and that, in seeking ways to lighten these burdens, this important fact should not be lost sight of. While the State tax for the year 1890, including the one mill levied for the benefit of schools, is only two mills and a quarter on a dollar, or twenty-two and one-half cents on one hundred dollars of the State valuation, the municipal or town taxes, levied for all purposes, average one and seventy-one hundredths cents upon the dollar of assessed valuation, and are always, outside of certain absolute requirements, just what towns or municipalities may themselves determine and authorize.

In my address two years ago, I expressed the opinion that the State tax might safely be reduced in 1890 from two and three-quarters to two and one-quarter mills upon the dollar of the State valuation, thus lifting an annual burden of \$117,799.94 from the tax payers of Maine. An order directing such reduction passed the House of Representatives on the thirteenth day of February, one month before the final

adjournment of the Legislature. Subsequent to this order, the following appropriations were routside the usual items of State expenditure: Railroad Tax equitably due certain towns for

While there was a very general agreement among the members of the last Legislature as to the necessity and justice of these appropriations, it is altogether probable that a further decrease of taxation would not have been voted had their number and scope been clearly foreseen when the order for such reduction was given a passage. The Treasurer has found it necessary to make a temporary loan in order to meet the expenses occasioned by these special appropriations. It must be borne in mind, however, that the State still retains the value of \$291,400 of the \$361,400 thus appropriated, in permanent property added to its possessions.

Whether the low rate of taxation, which has existed during the past year, is to continue in the future, will depend largely upon the action of the present Legislature in the matter of establishing a new State valuation, and the economy practiced in the appropriation of public moneys. With the passage of measures that shall secure a fair and full valuation of all the property of the State, there appears to me no reason why that rate should not be maintained. Indeed, under the beneficent operation of such legislation, I believe it will be a question of only a few years, at most, when the State will be in condition to make a still further reduction in the tax rate.

Two years ago I pointed out the discrepancies between the State valuation of 1880 and that taken by the United States Census, and expressed the opinion that the latter came nearer doing us perfect justice. The valuation accorded us by the United States Census was considerably more than double that taken by the State. As I then said, "Our own State valuation finds too large a proportion of our property in the farms of the State, and makes the farmers pay an undue share of the general taxes. On the other hand, the valuation of the United States Census takes cognizance of the less tangible but more profitable investments which escape their fair share of the common burdens." This kind of property has been easily discerned by the United States Enumerators but has remained strangely invisible to local officials. to be hoped that you will be able to bring a large amount of it within reach of the taxing power.

Another reason for the difference between the State and Federal valuations, is found in the practice, which exists in some parts of the State, of assessing taxes upon partial property valuation. The report of the Tax Commission shows that during the year just closed, in making returns for the use of the State Valuation Commissioners, 198 towns in Maine returned their property at less than the "just value thereof" required by the Constitution of the State. In some instances assessors felt that they had fulfilled the requirements of their office when they had assessed the property of the town at one-third of its "cash value." It is apparent to all that the establishment of the lowest practicable rate of taxation is impossible while such methods are in vogue. To secure it, the valuation of property must be uniform throughout the State and such uniformity can be secured only by rendering it imperative upon assessors, under severe penalties, to return all property at its full value.

REFUNDING THE PUBLIC DEBT.

In 1889 occurred one of the most remarkable financial transactions in the history of the State, the results of which

were directly felt by every tax payer in Maine. By virtue of the Act of March 13, 1889, providing for refunding the public debt, the Treasurer of State, immediately thereafter, taking advantage of the condition of the money market at that time, issued proposals for the sale of three per cent. bonds to renew the six per cent. bonds falling due on the first days of June and October of that year. \$1,676,000 of the bonds bearing date June 1, 1889, and \$708,000 dated October 1, 1889, were sold, the former yielding a premium of 103½ and the latter 103, or a total on both loans of \$79,900, which sum was applied directly to the payment of the public debt, reducing, to that extent, the total amount of the new bonds issued.

The prompt and successful manner in which the matter was conducted by the Treasurer, reflects great credit upon that officer and must be a source of pride and satisfaction to every citizen of the State. Had the initiatory steps in this transaction been delayed until near the time of the maturity of the old bonds, no such favorable negotiation could have been made, and it is altogether probable that the new bonds could not have been sold at par.

TAXATION.

For a number of years the opinion has prevailed that the tax laws of the State are not equitable in their operation; that there is altogether too great a discrepancy between the portions of the public burdens borne by real and personal property.

Under a resolve of the last Legislature, a Commission was appointed "to inquire into the system adopted by other states to raise revenue for State, County and Municipal expenses, and to provide for a more equal, just and equitable system of taxation of all kinds of property in this State."

That Commission has faithfully attended to its prescribed duties. The general question of taxation has been closely studied. Other states have been visited and their tax laws

carefully examined to ascertain in what respects, if any, they are superior to our own. The able and exhaustive report of the Commission will be laid before you. I commend it to your careful consideration.

It has been quite a common experience, among the various states of the Union, that movements for tax reform have been exceedingly slow in arriving at definite results. One Legislature, despairing of reaching a satisfactory solution of these perplexing problems, has passed them over to its successor, and thus the desired relief has, oftentimes, been long postponed. With you there will be no occasion for such a course. The report of this special Commission furnishes you at the start with the groundwork for legislation of this character.

It will be your duty to examine into the whole system of taxation, to ascertain what new sources of revenue are available, and whether any class of property is bearing less than its fair share of the public burdens, and, if so, to apply whatever remedy may, in your judgment, appear best. The importance of this matter would seem to require its careful consideration by a special committee of the Legislature.

STATE ASSESSORS.

I heartily concur with the recommendation of the Tax Commission for the appointment of a State Board of Assessors, whose duty it shall be to exercise a central supervision over our tax system, and "to equalize the valuation of the State biennially, in order that the taxes voted by each Legislature shall be assessed upon a new valuation."

A decade is altogether too long a time to elapse between valuations. Ten years bring vast changes in the creation and distribution of wealth in a State which is growing even more rapidly industrially than in the number of its inhabitants. A valuation in all respects equitable at the beginning of a decade might, in many ways, work gross injustice at its close. Only by a frequent adjustment of values can substantial justice be done

to all. I am of the opinion that this commission should be chosen by the Legislature, in which alone is vested the constitutional right of levying taxes. At the same time it is highly desirable that such Board of Assessors should be, so far as possible, non-partisan and non-sectional. I am convinced that the work of such a Board would result in a large annual saving to the State and do much to secure a just distribution of the public burdens.

DIRECT TAX BILL.

Under the Act of Congress approved August 5, 1861, known as the Direct Tax Act, Maine paid to the general government the sum of \$357,702. A bill was passed by the United States Senate during the last session of Congress authorizing the refunding, to the several states, of the money thus paid the general government, and the same is now pending before the House of Representatives.

It would be very advantageous to the State if this bill should become a law, and it is to be earnestly hoped it will be given a passage.

HON. SILAS C. HATCH.

On the twenty-seventh day of July last, Hon. Silas C. Hatch, Executive Councillor from the Sixth District, died at his home in Bangor. He was an able man, possessed of high-minded integrity and devotion to principle. He served the State as its Treasurer and in the Executive Council and Legislature for a period of sixteen years. No man had a clearer insight into its affairs than he. Maine may well hold in honored remembrance the record of his distinguished services.

SAVINGS BANKS.

The Savings Banks of the State will be shown by the able and interesting report of the Bank Examiner, to be in a prosperous condition. The total deposits now amount to \$47,781,166.90. This is an increase of \$3,804,081.81 over

the amount at the close of the year 1889. The total number of depositors is 140,521, a gain from last year of 8.329. total amount of State tax paid in 1890 was \$323,549.98, an increase of \$27,738.38 over 1889. The total amount of municipal taxes paid in 1890 was \$13,517.13. The Bank Examiner finds that, as a rule, a wise and conservative policy prevails in the management of our Savings Banks. the condition of the market that has prevailed during the past few years, the temptation has been very strong to secure greater returns at the risk of safety. This temptation cannot be too strongly guarded against. No part of the securities of our Savings Banks should be of an uncertain or speculative character. The deposits intrusted to these banks represent the accumulations that have grown out of the industry and enterprise of the State, and should be watched over with jealous care.

AGRICULTURE.

Agriculture is Maine's foremost material interest. Upwards of eighty thousand of our citizens are actively engaged in its pursuits. Whatever can be done, therefore, to further promote this important industry of the State will contribute directly to the general prosperity of our citizens. During the past decade a substantial advance has been made by our farmers in the use of labor-saving machinery, and in the adoption of improved and scientific methods of cultivation. The gratifying growth of manufacturing centers in Maine, during the past few years, and the strong reason we have to hope for still further development of this character, are full of encouragement to our agricultural interests. enlarging market for home products there is reason to believe that the pursuits of husbandry may become more remunerative to the large number of our citizens engaged in them. An important factor in the advancement of agriculture has been the Grange, with nearly 17,000 members. Its discussions and interchange of views have been of great benefit to farmers both industrially and socially.

A desire has been felt among the farmers of the State to have the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture given an increase of salary and assigned permanent quarters at the State House, thus enabling him to devote his whole time to the important duties of his office. Such a change appears to me in all respects desirable, and I commend it to your favorable consideration.

STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

On the thirtieth day of August last, a bill was passed by the Congress of the United States, appropriating a portion of the proceeds of the public lands to the more complete endowment and support of the colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts, established under the provisions of an act of Congress approved July 2, 1862. By virtue of this act, the Maine State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts will receive the sum of fifteen thousand dollars for the year ending June 30, 1890, and an annual increase of the amount of such appropriation for ten years by an additional sum of one thousand dollars over the preceding year, until it amounts to twenty-five thousand dollars, at which annual sum it will remain thereafter without further increase.

In addition to this, the general government supports the Agricultural Experiment Station, located at this college, at an annual expense of fifteen thousand dollars. This wise and generous action on the part of the national government will place the college in good financial condition and will be a material relief to the tax payers of the State.

As no part of the appropriations to be made by Congress under the act of 1890 can be used for the erection of buildings, the Legislature will be called upon to replace the one known as Wingate Hall, which was destroyed by fire in February last. Other needs of the institution will be made known to you through the reports of its officers, which will soon be laid before you.

LABOR BUREAU.

The Labor Bureau, created, as the law plainly indicates, for the benefit of the working people of the State, is doing a valuable work, as the reports of the Commissioner will demonstrate. These bureaus, including that of the United States, now number twenty-two in the whole country. The importance of their work in collecting statistics relating to the various departments of labor, and inquiring into violations of the statutes providing for "the regulation of the hours of labor and the employment of women and children," have caused them to become recognized as indispensable national and state institutions, and entitle them to a liberal outlay for their support and maintenance.

PROHIBITION.

The past year has been an important one for the temperance interests of our State. For the first time since the adoption of the prohibitory amendment to our Constitution, the people of Maine have been afforded an opportunity to pronounce at the polls upon a movement looking to its repeal, and the substitution of the high license system. There was no uncertainty in their decision. By an emphatic majority they declared their belief that the best interests of temperance in this State, and the highest welfare of all our citizens, demand the maintenance of prohibition.

It cannot be denied that the law for the suppression of the liquor traffic is often violated, and that officials charged with its enforcement are frequently derelict in duty. But it is undoubtedly true that this condition of affairs is mostly confined to our cities and larger villages. In other places the law appears to have been faithfully and successfully administered. During the past two years I have personally written the officials in the various counties upon whom was devolved the duty of enforcing the law, urging the vital importance of the suppression of the dram shop. I did this that such offi-

cers might clearly understand that they would have the support of the Executive Department of the State in all their efforts to enforce prohibition.

That the various officers of the State, upon whom devolves this duty, have accomplished a great deal in the enforcement of the law, is everywhere conceded. It is, nevertheless, necessary to the highest success of prohibition that there should be in every community a strong temperance sentiment demanding a vigorous enforcement of the law and sustaining the officers in their efforts to secure it. When the sentiment against the liquor traffic is as universal and emphatic as against other forms of crime, the violations of the prohibitory law will be no more numerous than those of other penal That prohibition has accomplished a vast work enactments. for temperance in this State no candid man will deny. liquor traffic is no longer respectable. It is under the ban of popular condemnation. Those who engage in it are criminals in the sight of the law. The open dram shop with its flaunting signs and alluring windows, is no longer a feature in our State. The rumseller is forced into dark corners. He has been obliged, like other criminals, to resort to concealment and stealth, where, before the advent of prohibition, he pursued his traffic with openness and ostentation. The whole traffic has been forever relegated to the furtive ways of crime. It is not easy to estimate fully the great temperance work which this change has wrought in Maine. there still remains much to be done in so educating public sentiment that it shall everywhere insist upon the faithful enforcement of the laws. Maine stands, by the emphatic declaration of her citizens, in the very van of temperance states. In keeping her there, the friends of prohibition must spare no effort or shrink from no responsibility.

BALLOT REFORM.

I am firmly convinced that the time has come for Maine to adopt the Australian system of voting. Two years ago this

method of balloting was largely viewed in the light of a doubtful innovation. Many members of the Legislature felt that the results which had followed its adoption by a few states of the Union were too meagre to furnish a proper basis for action in this State, especially as they were achieved under the temporary disadvantages naturally attendant upon the introduction of a new law effecting such important changes.

There is no longer reason for this conservatism. The Australian system of voting has safely passed its experimental era in this country. Its wisdom has been clearly established. To-day it is the law in more than one-third of the states in the Union, and there is reason to believe that the time is not far distant when its adoption will become general.

It is the sacred duty of popular government to maintain, in every possible way, the purity of the ballot. The nearer our elections come to fairly registering the personal convictions of each individual voter, the closer will they conform to the true spirit of our institutions. It is the concurrent testimony of those states which have made a trial of it, that the Australian ballot system comes nearer securing this desirable result than any other yet devised. There is no reason to doubt that, under its wholesome operation, intimidation and bribery will be practically unable to influence elections, and voters will be freed from unpleasant espionage at the polls. Another benefit that will accrue from the adoption of this system of voting, will be found in the powerful incentive given political parties to nominate honest and capable candi-The subject is one that calls for careful thought, and I commend it to your earnest consideration.

PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

Our system of public instruction includes three separate and yet related groups of schools: viz,—the Common Schools, the Free High Schools and the Normal Schools.

For the support of these three groups during the last year, there have been expended the following sums:

While the statistics and statements of the report of the State Superintendent of Common Schools show the Free High and Normal Schools to be in a most prosperous and satisfactory condition, they do not show as much for the more important These latter, the support of which is Common Schools. compulsory by law in every town in the State, and attendance upon which is also compulsory, should be so organized and managed as to give every child in every town equal privileges; to impose equal burdens for their maintenance; to be in the highest practicable degree efficient for the ends for which they were established; and to be least wasteful of public moneys. It is claimed by the Superintendent that the system, prevailing in nearly three-fourths of our towns, is defective in all these particulars, and he recommends that, to remedy these defects, a law be enacted abolishing the school districts and giving the entire management of the schools to committees consisting of three or more members according to size of I bespeak for these important matters your most considerate action.

ENLARGEMENT OF STATE HOUSE.

The report of the Commission on enlargement of the State House will soon be laid before you. The extension is constructed throughout according to the most approved methods of fire-proof architecture. It is important that an appropriation to properly furnish it be made at an early day. I am of the opinion that a sufficient sum of money should also be appropriated to make the old State House fire-proof, and put it into condition to properly correspond with the new extension. I commend the subject to your favorable consideration.

During the year that has just drawn to a close, Hon. Lewis Barker, a member of the Commission, has passed away. No man took a deeper interest and pride in its work than he. To his sound judgment and practical grasp of affairs is due, in no small degree, whatever measure of success has attended its efforts. Mr. Barker served his State in many honorable positions and always with conspicuous faithfulness and ability. His memory will be tenderly cherished.

THE STATE LIBRARY.

Now that the State Library will soon be moved to its more convenient quarters in the new extension, I believe that the time has come to unlock, and render immediately available, all its vast treasures of information, by the adoption of the card system of cataloguing used in most of the larger libraries of the country. I am convinced that by the adoption of this system the practical utility of the Library would be enhanced fifty per cent. In an address sent out by the Association of State Librarians, an organization formed at St. Louis in May, 1889, the functions of a state library were thus succinctly stated: "A state library should not only be a complete reference library for all branches of the government, executive, judicial and legislative, and the repository of all materials for local history and biography, but it should also contain and furnish abundant facilities for using all desirable books of information relating to special industries and pursuits of the state, or calculated to lead to the introduction of industries and pursuits suited to it, but hitherto In short, it should be fitted to serve all interests neglected.

of the state by infusing into their conduct the highest intelligence and skill."

With the card system of cataloguing, a library conducted upon these lines may be made of great value to the State. The introduction of this system into a library containing 40,000 volumes, will, necessarily, involve a vast amount of work and considerable additional expense, but, once established, more cards can be placed in the alphabetical cabinets, as new books are added to the library, and thus the catalogue be, at all times, a complete index of its contents. I recommend that an additional appropriation be made for the temporary employment of extra help, specially skilled and experienced in this method of cataloguing, and for the purchase of such cabinets and other material as may be necessary to its adoption.

THE STATE MILITIA.

A gratifying advance has been made during the past few years in the character and efficiency of the State Militia. Both officers and men have worked with commendable zeal for the improvement of the service. At the annual muster in July last, the State was honored by a visit from Hon. Redfield Proctor, Secretary of War. A drenching rain storm, which was in progress during his stay at the camp, prevented him from reviewing the troops. He expressed himself as much pleased with the ground and its arrangement.

The money appropriated by the last Legislature for procuring a permanent muster ground, was expended in the purchase of the field used by the State for encampment purposes during the late war, and known as "Camp Keyes." It would be difficult, indeed, to find a place more admirably adapted to this purpose. The field contains something over sixty-three acres. It is an almost level stretch of table-land, situated upon a high elevation and commanding an excellent view of the surrounding country. Its soil is light and dry, with fine natural drainage. The sanitary conditions are all that could be desired. It was thought best to provide this

field with such permanent buildings as would be required at each muster. Accordingly, a store house, four headquarters buildings, twenty-three cook houses, two commissary buildings and four horse stables were constructed there in a tasty and substantial manner. The expense of these buildings, together with the cost of improvements upon the land, amounted to \$8,762 60 and was taken from the military appropriation. These permanent improvements will result in a large annual saving of expense to the State.

Maine is one of the very few states in the Union whose Adjutant General is elected by the Legislature. I am convinced that this is wrong and contrary to the best military usage. There appears to be no sufficient reason why the Governor of the State should not be permitted to select his own chief of staff through whom all his orders, as Commander-in-Chief, must be given official utterance. I recommend that the Legislature submit to the people of the State, at the next election, an amendment to the Constitution authorizing the filling of the Adjutant General's office by executive appointment.

PENSIONS.

Two years ago I recommended that the request of the Grand Army Posts of Maine for an increase in the State pension fund, should be granted. For the years 1887 and 1888, the sum of \$70,000 was devoted to the worthy work of the Pension Office. For the past two years the sum of \$125,000 has been expended by it, an increase of \$55,000 over the two preceding years. It would be difficult to estimate the great good that has been accomplished through this generous treatment of the sons of Maine who were disabled in the defense of the Union.

The patriotic people of the country were rejoiced at the enactment by Congress of the dependent pension law on the twenty-seventh day of June last. Its wise and liberal provisions have already been of vast benefit to the worthy veterans of the late war and those dependent upon them for support.

It will doubtless accomplish a still larger work of good in the years to come.

THE GETTYSBURG MONUMENTS.

The monuments in honor of the sons of Maine who fell at Gettysburg, in the heroic defense of the Union, were dedicated upon that historic field, with appropriate ceremony, on the third day of October, 1889. The occasion was favored with perfect weather, and its sad and solemn exercises will never be forgotten by those who attended them.

The battle of Gettysburg marked the great crisis of the Rebellion. It was here that the armed hosts of treason were forever beaten back from loyal soil. In that mighty contest, so fraught with moment to our national life, no troops bore a more honorable part than did those from Maine. Well may the State cherish, in her heart of hearts, the immortal memory of their glorious defense of country in its darkest hour of peril. The beautiful monuments that mark the spots where they yielded up their lives, that the Nation might live, are but our feeble attempt to give material and visible expression to the deep and abiding love we cherish for their memories. We may confidently believe, that, centuries after these temporary tokens of affection shall have crumbled into dust, the heroes of Gettysburg will still live in the grateful remembrance of a united and prosperous people.

MILITARY AND NAVAL ORPHAN ASYLUM.

Within the past two years I have twice visited the Military and Naval Orphan Asylum at Bath. The Institution is under excellent management and doing a most worthy work. It is in every way deserving of generous support.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

The past two years have witnessed a general and gratifying industrial awakening throughout the State. Many new industries have been established, and many old ones, which

had long lain idle, have been invested with a new lease of The great natural resources of the State are coming to be more and more appreciated as affording excellent opportunities for the profitable investment of capital. Our healthful climate, and the rugged beauties of our long sea coast. are winning wide reputation, and a constantly increasing tide of summer travel is a growing source of revenue to our people. At no time since the war has the future of Maine looked brighter. Increased industries mean increased employment for labor, which, in turn, means an increased market for products of all kinds. Thus, every new impulse given our industrial life conduces to the general prosperity. While the last census did not show as large a growth in population as had been hoped for, it nevertheless showed a substantial gain. Close observers are of the opinion that nearly all this advance was made in the closing years of the decade, and that a census taken in its opening years would have shown a loss. If this be true, it gives good promise of a far better showing in the future. Now that the exodus of our citizens has been stayed, and we have fairly started upon an encouraging era of home development and growth, we may confidently look forward to rapid progress in all the material interests of the State, and to a corresponding increase of prosperity growing out of the enlarged demand for labor and its products. will be your duty and privilege to assist, in every way possible, in fostering and furthering this movement, so full of promise to our people.

THE WORLD'S COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION.

Before the convening of the next Legislature the arrangements for the great World's Fair to be held in Chicago in 1893, will have been practically completed. It will devolve upon you, therefore, to determine what part Maine is to take in that important exposition. Whatever place we may take there should be in every way worthy of the State and representative of its material prosperity. While it will be your

duty to exercise a wise and prudent care of State expenditures, I am convinced that it would be a false and short-sighted economy that would place Maine before her sister states, and the world, in a position less strong than her industries and resources entitle her to hold. I regard this matter as one of great importance and recommend the appointment of a special committee to consider it in all its bearings.

RAILROADS.

The condition of the various railroads of the State will fully appear in the able and exhaustive report of the Railroad Commissioners. The statistics and recommendations which it contains are worthy of your thoughtful attention. erable has been done during the year in the construction of new roads and the improvement of old ones. The State is now fairly supplied with railroad communication. nevertheless, a field for further enterprise in this direction. Nowhere is this more apparent than in the great fertile county of Aroostook, whose varied products are now forced to seek a market over Canadian soil. A direct line over Maine territory, affording Aroostook a convenient outlet to the great markets of the country, would give a mighty impulse to the development of the county and materially increase the prosperity of the whole State.

INSANE HOSPITAL.

The condition and needs of the State Insane Hospital are worthy of careful consideration. The welfare of the unfortunate people who are under its care should be zealously looked after. The new buildings, provided for by the last Legislature, have been erected under the careful supervision of the Board of Trustees and are in every way creditable to the State. The number of patients admitted to the institution the past year has been larger than during any former year of its history, necessitating the immediate completion and furnishing of these buildings at an expense somewhat in

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excess of the legislative appropriation. I would recommend that a sufficient amount be appropriated at an early day to liquidate this, and every other bill, which enters into the proper administration of the affairs of the Hospital. The duties incumbent upon the officers of this institution are annually becoming more laborious. I feel justified in renewing the recommendation I made two years ago that the salary of the Superintendent be somewhat increased.

The Commission appointed under a resolve of the last Legislature to purchase a site for a new Insane Hospital has attended to its duties and an eligible location in the city of Bangor has been secured.

FISH AND GAME.

The valuable and interesting reports of the Commissioners of Fisheries and Game will be laid before you, and I earnestly commend the recommendations therein made to your careful attention. Everything possible should be done to sustain the Commissioners in enforcing the laws against those who wantonly violate them. Whatever the Legislature may be able to do to secure the better protection of fish and game, will advance the material interests of the State and merit the just approval of all its citizens.

THE PRESERVATION OF FOREST GROWTH.

The preservation of forest growth is a subject which is now attracting much attention. Its importance has brought about the formation of a number of worthy organizations for furthering this work. At the last meeting of the American Forestry Association at Quebec, in September last, the State of Maine was very ably represented by Hon. George F. Talbot of Portland. When it is considered that there is an annual loss by fires of growing timber in the United States equal to an area half as large as Maine, and that a very large per cent. of such fires are due to carelessness, the importance of this matter is at once apparent. It will merit your careful attention.

INDIANS.

The affairs of the Indian tribes appear to be in excellent condition. Moral and treaty obligations alike demand that these wards of the State should have our watchful care and protection.

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

This department is doing a most excellent work and has fully justified the wisdom of its establishment. The good results that have attended its well directed efforts in the interests of the public health are generally known and appre-Outside of a very few towns there has been no great prevalence of infectious diseases within the State during the past two years. It is of the highest importance that each town should be faithful in its observance of the health laws. The circulars of the State Board, and all other papers and blanks for the use of local boards of health, are furnished free to all the towns and cities of the State. In addition to these, specially important circulars for general distribution have been printed in large editions and freely circulated in most of the towns. It is highly important that there should be in the State an official registration of births and deaths. Maine is behind all other New England States in failing to make proper provision for securing such vital statistics. matter is one that deserves prompt attention.

THE STATE PRISON.

The affairs of the State Prison will be shown, by the report of its Warden, to be in excellent condition. In the sixteen years prior to 1886, the State appropriated \$297,287.21 for the support of the Prison, exclusive of salaries of its officers. Since that time it has received no appropriation from the State save for its pay-roll. In all other respects the Prison has been self-supporting. It begins the present year free from debt and with a balance of \$7,820.29 in its favor. The

introduction of reformatory methods into the administration of its affairs has been attended with gratifying results. Everything that can be done towards reclaiming men from the ways of crime and making them respectable members of society, will merit the cordial approval and co-operation of all who have at heart the highest interests of the State.

THE STATE REFORM SCHOOL.

The highly creditable work which has been done by this institution is shown by the fact that about seventy-five per cent. of the boys who have gone forth from it have become respectable and law-abiding citizens, a record that speaks more eloquently than words for the excellence of its management. There have been 159 boys in the school during the past year. The present number is 114. Good health has prevailed among them, no death having occurred there during the year.

In 1889 there was erected a building 96 by 48 feet designed to accommodate fifty boys. This enables a good beginning to be made in the introduction of the cottage system, which permits the classification of these youths into family groups. The adoption of this system in other states has been attended with most satisfactory results. By a purchase in 1889, twenty acres of land were added to the school farm, making a total of about 184 acres.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

The Industrial School for girls continues to do a most successful and worthy work. Its efforts are upon a broad, humane and philanthropic plane. The large measure of success that has attended them in the past entitles the School to continued encouragement and support.

STATE REFORMATORY FOR WOMEN.

An effort was made during the session of the last Legislature to secure an appropriation for the establishment of a State Reformatory for Women. The matter was finally left in the hands of the Governor and Council, with instructions to investigate it and report to the next Legislature. have accordingly given a public hearing, at which various friends of the project appeared and urged many forcible reasons why the State should have such an institution. report upon the matter will soon be laid before you. There are many grave objections to the custom now in vogue of keeping female prisoners in the various jails of the State. where proper provision has not been made for them, and where the associations are demoralizing. The enlightened moral sentiment of society demands a considerate treatment of women, even when they incur the penalties of the law. There can be no doubt that a State Reformatory under competent female management would result in vast good.

CONCLUSION.

The details of many of the subjects I have thus briefly touched upon, and of others which do not require specific mention at this time, will fully appear in the various public documents that will be placed before you.

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives: As we turn to the important work of the session, we must bear clearly in mind the fact that we are here not as the representatives of any special interests or sections of the State, but as the representatives of all interests and all sections. Let us act fearlessly and conscientiously for the furtherance of whatever, in our judgment, may be for the highest good of the whole State. At the same time, we should invoke, in all our deliberations, strength and guidance from Him who is the source of all wisdom. It is my earnest hope that, with the blessing of God, our labors here for the welfare of our beloved State may be crowned with such success as shall permanently advance its interests and make for the lasting benefit of all its citizens.

STATE OF MAINE.

To the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives:

In reply to the joint resolution of the Legislature, approved January 27, 1891, directing the State Valuation Commission to report "without further delay" it has to say that the Commission entered upon the discharge of its labors at as early a day as practi-

cable and has prosecuted them as promptly as possible under the circumstances. The Commission is required, by the act and resolve under which it was appointed, to examine the valuations of the five hundred towns, cities and plantations for the years 1887, 1888, 1889 The Commission has adjourned from time to time as circumstances seemed to warrant. Being required to examine the returns for 1890 the Commission was unable to enter upon that part of its duties earlier than November 4th, having met in August when they were unable to proceed as but few of the assessors' returns for 1890 had then been received; that on the assembling of the Commission at that date a large part of the assessors' returns for 1890 had not been forwarded as required by law, though each city, town and plantation had been specially requested to forward the returns at an earlier day and on blanks furnished for that purpose early in the season. The Commission has used all reasonable diligence to obtain the returns, and all have not yet been received. return received by the Commission was on the twenty-second day of last month.

The Commission was obliged to return quite a number of the inventories for 1890, as well as for previous years, for explanation or correction, and in a few instances to require the presence of the assessors to explain. In about one hundred and fifty cases, assessors or others have appeared for hearings as to towns and cities, before the Commission.

These hearings could not be properly had until the valuation for 1890 was received. In addition to the towns and cities and plantations, the Commission has had at least four hundred pieces of wild or timber land, containing about eight millions of acres, equal to three hundred and ninety-one townships of twenty-two thousand and forty acres each to inquire in regard to, in order to ascertain their location, nature of the soil, kind and amount of growth; the distance from floatable water; expense of driving and value of stumpage, in order to fix their values to compare with other property.

The Commission has had at least seventy-five hearings in regard to timber lands involving the question hereinbefore indicated.

The Commission has investigated, in order to fix the value per spindle, twenty cotton mills, containing eight hundred and seventy-nine thousand, eight hundred and seventy spindles, involving several lengthy hearings, also one silk mill, and forty-six woolen mills, containing three hundred and twenty-four and one-half sets of cards

and machinery, the sets of cards ranging from thirty-six to sixty inches in length. These investigations have required much time and great care, in order to fix an equitable valuation so far as possible. The extending of railroad facilities has stimulated new industries in some localities which have sprung up and which have required the special attention of the Commission.

Water and electric light companies and pulp manufactories have commenced operations in many places, which have required special effort, and the returns and much of the information concerning these enterprises, have not been obtained without much care and the exercise of unusual patience.

A large number of building, loan and trust companies have been organized which have required special attention.

The foregoing contains but a brief summary of the labors of the Commission. The Commission hope, in the progress of their labors to be able to make, within thirty days, a report which shall fix and equalize the values of the taxable property in the State as nearly as it is possible for them to do in the exercise of their best judgment, having regard to the evidence of values so far as they have been able to obtain them.

Ordered, The Senate concurring, that the Committee on the Judiciary be directed to inquire into the expediency of so amending section 26 of chapter 26, Revised Statutes, as to require that owners of tenement houses shall provide fire escapes.

These petitions, bills, resolve and orders were sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Mr. Porter of Bangor. I rise to a question of personal privilege. Speaker pro tem. What is the gentleman's question of personal privilege?

Mr. Porter. I will say that in my opinion next to the influence and power of the House of Representatives of the State of Maine is the newspaper press. I have a soft place in my heart for these bright fellows who report our doings in the House and I want their statements to be as correct as those in the Journal of the House. I take up a paper that I read once in a while, not as often as I wish, the Eastern Argus and I find this: "A demand for \$300,000 for Bangor." Well, now, Mr. Speaker, that relates to the proposed new insane hospital in Bangor. Bangor has made no demand. She has not demanded a dollar this winter. As for myself, I am interested in this hospital but I have not interviewed a single member of this House with reference to it. I propose to let it stand on its own merits as a State Institution. If this State needs a hospital the Legislature will grant it the necessary aid. If it does not need it the Legislature will not.

Mr. GENTLEMAN from the Committee on Legal Affairs, reported reference to Committee on Temperance, bil "An Act to repeal section 62 of chapter 27, Revised Statutes, and section 62 of chapter 366 of Public Laws of 1885, relating to liquor constables."

Mr. HAWES from the Committee on Ways and Bridges, reported reference to Committee on Legal Affairs, petition of Charles H. Nason that section 11 of chapter 18 of the Revised Statutes be amended.

To the Senate and House of Representatives:

It becomes my sad duty to announce to you the death of General William Tecumseh Sherman, at his home in New York, Saturday afternoon at 1.50 o'clock. The event is one that will be sincerely mourned by all patriotic citizens. It removes from our midst the last of that great trio of generals who won world-wide distinction in the great war of the Rebellion and whose names and achievements will be as enduring as the history of the great republic whose

integrity and free institutions they did so much to preserve and insure.

The career of General Sherman was a conspicuously honorable and patriotic one. He rose to great emergencies and became master of them. No man went before him in love of country. He died full of years and honors, in the warmest love and esteem of his tellow countrymen.

The whole nation mourns him. It is fitting that Maine should give expression to the profound sorrow that this sad event has brought to the hearts of her people.

He has met man's last enemy, death; and let us fondly hope and firmly pray that he will be triumphant even over death. After the gentlemen have expressed what they desire to do, I move, Mr. Speaker, that this House concur with the Senate, and that this House do now adjourn.

DEAR SIR:—I have noticed during the past four years of summer residence of my family and myself at the "St. Saveur" hotel at Bar Harbor, the utter helplessness of the guests of the house in case of a serious fire. Every hotel on the coast of Maine, from Old Orchard to Eastport, that I have seen is a like tinder box.

The coast of Maine offers to the summer visitor peculiar attractions. He has come to stay and to draw others after him. He should not be roasted.

It seems to the writer that legislative action should be had in your State requiring and *enforcing* the erection of adequate fire escapes.

I have written to the Governor of your State on this matter and address you as a resident not only of the State but of Bar Harbor.

Ordered, That the Committee on Finance be instructed to furnish in detail the estimated receipts for the years 1891 and 1892, showing from what sources increased or diminished income is to be expected; also the amount of all appropriations made by the present Legislature up to date as applicable to each year; also all further amounts necessary to carry on the government for each year under existing laws; also a list of all pending resolves and bills involving an appropriation of money, together with the amount of the same, and said committee be instructed to report on the above matters as soon as possible.

These petitions, resolve and order were sent to the Senate for concurrence.

On motion of Mr. Chadbourne of Biddeford,

Ordered, That William H. Leighton of Trescott be excused from further attendance on the House on and after March 14, 1891, by

reason of important town business, also by reason of poor health, and that his pay be made up to the end of the session.

Was referred to the Committee on Leave of Absence.

On motion of Mr. TILTON of Cape Elizabeth,

Ordered, That when this Legislature adjourns, the Senate concurring it adjourn until Tuesday of next week at 10 o'clock A. M.

A viva voce vote being declared in the affirmative and doubted, a rising vote was taken, and 40 voting in favor and 39 against, the order was declared passed.

There being some doubt about the returns of the monitors, Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston, who voted with the majority, moved a reconsideration of the vote, and 44 voting in favor and 39 against, the motion was carried.

The question was then on the passage of the order.

Mr. NOBLE called for the yeas and nays.

Mr. HATHAWAY of Passadumkeag moved to amend by substituting 4 o'clock P. M., for 10 o'clock A. M., and the question was on the adoption of the amendment.

Mr. Noble of Lewiston rose to a point of order that the amendment was not in order on account of a previous call for the yeas and nays. The Chair refused to sustain the point on the ground that the yeas and nays had not been ordered.

The Senate having adjourned, Mr. TILTON withdrew the order and presented the following:

Ordered, That when this House adjourns it adjourn until Tuesday of next week at 10 o'clock A. M.

Messrs. Peaks and Noble said that they believed this order would be unconstitutional, as the Speaker of the House had ruled that Sunday is a legislative day and that the House could not adjourn over more than two days without the consent of the Senate.

The Chair ruled that under the previous ruling of the Speaker the House could not adjourn over two days without concurrent action of the Senate, and that under existing circumstances the order was out of order.

The minority of same committee reported "ought to pass" on same bill, for the following reasons:

It is evident that public convenience and necessity require cheaper and more frequent communication between said city of Westbrook and said city of Portland, and that the inhabitants living upon the proposed line in Westbrook, Deering and Portland would be greatly benefited thereby, and that such a line would greatly promote the growth and prosperity of both of said cities.

Westbrook is now a flourishing city, and during the last ten years has grown more rapidly in wealth and population than any town in Cumberland county. It now has a population of nearly seven thousand inhabitants, with a fine water power and a great variety of mills, manufactories and places of business. Its distance from Portland is about six miles, and nearly all of its inhabitants have intimate business relations with the city of Portland.

At the hearing before the committee, petitions of the present Mayor of the city of Westbrook and over one hundred of its most influential men asked by petition for a charter for this purpose, and several of its prominent citizens appeared before the committee in person requesting that the charter might be granted. From the town of Deering over seventy-five prominent citizens along the proposed line petitioned that a charter should be granted, and over one hundred and twenty of the most prominent, wealthy merchants and business men of Portland have asked the Legislature to grant this charter.

Counsel for the Portland Railroad Company appeared before the committee, in opposition to granting the charter, but not a witness was called in opposition to its being granted. The Portland Railroad Company over thirty years ago was granted a roving charter through the old town of Westlrook but it has never built a foot of road in the present city of Westbrook, although it extended its road many years ago to Morrill's Corner in that portion of the old town of Westbrook which is now Deering. This railroad has often been requested to extend its lines to Cumberland Mills and Saccarappa in the city of Westbrook.

The chief objections raised at the hearing were as to the character of the charter in the first instance presented to the committee, and it was claimed that it did not define the proposed route, that the time of its existence should be limited to a certain number of years, and there should be a clause of forfeiture in the same, if the road was not built within a limited period, and that the abuttors were not sufficiently protected, and that not sufficient power was given to the municipal officers in relation to the taking up and repairing of the streets. Every objection that was made was acquiesed in by the counsel for the petitioners, and the charter was amended by such counsel to fully meet the objections made by the counsel for the Portland Railroad Company.

A letter was presented to the committee from Hon. George P. Wescott, President of the Portland and Ruchester Ruilroad, against the granting of said charter. This was the only remonstrance from any source, that appeared to the committee, against the granting of such charter.

It was further claimed that the inhabitants of the town of Deering and the cities of Westbrook and Portland had already sufficient railroad accommodations, but we believe that the pe itioners themselves are the best judges of their own needs and necessities.

The incorporators in this charter are able and financially responsible men, and one of them appeared before the committee and expressed a willingness to give a bond that if the charter was granted, the road would be built within two years.

Under these circumstances the undersigned dissent from the report of the majority of said Railroad Committee, and beg leave to report the accompanying bill for the consideration of the Legislature.

First—For the purpose of granting a joint hearing, agreeably to a vote of the two branches of the Legislature, they will meet in convention in the hall of the House of Representatives, on Friday, the 27th inst., at eleven o'clock in the forenoon

Second—The President of the Senate shall preside in the convention, and in the absence of the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House shall preside.

Third—The petitioners may be heard by counsel, and the respondent by himself and by counsel.

Fourth—The same rules of evidence shall govern as in the trial of civil actions in the supreme judicial court. All depositions shall be taken forthwith, but no Jepositions shall be admitted unless it is

shown that the deponent is unable to be present. The presiding officer shall decide all questions of the admissibility of evidence, and from his decision there shall be no appeal.

Fifth—No debate whatever shall be admitted in the convention. Sixth—No motion shall be submitted or entertained except to take a recess to a time certain or to dissolve the convention, and every such motion shall be decided without debate.

Seventh—No person shall be admitted to the floor of the House except members of the convention, the parties, counsel, witnesses, reporters for the press and the officers of both branches.

Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent moved that the resolve be laid upon the table. The motion was lost.

Report of the Committee on Railroads, Telegraphs and Expresses, reporting "ought to pass" on bill "An Act amendatory of and additional to chapter 283 of the Private and Special Laws of 1887, entitled 'An Act to incorporate the Waldo and Somerset Railway Company," "Senate Document No. 189,

Came from the Senate, report read and accepted, bill read twice and passed to be engrossed. The report was read and accepted in concurrence, bill read twice, and on motion of Mr. PORTER of Bangor, rules were suspended, bill read the third time and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Bill "An Act to provide for the registration of vital statistics," House Document No. 272, which passed to be engrossed in the House March 20th,

Came from the Senate, report of committee accepted in concurrence; bill read twice, amended by Senate amendment "A" and passed to be engrossed as amended.

The House receded, adopted Senate amendment "A," and the bill as amended passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Bill "An Act in relation to the organization of corporations chartered by special statute," House Document No. 248, which passed to be engrossed in the House March 16th,

Was referred to the Committee on Leave of Absence.

Ordered, That on and after 28th inst., the Rev. D. B. Randall, the Chaplain, be excused from further service on account of ill health, and the Clerk be directed to make up his pay to the close of the session.

On motion of Mr. CHADBOURNE of Biddeford,

Ordered, That Alonzo Roberts of Lyman be excused from further attendance upon this Legislature, and that the Clerk be directed to make up his pay to the end of the session.

On motion of Mr. MILLER of Lincolnville,

Ordered, That the justices of the supreme judicial court be respectfully requested to give to this House, according to the provisions o

the constitution, in this behalf, their opinion on the following question, viz: Is a number of the Sixty-fifth Legislature eligible to the office created by an act of the Sixty-fifth Legislature, entitled "An Act to create a Board of State Assessors," and approved by the Governor March 26th, 1891, an attested copy of which is herewith submitted.

The order was refused a passage.

Mr. NEWELL from the Committee on Leave of Absence reported "ought to pass" on order relating to granting leave of absence to H. T. Nash of Addison.

Mr. Bradbury requested entrance on the records of the appearance of Hon. Orville D. Baker and himself as counsel for the petitioners.

Mr. DUNBAR, Secretary of the Senate, then read the resolutions adopted by both branches in relation to the adoption of an address to the Governor for the removal of Judge Hamilton.

Mr. Heath then filed the following motion:

STATE OF MAINE.

IN JOINT CONVENTION OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, March 27, A. D. 1891.

In re, the removal of Charles S. Hamilton, judge of the municipal court of the city of Biddeford.

And now comes Charles S. Hamilton, above named, and before making answer to the statement of causes of removal served upon him and recorded upon the journal of the Senate, says:

First—That the first cause as set out, contains a statement of more than one offence, and save as to the first date therein alleged he has no sufficient or reasonable notice and in fact no notice whatever of the offences of which he is accused under said item.

Second—That the fourth cause alleges more than one offence, and save as to the misdemeanor in office alleged on the first date therein named, he has no notice whatever of misdemeanors therein charged against him.

Third--That the fifth cause alleges several offences all of which should be distinctly and independently averred. As stated, your respondent has no notice of the number of offences, nor the time of their alleged commission, save only as to the first date therein stated.

Fourth—That the sixth and seventh causes, for the reasons above stated, give your respondent no notice of the misdemeanors of which he is accused, so that he may prepare his defence. Wherefore, inasmuch as the offences sought to be alleged in causes first, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh are not in their nature continuing offences, but, on the contrary, are distinct, single and independent, your respondent says that they should be averred with such distinctness and precision that he may have reasonable notice of the charges against him.

Your respondent prays that the petitioners may be ordered to forthwith file a bill of particulars of the various offences charged under causes first, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh.

After discussion by counsel as to bill of particulars the convention at 12 o'clock took a recess until 2.30 o'clock P. M. The House was called to order by the Speaker.

On motion of Mr. DICKEY of Lewiston the House adjourned to 2.30 P. M.

On motion of Mr. NOBLE of Lewiston the House took a recess until after the completion of the afternoon session of the convention.

IN CONVENTION.

The convention met according to adjournment.

Mr. Heath stated that counsel for the petitioners had agreed to file with him the specific charges as fast as received.

He desired the Secretary to enter on the records a general denial on the part of the respondent.

Mr. Bradbury then addressed the convention on behalf of the petitioners.

Examination of witnesses for the prosecution followed.

On motion of Senator RYDER of Penobscot the convention adjourned to 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.

The House was called to order by the Speaker.

On motion of Mr. SHAW of Bath,

Adjourned.

Resolve in favor of the State Reform School, was taken from the table on motion of Mr. PEAKS of Dover and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Hamilton at Biddeford, aforesaid on the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and on divers other days between the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, signed as judge of said court certain blank forms called jurats attached to forms prepared for the use of and in said court for complaints for violations of the laws of the State of Maine, in which forms and complaints the commission of crime or misdemeanor was alleged and complained against and of no person, and by no person complainant, signed and sworn to, and also signed officially as judge aforesaid, certain blank forms called warrants ensealing the same with the seal of said court, said forms for warrants being attached to said complaints, and the same delivered to and permitted divers officers in said Biddeford, in the county of York, Maine, authorized to serve legal precepts issued by said court, to use as said officers saw fit and to meet the wishes of such officers, some of said pretended warrants appearing to authorize the entry and search of buildings and premises.

5th. Because the continuance of such habits, acts and proceedings nullify the proper and just operation of law and its due execution, and brings judicial proceedings into contempt and excites the disrepect of all.

6th. Because the safety of all legitimate pursuits of happiness and of those rights of life and liberty unalienable, depends upon the personal integrity, purity and up ightness of character of the judges of the various courts of the State to a great degree.

Papers from the Senate:

Mr. PEAKS of Dover said:

Mr. Clerk: I have a resolution which I wish to offer to the House:

Resolved, That the thanks of the members of this House are due to the Speaker, the Hon. Andrew P. Wiswell, for the conspicuous courtesy, fairness, courage and impartiality with which he has presided over our deliberations. And, gentleman, I wish to say just a few words. Some time before this Legislature met, in my misty imagination I saw a gentleman other than the Speaker presiding over the deliberations of this House. Since I have come here and sat here as a member of this House I have watched with some degree of care to see if I could notice any thing, any act, any word, any ruling of the Speaker which could be criticised in any way, and I am free to say to you that I have seen none, and with all respect to the distinguished gentlemen who have occupied that chair in years

gone by, I am free to say that I recollect no man that I think has filled the position with more honor, more integrity, more fairness, more impartiality, and more courage than the distinguished Speaker of this session and I hope that this resolution will have a unanimous passage.

Mr. STEARNS of Caribou said:

Mr. Clerk: I too, will add my testimony to the distinguished character and services of him who has presided so fairly, impartially and courteously over our delibera ions. Coming here as he did with a reputation extending beyond the confines of this State, we expected much from him, and not only have our expectations been realized. but more than realized. The first task that he had set to him to perform was the forming of his committees, and I submit, and I believe that all the House will agree, that in the forming of those several committees he showed skill and judgment that could hardly be expected. After his committees were formed I heard no word of complaint, no word of fault finding, no person to say that he had not been well and fairly treated. As he entered upon the work of the House I know the members will agree with me that his rulings have been fair and impartial, to that extent, indeed, that although we have had exciting debates here upon this floor, although many questions of parliamentary law have been raised, there has been, so far as I recollect, no one appeal taken from is decisions. ous and kind he has been to us all, patient, indeed, so that there can be none of us, the members on this floor who can complain of ought that he has done. We have had a busy, and in some respects stormy session, and now, Mr. Clerk, I wish to take this opportunity to say some words that I may address to the members of the House upon this floor. During the stormy, long and busy session that is now drawing to its close, there has been to me, at least, manifested and discovered by the members a feeling of kindness and friendliness such as must always be pleasant in my recollection. When we have had questions before us calling out the zeal, the ardor and the fire of the members, there have been no words said in debate, to my recollection now, that have been unkind to any person. Our work must be judged by the people. Our work is not only and has not only been for present days, but perhaps for future generations, whether we have done it well or not

the verdict of the people will pronounce, but that there has been a purpose fixed and steadfast, never swerved from by members of this House I think no one will deny. We shall never meet again here, gentlemen of this House, all together. It is not possible. is not in accordance with the laws of nature. There are members on this floor who have already journeyed up the eastern slope across the summit and are now on their journey down on the western through the dark valley, beyond which will lie and will be seen the beautiful vista of immortality. There are the middle aged among us. Then there are the young. The young may go before the old. Two years ago, when the final, last words of parting were said upon this floor, I recollect that one man, young, bright, talented, able, full of promise, made to the members on this floor a most feeling and most beautiful speech. None of those then present could have contemplated that in one short year that life of his, so valuable to the State, so precious to his friends and family, would go out, but thus it was, and who of us can say which one of us may first go? Certainly, indeed, some must before this Legislature shall assemble again. Mr. Clerk, I hope that this resolution will receive a unanimous passage by this House.

Mr. PAYSON of Portland said:

I should feel that I had missed one of the pleasantest privileges of the entire session if I failed at this time to express my appreciation of the marked abilities of the Speaker of this House. The session has been a long one, and matters of great importance have been considered and disposed of. At times the interest in impending questions has been intense, and yet from the beginning of the session to the end I have not been aware of even a breath of criticism upon any act of him who has presided over us. Always kindly and courteous, always fair and impartial, always prompt, able and competent, he has the respect, esteem and personal regard of every member of this House, and, Mr. Clerk, it gives me great pleasure to join the gentleman from Caribou in seconding this motion.

Mr. GENTLEMAN of Parsonsfield secured the recognition of the Clerk in behalf of Mr. Chadbourne of Biddeford.

Mr. CHADBOURNE said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen: I thank you very much for the courtesy you have extended me. I should, indeed, be loath to leave

without adding my word of testimony in appreciation of the efforts put forth by our Speaker in the performance of his daties. I had hoped that the honor of introducing a resolve of thanks might fall upon me, for, from my acquaintance with him two years ago, continued to now, from the intimate acquaintance I have had with him this session, from the thorough knowledge I believe I have of him, I can sav in all truth that my feelings toward him are most tender, I knew at the commencement of the session most affectionate. that we were to have a Speaker of whom we might all well be proud. I had met him on the floor of this House in debate, always courteous, always gentlemanly, always fair. Never has there been the least manifestation of unkindly feeling, nothing but the best and brightest and purest of intentions manifest in his every act, not only on the floor of the House, but in the chair of the Speaker. We may well congratulate ourselves that we were so fortunate, or that you, my political opponents, were so fortunate in making the choice you did for Speaker, and as a representative of the minority of this House, I can say in all truth, in all heartiness, I have vet to see one single moment or occasion when we had the least reason to find the least fault with any decision of his, and I can say here and now that from the very bottom of my heart, I hope that his abilities, his judgment, his education, his culture, may be recognized,—ay, they must be, or to use a more common term, "he must be heard from hereafter."

I cannot be seated without saying a word to the members of this It has been to me a very pleasant session, and I feel under the greatest obligation, not only to those of my own party but under especial obligation to those of my opponents for the courtesy with which they have treated me. It is indeed a pleasant thought that our party affiliations have been so far forgotten, and we have all united in the one endeavor of furthering the interests of our grand old State, and while we may disagree in our politics and in all manhood maintain the principles of our party, yet we have not dragged anything into this House in the shape of party feeling or party action where our principles did not require that we should do it; but when it has been done, it has been through the highest and best of motives, leaving not one single trace of unkindly feeling behind. Again I say I thank you for the courtesy you have extended. We are meeting now for the last time on earth. As the gentleman from Caribou so feelingly said of the gentlemen of the last session from Bangor, few of us thought then that within the short time that there

would be taken from our midst a man whom all had learned to love, a man who had always been kind to all of us, whose talents we recognized and for whom we predicted a most bril-Who of us will go first? We know not, but liant future. this much we do know, that there is engraved on the tablets of our very hearts a record which will follow us down to our graves and make this session memorable in the kindly friendships we have made—av, in the loving friendships we have made. Gentlemen, I go feel toward the members of this House, as I have toward the members of other Houses heretofore, a feeling of more than kindness and tenderness, and when I speak of affection I speak of it in the highest sense, an affection which should be and is as abiding as our lives. I hope that each and everyone of us will maintain this kindly friendship that now exists. I hope that in the hereafter the acquaintances we have made here, the friendships we have formed, the love for one another that we have borne will follow us and grow in its beauty, its charm, and its strength. We are about to part. Whenever we meet we have the assurance that we shall meet not only as acquaintances but as the very best of friends. Mr. Clerk, I do most heartily second the resolve and I know that it will have a unanimous passage.

Mr. DICKEY of Fort Kent said :

Mr. Clerk: It has been my privilege to be present at the adjournment of this, my 20th Legislature. I have known the Speakers from Hannibal Hamlin now of Bangor, down to the present time. Almost every one I have been familiar with and acquainted with. I know of their dignity, their precision in presiding over this assembly. We have had Legislatures different from this. We have had antagonisms and almost fights, members arrayed against each other and in temper but so far as I have attended upon this Legislature and I have attended all that I could, I have seen nothing but the most cordial feelings of love and amity existing amongst us all. shall part probably never to meet here but in speaking of the various members who have presided here we have had very few, if any, who were superior if equal to our present presiding officer. [Applause.] He was my seat-mate in the last Legislature, the man that I have known, and his father before him, and I learned to love him from his boyhood. Now, gentlemen, we have had such men as Hamlin and such men as Blaine, all of them, or nearly all of them, differing from me in political matters, but they have been

my strongest friends, and I hope that the people will appreciate our present presiding officer and elevate him into that position as high, at least, as ever James G. Blaine attained. [Applause.] They cannot place confidence in a man of purer life or sounder integrity. The life that he has lived has been one that was unspotted, pure. There are no marks, there are no outs to-day. It is all clean and it is all pure, and may Heaven accord him that position which he is capable to hold. [Applause.]

Mr. OSGOOD of Lewiston said:

Mr. Clerk: In rising here in the closing hours of the Sixty-Fifth Legislature and looking upon the kindly faces of the Speaker and the one hundred and fifty members who form this honorable body, I rise at this time feeling that a solemn duty imposes upon me to thank this honorable body for the kindness and the courtesy which they have extended to me, to my distinguished colleagues representing the same city as myself, and also to the distinguished Chair. I feel, gentlemen, we met almost as strangers, and I do most sincerely trust that we shall part as friends. In my judgment, we shall never meet again in this legislative body, and that "He who marks the sparrow's fall" will have you in His loving care forevermore, is my sincere wish.

Mr. CALLAHAN of Lewiston said:

Mr. Clerk: I most heartily concur in all the kind expressions of the gentlemen who have preceded me, and I rise on this occasion to express my personal thanks to the Speaker of this House. From the opening day to the present hour I have received only kindest attention and consideration at his hands. I most willingly, therefore, bear testimony to his fairness and worth. To every member of this House I desire to express my kindest feelings and regard with the assurance that the strong ties of friendship begun here will ever continue in our future life. When we entered this hall at the commencement of the session many of us were unacquainted with legislative work and were strangers to each other. Although we met as strangers, we part now as friends. The events now about to close will ever constitute a happy epoch in our lives, and in recurring to them in the future we will always, I trust, bring to our minds the pleasing consciousness of duty well done. This closing hour forcibly

reminds me that what we have done will soon become a part of the history of our State. Can we with confidence and pride point to that history with the consciousness of duty faithfully and intelligently performed? I think we can, and upon that point I trust there will be no doubt or division of the question. And now, fellow members, the time indicator warns us that we have reached the outer circle of the hour which shall for the last time behold all of us together in any place in this world of ours, for when we go forth from this hall we enter upon different paths, never again, either by duty or chance, to be side by side, and in saying the final word, "Farewell," I also extend the right hand of good fellowship, with my heart's best wishes, to each and every member, trusting that Heaven's choicest blessings may be yours hereafter. [Applause.]

Mr. DRUMMOND of Portland said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen: I wish to add my testimony to that of the gentlemen who have already spoken of the ability with which the Speaker has performed the duties of his position. I believe it to be the unanimous sentiment of this House that his one aim has been to treat all kindly and courteously, and his rulings have been characterized by a desire to treat all fairly and impartially. When we remember the large amount of work that has been done during this session and call to mind the fact that a large part of the drudgery of that work devolves upon the chair, I think we can all very fully appreciate the patience and the dignity with which he has presided over our deliberations. We are now about to separate and when this Legislature finally dissolves and we go to our several homes he will bear with him, I have no question, the respect and the best wishes of every member of this House. I heartily second the motion made by the gentleman from Dover.

Mr. TRUSSELL of St. George said:

Mr. Clerk and Gentlemen of the House: I should not be true to my own convictions did I not second most heartily the resolution offered by the gentleman from Dover. It is incumbent upon us to indorse the complimentary resolutions which have been offered, and in behalf of the Knox County Delegation, and for my humble self, the least of the minority of this House, I tender to him our sincerest thanks for the courtesy that we have received at his hands. To the

members of this House I tender the heartfelt thanks of the Knox Delegation for the unfailing courtesy and kindness with which we have been treated. I congratulate this House upon its selection of a man as Speaker, to this responsible and arduous office, who has upon all occasions, at all times, proved himself the right man in the right place. We are about to part, never on earth, in all probability to meet again as a whole, and for one I entertain the most profound and sincere friendship for each member of this House, and I say to you, one and all, God bless and God speed you in the battle of life, and may success crown your efforts in every proper, honorable and just undertaking.

Mr. CLASON of Gardiner said:

Mr. Clerk: I feel that I would not be doing justice to myself should I not add a word to the eloquent remarks that have been made by the speakers who nave preceded me. This has been an important Legislature. Many bills of a public nature have been presented and enacted, not all unanimously, for many of them have called forth sharp controversy, but not a word has been said upon the floor of this House in debate that would wound the feelings of the most sensitive. To our Speaker, who has been so courteous, so affable, so ready to assist with his superior skill and experience. I wish to extend my sincere thanks. I assure you, Mr. Speaker, that vour courtesies will be always remembered by this House. While we regret the departure, and the farewell words will soon be said, we must remember that our arduous labors are over. Our duties now call us to our homes and our several businesses. pleasant relations that have been formed here live as long as life shall last, and when in the course of human events, from time to time many of us here may meet, may the meeting be pleasant and a reminder of the many associations formed here in the Legislature of 1891.

Mr. GLIDDEN of Newcastle said:

Mr. Clerk: I feel, sir, that I should be doing violence to my feelings did I not arise here and make some few remarks upon the subject now before us. I came here almost three months ago a stranger to everyone in this House, excepting three gentlemen. I came here a stranger to legislation practically, having never had any

experience in practical legislation before, so I consider myself one of the youngest members of the House, in practical experience, and it gives me pleasure to say that I have found here very many agreeable, happy, pleasant acquaintances. It gives me pleasure to say here with regard to the Speaker in the chair that I do most heartily endorse the sentiments that have been expressed here this evening. I believe that there is no gentleman on this floor who can complain that he has ever been discourteous while he has been Speaker, and that we have all been treated with the utmost kindness and respect is certainly the observation of myself. And now, gentlemen of the House, were are about to part, as has been said here this evening. We are about to part, never, never to meet again on this side of the river. We have been here doing legislative work. We have endeavored to do what has seemed to be consciously our duty to do. have no doubt of this. I have read a good deal of legislation for the past 40 years—the legislation of this State from session to session. I have known of times and times again when angry discussions have been going on here, and it is a matter of rejoicing to me at this time to say that so far as my observation has gone in this session, it has been a most harmonious one.

Now, gentlemen, as I say, we are about to part. There are many of you who will meet in this hall again undoubtedly, to legislate for your State. You have a future before you, and you are looking forward, many of you, to bright prospects in the future, and may Heaven grant that your anticipations may be realized. My future, gentlemen, as you may all be aware, is over yonder on the other side. I shall not meet you here again in these legislative halls as a legislator. Circumstances will forbid. Too far am I toward the river, indeed, at this time, ever to expect to meet you here again; but many of you who are now before me are looking forward to bright prospects, as I said, and it is well for you to do so, and to place upon your banner the word "Excelsior," and hold that banner high as you advance in life, and let your motto ever be "Onward, onward, upward, higher and higher" in all life's greatest [Applause.] Mr. Clerk, I want to say here that I thank the gentlemen of this House. I have reason to thank you, gentlemen. I came here, as I have first said, a new man, and yet I have seemed to receive the utmost courtesy and kindness from the members of this House generally. Gentlemen, way down in my heart, I kindly thank you for these things; [applause] and now, with regard to

the presiding officer of this House, the Speaker, I can say no more than that I thank him with my whole heart for the kindness, courtesy and ability with which he has presided over our deliberations during this session. [Applause.]

Mr. OSGOOD of Lewiston:

I trust that the resolutions which have been offered may be adopted by a rising vote.

Mr. DREW of Fort Fairfield said:

Mr. Clerk: I should indeed be sorry to let this opportunity pass without expressing my appreciation of the kindness, courtesy, integrity and honesty which has ever characterized Andrew P. Wiswell both as a Speaker and as a man.

The resolutions were then adopted by a unanimous rising vote.

Speaker WISWELL said:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives: It would be difficult for me on this occasion to give utterance to my feelings or to express my heartfelt gratitude for the kind words with which you have urged the passage of the resolution of thanks. On the first Wednesday in January we met in this hall for the purpose of giving our time, our services and our best abilities to the State in the positions in which we had been placed by our respective constituencies. For twelve weeks and more we have labored diligently and faithfully for the common good, and while there have been differences of opinion, and were there none there would be but little need of deliberative assemblies, I am sure of this, that when this gavel falls for the last time, when this Legislature has become a thing of the past and its acts matters of history, and when every man goes his way, that we can carry with us the consciousness that we have done our duty as best we knew it. [Applause.] Human responsibility can require no more than this. If I have fulfilled the duties of the position to which I was elected by your courtesy in such a way as to deserve in some degree your approbation, it will be with me a source of pride and pleasure forever. Allow me to say that I feel that I owe a debt of gratitude to this House for its uniform courtesy.upon all occasions and to every member of this House for the invariable kindness which I have received at your

hands. The friendship that I have made among the members of this House will long endure. The faces which have become so familiar during the weeks that we have sat here have made an impression that time will not efface, and while it is of course true, as has been repeatedly said, that we may never expect to all meet again, it will at all times be a pleasure to me to meet and grasp the hand of a member of the Sixty-Fifth Legislature. [Applause.] I should not want to allow this opportunity to pass without saying a word in regard to the faithful and efficient services of the Clerk, the officers and employes of the House. I know that I but echo your sentiments when I say to them that we appreciate their attention and careful performance of their delicate and important duties and that we most sincerely thank them one and all for it. Gentlemen, I wish you Godspeed in all the varied affairs of your lives. [Applause.]

Mr. STEARNS of Caribou said:

Mr. Speaker, I rise to make a request unusual upon this floor, and that is the right to address a member of this House.

Chair—The request will be granted.

Major Dickey was requested to come forward and did so amidst the applause of the members.

Mr. Speaker, Gentlemen of the House: By request of some of your body I have now arisen to present in behalf of the House as a token, a memento, from the House, this stick to the Nester of the House. The gentleman from Fort Kent, who now stands before you, my friend, and a friend of many years, has sat under this dome for 20 sessions of the Legislature. That he may return again and be a member of the next House is my sincere wish. [Applause.] I know I but echo your sentiments when I say that he is to us an object of affectionate regard [applause] and as the storm beaten beauty of the ripened corn is dearer and more interesting to us than the tender shoot that produced it so to us are dearer and more interesting the venerable looks of my friend, his ripened and mature judgment and his kindness and courtesy. behalf of the members of the House, Major Dickey, I present this to you and as it serves you as a staff upon which to lean in your declining years, I know it will always remind you that it is given as a

tribute and a token from the loving kindness and regard of your associates in this House. [Applause.]

Major DICKEY in replying said:

Judge Stearns has presented me, as the oldest member of this House, with this beautiful cane or staff. David, when he went out to fight his enemies with his small sling and a few pebbles leaned upon his staff. But gentlemen of the House, I have no enemies on this earth than I know of to fight, and therefore I cannot imitate David. This token is a wonderful incentive to me, and I return to those who gave it, my hearty and sincere thanks. True, I have been with you but six or seven weeks of this session, but you have been kind to me, every single member, and waited for those matters in which I was interested for my constituents, until I was able to return. You have granted to me all that I have asked. You have granted to my constituents a wonderful boon in that school, and I. assure you, gentlemen, that a more worthy thing was never done by any Legislature than the granting of that sum for the building up of that school. I extend to you, gentlemen, one and all, my grateful thanks, and while I live, whether it be long or short, I shall carry this staff with the remembrance of its donors and for the wonderful and beautiful staff that it is. Again I thank you.

Mr. SHAW of Bath presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of the members of this House be extended to W. S. Cotton, clerk, and F. A. Hobart, assistant clerk, for their uniform patience, courtesy and ability in the performance of their respective duties.

Mr. SHAW said:

Mr. Speaker: It gives me great pleasure to present this resolution. The gentlemen named in it have performed their duties in a courteous, faithful and efficient manner. They were strangers to us here at the commencement of the session, but by their courteous bearing they have won the friendship of all the members. Their bright and cheerful faces which we have seen daily before us we will always remember when we recall the sessions which we have had here during this Legislature. Mr. Speaker, I move that the resolution have a passage.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

PRESENTATION TO SPEAKER WISWELL.

Mr. OSGOOD:

I ask unanimous consent of this distinguished body to address the House.

At Mr. Osgood's direction, a large crayon portrait of the Speaker was brought forward and displayed to the House and Speaker. [Applause.]

Mr. OSGOOD:

Respected Sir and Gentlemen of the House: We came here upon the 7th day of last January almost as strangers. I trust that when this legislative body adjourns to-night we may all part as friends. You have, dear sir, by your kindness, by your urbanity and by your magnificent parliamentary knowledge endeared yourself, in my judgment, to the hearts of every member of this legislative body before me, [applause] and sir, when this body finally dissolves, it will be my heartfelt wish and hope that you and yours may enjoy that prosperity, political, financial and physical, which is due to you and your own. Gentlemen of the Sixty-Fifth Legislature, I ask you as a personal request that you will all rise in your seats and give three cheers for the noble Speaker of the Sixty-Fifth Legislature. [Three cheers.] And now, Mr. Speaker, as a further mark of respect, we ask of you through this legislative body, of which I am the spokesman, to accept this picture of your distinguished self. [Applause.]

Speaker WISWELL:

Colonel Osgood and Gentlemen of the House: I accept this gift as only one more evidence of your never-ceasing kindness. [Applause.]

Mr. THAYER of Waterville:

I move that we rise and give three cheers for the Speaker of this House and his noble wife.

Three hearty cheers were then given by the members.

Mr. Osgood of Lewiston moved that the House adjourn till Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

The motion prevailed.

RULES.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

1. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result:

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct:

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; make up the pay-roll of the members; and in the absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until speaker pro tem. be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of speaker; and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

CHAPLAINS.

- 4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplains in religious service.
- 5. The chaplains may change duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

MONITORS.

- 6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.
- 7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon:

On ways and means, On leave of absence, On bills in the third reading, On engrossed bills,
On elections,
To consist of seven members each.
On county estimates,
To consist of one member from each county.

On business of the house, To consist of three members.

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their number shall elect a chairman.

- 10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.
- 11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.
- 12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair shall speak first.
- 13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake.
- 14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.
- 15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.
- 16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the house.
- 17. No member shall be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.
- 18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.
- 19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the house for more than six days after the session commences shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason for such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any

member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

- 20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same with the clerk.
- 21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.
- 22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him, and when yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the Aote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.
- 23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.
- 24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of state, land agent, adjutant general, judges of the supreme judicial court, chaplains of the senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the house.

PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

- 25. After reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
 - 1st. Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. Reception of petitions, bills and resolves requiring reference to any committee.
 - 4th. Orders.
 - 5th. Reports of committees and first reading of bills or resolves.
- 6th. Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.
 - 7th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.
 - 8th. Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration,

and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

- 27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.
 - 28. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but-
 - 1st. To adjourn.
 - 2d. To lay on the table.
 - 3d. For the previous question.
 - 4th. To commit.
 - 5th. To postpone to a day certain.
 - 6th. To amend.
 - 7th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.
- 29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.
- 31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: Shall the main question be put now? No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.
- 32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.
- 33. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

- 34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.
- 35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- 36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.
- 37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.
- 38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.
- 39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.
- 40. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.
- 41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.
- 42. In all elections by ballot, of the house, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.
- 43. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.
- 44. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the house with the decision thereon.
- 45 A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.
- 46. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker, or by a member in his place, and shall

be endorsed with the name of the person presenting it, and the subject matter of the same. They shall be read by the speaker, clerk, or such other person as the speaker may request, and shall be taken up in the order they were first presented, unless the house shall otherwise direct.

- 47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading, shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.
- 48. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on Wednesday of the week following that of their first reading.
- 49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.
- 50. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.
- 51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.
- 52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corp rations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.
- 53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.
- 54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate, without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.
- 55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor? and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.
- 56. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual excepting section 51, relating to the reception of petitions, shall govern

the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

- 57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless twothirds of the members present shall consent thereto.
- 58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

JOINT RULES.

1. The following joint standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

On the judiciary,

On legal affairs,

On financial affairs,

On federal relations,

On education,

On railroads, telegraphs and expresses,

On commerce,

On mercantile affairs and insurance,

On banks and banking,

On manufactures,

On agriculture,

On military affairs,

On interior waters.

On state lands and state roads,

On ways and bridges.

On fisheries and game,

On counties,

On towns,

On Indian affairs,

On claims,

On pensions,

On insane hospital,

On reform school,

On state prison,

On public buildings,

On library,

On state college of agriculture and mechanic arts,

On mines and mining,

On temperance,

On labor.

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

- 2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.
- 3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house, and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the

senate, or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.

- 4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be briefly endorsed on the back of the same.
- 5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute shall state the subject matter of such statute—also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.
- 6. The titles of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject matter of the same.
- 7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz:
- "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:"

Ali bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with "Section 1."

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

- 8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shall have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.
- 9. All endorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.
- 10. Every bill or resolve of a public nature, and every bill or resolve appropriating money, or disposing of state lands or other state property, reported in either house by a committee, or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses, before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.
- 11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be five hundred, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving one hundred copies for the departments and for binding, and twenty copies for the committee having the same under consideration.

- 12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.
- 13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house, representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.
- 14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by reconsideration; and no measure containing the same subject matter shall be introduced during the session unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.
- 15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and it shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.
- 16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.
- 17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

Senate Order of Proceedings and Debates.

After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

- 1st. House papers not acted on; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. The reception and reference of petitions, and such other papers as require action by a committee.
- 4th. The report of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.
- 6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but.

- 1st. To adjourn.
- 2d. To lay on table.
- 3d. To postpone to a day certain.
- 4th. To commit.
- 5th. To amend.
- 6th. To postpone indefinitely.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the House shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st. To recede.
- 2d. To concur.
- 3d. To insist.
- 4th. To adhere.

A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate

The name of the senator presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the county which he represents.

The senator presenting an *order* should put his name thereto, on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county which he represents.

RULES OF THE SENATE.

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- Rule 1. President to take the chair at time of calling to order—secretary to preside in his absence.
 - 2. Journal to be read—president to ascertain whether quorum is present before such reading.
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 - " 14. Questions of order.
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 - " 16. Filling up blanks.
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 - " 18. Bills in second reading to go to committee-their duty.
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 - " 22. Order of business-secretary to keep a calendar of bills.
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- " 34. Senators not to act as counsel
- " 35. Messages and papers-how carried.
- " 36. Committee of the whole.
- " 37. Cushing's Manual, &c., to govern proceedings.

RULES.

- 1. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case of his absence at such time, the secretary shall preside until a president pro tempore be chosen.
- 2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read; and the president shall ascertain whether a quorum is present before such reading.
- 3. When the president speaks he shall address the senate; when a senator speaks he shall stand in his place and address the president.
- 4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members, when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of *senator*, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.
- 5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.
- 6. The president shall rise to put a question, and shall declare all votes, but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.
- 7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.
- 8. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to reconsider, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.
- 9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw it at any time before a decision, or any amendment be made to it.
- 10. No senator shall address the senate until recognized by the president, nor more than once to the exclusion of any other senator, without

leave of the senate, if objection is made, unless he be the mover of the matter under debate, and not then more than three times without leave.

- 11. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; nor shall an amendment proposing to ingraft a general provision of law upon a private bill be in order; nor any amendment beyond the second degree.
- 12. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, unless the vote adopting it be first reconsidered, and no senator shall be competent to move any reconsideration unless he voted with the majority and upon the same or a succeeding day; and a motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid upon the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.
- 13. A motion to reconsider shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, but if made while another question is pending, it shall not be put until the other question is disposed of, but simply entered.
- 14. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.
- 15. A question containing two or more propositions capable of division shall be divided whenever desired by any member.
- 16. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.
- 17. Every paper shall be once read at the table before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.
- 18. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.
- 19. Upon a second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading unless a time (not less than one hour after the first reading) be assigned therefor.
- 20. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills, whose duties shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.
 - 21. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property, shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.

- 22. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:
- 1st. House papers not acted upon; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.
- 2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.
- 3d. The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers, except bills and resolves, as require action by a committee.
- 4th. Reports of committees, and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve. Bills, resolves, etc.. offered by senators, and their reference or first reading.
- 5th. Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.
- 6th. Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the house, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

- 23. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.
- 24. After question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.
- 25. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have precedence in the orders of the day.
- 26. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.
- 27. Every member who shall present a petition shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.
- 28. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secrecy.
- 29. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of two-thirds of the members present.
- 30. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.
- 31. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leave, unless there be a quorum left present.

- 32. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot,) and appointed by the senate.
- 33. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz:

STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in second reading. On engrossed bills.

To consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

- 34. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.
- 35. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall be transmitted to the governor and council and the house by the secretary or his assistant.
- 36. The senate may at any time, upon motion, by a vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.
- 37. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or of the joint rules of the two houses.

MEMORANDA.

- 1. Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees should never be presented on less than a half sheet of paper.
- 2. When a report of a committee is made to either house it should be accompanied by the order or other paper appointing said committee to consider the subject.
- 3. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from towns in their corporate capacity, should be endorsed thus, "Petition of town of ———," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 4. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from individuals should be indorsed thus, "Petition of ——— and others of the town of ———," [stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 5. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances from corporations should be endorsed thus, "Petition of ———," [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject matter thereof.]
- 6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials and remonstrances, should be endorsed on the back thereof, near the bottom, with the county in which he resides.
- 7. The member presenting an *order* should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the county in which he resides.
- 8. Petitions, memorials and remonstrances, on which leave to withdraw was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files, with a view of being again referred. The original, however, may be taken from the files, and the subject presented de novo.
- 9. Bills and resolves refused a passage, rejected or postponed indefinitely by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.
